Cousin of Albians Is Appointed as Judge

Ambrose O'Connell, former Ottumwan and executive vice-chairman of the democratic national committee, has been appointed a judge of the court of customs and patent appeals.

O'Connell is a cousin of Mrs. Harry Smarr and Mrs. Nellie Pharis of Albia.

According to an Associated Press story, O'Connell will succeed Irvine L. Lenroot, who resigned recently.

The new appeals judge is a native of Ottumwa, and a graduate of Notre Dame University, and in 1932, served under James Farley as assistant chairman of the democratic committee. He is also a first assistant postmaster general, and has lived in Washington since the early days of the democratic administration.

M. C. (Mike) Falvey Died Friday After Long Illness

Prominent Figure in Banking and Lumber Business Here.

M. C. (Mike) Falvey died at his home Friday, after a long illness. Mr. Falvey was 76 years old, and had lived in Albia since a boy.

Born July 4, 1867 in Norwich, Conn., he came here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Falvey.

After graduation from Albia schools, he worked, as a teacher, a farmer, and served as deputy county auditor in 1907.

In 1901 he began a lumber business, later known by the firm name of Falvey Bros.

Until his retirement two years ago, he was president of the Iowa Trust and Savings bank here, and was elected to the state legislature in 1933, serving two terms. He was also a member of the Albia board of education and the city council.

Surviving are his wife, Ellen; four sons, Lawrence of Albia, Lieut. John D., of Great Falls, Montana, Francis P. of Davenport, and Paul of Houston, Texas. He also has one brother in Des Moines. Four children died in infancy.

Services were held at St. Mary's church at 9:00 a. m., Monday, with interment in St. Mary's cemetery, with the Humeston Funeral Home in charge. Father Hienen delivered the service.
