# Hughes Hits At Brewster Under Oath

Washington, Aug. 6.—Howard Hughes charged under oath today that Sen. Owen Brewster, R., Me., offered to call off the senate investigation of his war plane contracts if Hughes would agree to an airline merger.

The lanky millionaire industrialist appeared before a senate war investigating subcommittee which is looking into \$40,000,000 worth of airline contracts he got from the government during the war.

Brewster is chairman of the full committee.

A subcommittee headed by Sen. Homer Ferguson, R., Mich., is looking into Hughes' plane contracts adding up to four aircraft and \$40,000,000. An \$18,000,000 wooden flying boat built by Hughes has yet to fly. Of three photo reconnaissance planes constructed under a \$22,000,000 contract, one cracked up, the army has one, and Hughes is testing the third.

## Kept Waiting.

Hughes was kept waiting by the committee while his official party-thriller and entertainer of big-wigs, John W. Meyer, gave further details about his free-spending labors.

The plane maker has accused Brewster of ordering the current investigation to force him to merge his trans-world airlines with Pan American Airways.

Cedar Rapids, Aug. 6.—Charles D. Moore, 67, manager of the All-Iowa fair here since the mid-30s, died in a Cedar Rapids hospital at 4 o'clock this morning. He had undergone a major operation on July 29 for the removal of gallstones. For the last number of years his health had not been good. After appearing to be recovering from the operation, Mr. Moore suffered a relapse yesterday and death resulted.

An active, lifelong democrat, Moore served as Benton county state representative from 1932-34. Prior to that he was prominent in

# Admits Part in Gang Murder

Waurika, Okla., Aug. 6.—Virgil Manning, 28-year-old ex-convict, was held today while authorities checked his story that he put the finger on Benjamin (Bugsy) Siegel bigtime gangster who was rubbed out at Beverly Hills, Cal., June 20.

Manning surrendered yesterday. He claimed he watched the house where Siegel was slain and accompanied the triggerman who killed the gangster as he sat before an open window.

Manning said he remembered only two shots. However, four bullets were fired into Siegel as he sat talking to Allan Smiley, a friend.

Authorities withheld the names of the men who Manning said were the killer and other members of the gang.

## Police Skeptical.

Beverly Hills police were decidedly cautious about believing Manning's story.

Police Chief C. H. Anderson of Beverly Hills said all the other confessions to Siegel's murder had proved phoney.

Manning walked up to a deputy sheriff yesterday and said he wanted to give himself up because he feared for his life as result of his alleged connection with the Siegel slaying.

He claimed he had been offered \$1,500 to watch Siegel and let the killer know when the late gangster was in position as a target. However, he received only \$500 which he spent on a spree in Seattle, Wash.

## Shot Four Times.

Manning said he was shot at four times when he tried to collect the other \$1,000 due him.

Manning said he and the killer had served time together in the Missouri penitentiary.

Subsequently, he claimed, Siegel, the killer and four other gangsters conspired to counterfeit

ering from the operation. Mr. Moore suffered a relapse yesterday and death resulted.

An active, lifelong democrat, Moore served as Benton county state representative from 1932-34. Prior to that he was prominent in county political affairs.

Before going to Cedar Rapids to take charge of the All-Iowa fair, Moore was secretary of the Benton county fair for a number of years. Under his guidance the Benton county exposition flourished.

He was also active in farming operations.

The All-Iowa fair will open Sunday, as planned by Mr. Moore before his death, under the supervision of W. J. Campbell of Jesup, who was named acting manager when Moore went to the hospital. Campbell, too, once served as Benton county's fair secretary.

Mr. Moore was born in Urbana on Aug. 8, 1889, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joe L. Moore. Urbana was his true home throughout his life, though in recent years he had spent a good deal of his time in Cedar Rapids. In September, 1917, he married Birdie Berg at Denison, Ia. One son, Robert, now living in Cedar Rapids, was born to the union.

Deceased is survived by his wife and son, two brothers, Edward Moore of Urbana and Dr. Dudley Moore of Lander, Wyo., and a sister, Blanche Harrison, of Phoenix, Ariz. One sister, Myrile, preceded him in death. Mrs. Harrison arrived here before her brother's death.

Mr. Moore was a member of the Urbana Christian church and the Masonic lodge.

Funeral services will be held at the Turner mortuary in Cedar Rapids at 1:30 p. m. Friday. There will also be brief services at the grave in the Urbana cemetery at 3 p. m. Friday.

# C. D. Moore, Cedar Rapids, Dies

CEDAR RAPIDS, IA.—Charles D. Moore, 67, manager of the All-Iowa fair here, died in a Cedar Rapids hospital at 4 a. m. Wednesday. Mr. Moore had undergone a major operation July 24 and had been reported improving until he suffered a relapse Sunday.

Manager of All-Iowa since it was organized 12 years ago, Mr. Moore earlier had been manager of the Benton county fair at Vinton.

The Moore family home was at Urbana. He had been active in Democratic circles and served two terms as state representative from Benton county in the 1930's.

He also served two years as mayor of Urbana and for more than 10 as secretary of the Benton County Agriculture association.

He had been president of the Iowa Fair Managers association and vice-president of the Eastern Iowa Fair Managers association. Under his management the All-Iowa fair grew from a three-day dairy and junior livestock show to a full-fledged exposition.

His main interests always had centered around farming. He had continued farming during the years he was associated with a life insurance company and during his fair managing career.

W. J. Campbell, Jesup, was named acting manager of the All-Iowa fair when Moore was hospitalized. The fair is scheduled to open Sunday.

MARION GEORGE KELLAM, jurist, died at Des Moines, December 17, 1947; born at Cuba, Kansas, April 22, 1899; received a high school education at Indianola, Iowa; attended the State University of Iowa, and received a bachelor of arts degree in 1922 and law degree in 1924; married to Mildred Belvel, whom he met at the university, at Lineville, June 2, 1923, who survives with two daughters, Patricia, a freshman at the State University of Iowa, and Mary Kathryn at home; began the practice of law at Greenfield, Iowa, in 1924, as partner of F. B. Wilson; served as Adair county attorney from 1927 to 1931, and during World War I served in the S. A. T. C. at Iowa City; appointed a judge February 9, 1944 by Gov. B. B. Hickenlooper, to succeed the late Judge W. S. Cooper; a member of the American Legion, the Masonic order and the Methodist church.

CHARLES D. MOORE, farmer and legislator, died at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, August 6, 1947; born on a farm near Urbana, Benton county, Iowa, August 8, 1879, the son of Joseph L. and Mary E. Moore; engaged in farming and livestock business most of his life, although he taught school for a time, was in the life insurance business, served two terms in the legislature, was mayor of Urbana two years, and later secretary of the Benton county agricultural association, president of the Iowa fair managers association and lastly manager of the All-Iowa fair which he had directed since its inception; graduated from the Urbana high school in 1896 and from Schrader academy two years later, after which he attended Drake university; married in September 1917 to Birdie O. Berg, of Denison, Iowa, and is survived by his wife, a son, George R. Moore of Cedar Rapids; a member of the Christian church, the Masonic order and was a Democrat.

CHARLES EDWARD PAYNE, educator, and author, died at Grinnell, Iowa, November 30, 1947; born in 1879, at Hamilton, Ontario, Canada; came to the United States with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Payne, residing at Terre Haute, Indiana; educated at Indiana State Normal school, the University of Indiana, Harvard university and Oxford, England; after a year as superintendent of schools at Pennville, Indiana, came to Grinnell college in 1907 as a history instructor; became full professor of European history in 1918, and chairman of the history department from 1925 to 1944; taught summer sessions at the State University of


