

day at the home of a daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Zender. He had been critically ill of cancer since last fall and had spent considerable time in Des Moines and Algona hospi-

He had been cared for at the Zender home for the past several weeks. "Chris," as he was always known to friends, was born at Hovedgaard, Denmark on June 21, 1881 and came to this coun-try with his parents at the age

The family settled in the Storm Lake area and he entered the newspaper field in 1906.

#### Edited Many Papers.

During the years, he edited the Lynn Grove Independent, Remsen News, Carroll Times, Marshailtown Marshalltownian, Marcus News, Fenton Reporter and Whitternore Champion.

He was co-editor of the Up per Des Moines here from 1941 until July, 1945, when he pur-chased the Ocheyedan Press, noar Spirit Lake. He returned to Algona in December 1947, and had been employed at the Upper Des Moines until last fall when he became bedfast.

Chris found time for other ac-Chris found time for other activities besides his many newspaper activities, however. He was elected to the State Senate in 1932 and served during 1933 and 1934 and during a special session in 1925. in 1935.

He was appointed to the state highway commission and later served as assistant state printer until 1939.

#### Professional Musician.

Chris was also a professional musician and was past president of the Iowa Federation of Musician's Union. At one time, he had his own orchestra and played for the Marshalltown theatre during

the old silent movie days.

While at Fenton and Whittemore, he directed the bands more, he directed the bands there during the summer vaca-tion months. He was also band instructor at the Ocheyedan high school while there in 1945-1947.

He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, Chalice So-ciety, Moose Lodge, Iowa Press Columnists and Izaac Walton League.

Over the years he was associated with newspapers at Linn Grove, Remsen, Carroll, Marshalltown, Marcus, Fenton, Whittemore and Ocheyedan.

He returned to the Upper Des Moines force in December of 1947.

the site for a large U. S. Air Force radar station has been rumored again during the past few days.

Rumers, ranging from the exact site being already picked to the fact condemnation proceedings have begun, have been under discussion locally. The size of the rumored radar stup has not been estimated, but many persons have it pictured like the huge metal ball station at Waverly, which at present is the only one in Iowa.

Rochleau heard nothing hat ther on the deal, except that they would probably be back sometime in 1957. Instead, they returned last fall, this time set-ting up surveying equipment and taking a more thorough look at the area.

They told Mr Rochleau they had been scouting many other areas as possible sites for some sort of radar set-up, and were heading from here to Minneapolis, then Denver to look over others. According to Rochleau, the men indicated a radar installation might be set up somewhere in the southeast portion of Iowa, but that if there were further interest in a site here, Rochleau would be contacted.

Mr Rochleau was also asked if he would be willing to sell land necessary for the radar station, but no amount of land

station, but no amount of land or price was mentioned.

During the time the men made their survey last fall, many per-sons drove by, stopped, and ask-ed questions of them. The rumors

ed questions of them. The rumors apparently stem from the answers given by the surveyors. Within the past several years, a strip starting in Canada and ending at the Gulf of Mexico, has been set up for close radar scrutiny in the nation's defense setup. This area's eastern edge is approximately along the western edge of Kossuth county, which may have some bearing on the study being made for additional radar sites. One such site is located at Granite Falls, Minn., north and a bit west of Minn., north and a bit west of Algona.

There has been no definite at-tempt to establish such a station here, although the possibility of such an installation remains. Apparently no decision has been

cattle, displaying their livestock many years at state fairs and dairymen's herd meetings; was vice-president of the Belgium Draft Horse Corporation of America and for 38 years had been a member and officer of the organization; also served as president of the Iowa Horse and Mule Breeder's Association, for several terms being its president; was elected and served five terms in the Iowa General assembly as Boone county's representative, first becoming such in 1937; survivors consist of the son, two daughters, two sisters, five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren, the wife having preceded him in death six years previous.

HAROLD LEWIS PIKE, farmer and state fair executive, died at his home in Whiting, Iowa, April 10, 1957; born June 1, 1880, on Pike's farm then known as Whiting Settlement, 3 miles from the present town of that name; moved to the town of Whiting in 1918; farmed in partnership with his brother, Arthur, who died a year ago, and later with an only son, Herbert; elected to the Iowa State Fair board in 1902, upon which he served 54 years; was named in 1903, superintendent of sheep and poultry for the fair; was made superintendent of the fair's cattle department in 1910 and in succeeding years built for the Iowa State Fair one of the best cattle shows in the nation and was elected president of the fair board in 1947; paid special honor by the International Association of Fairs and Expositions in 1950, being named the person performing the longest continuous term of service to a fair of any man in the nation; helped organize in 1910 the Monona County Farm Bureau; a member of the Congregational church, the Sioux City Consistory, Abu Bekr shrine and the Whiting Masonic lodge; made an honorary member last June of the Iowa 4-H girls in recognition of his long service to agriculture; married in 1906 to Edith Whittier, a Whiting school classmate and daughter of a pioneer merchant, and they had celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last year; survivors, in addition to the widow and son, Herbert, are a sister, Mildred Pike, and a brother Robert, both of Sioux City, and two grandchildren.

Chris Reese, newspaperman, legislator and state official died at Algona, Iowa, February 9, 1957; born at Hovedgaard, Denmark, June 21, 1881; came to America with his parents in 1891, and the family settled in Storm Lake, Iowa; received a high school education; was married to Jennie Pearl Rucker at Alta, Iowa, September 14, 1902, and from this union came four children, Marian, James, Creston and Donald; entering newspaper work in 1906, edited the Linn Grove Inde-

the Fortieth, the Fortieth Extra and the Forty-first General Assemblies in the Senate. He was always greatly interested in the farm problems of Iowa and especially concerned with the building and improving of the highways throughout the state.

On June 12, 1899, he was united in marriage to Lola May Early, daughter of Judge D. Carr Early, a pioneer citizen of Sac City. Three children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Perkins: George Early of Bigford, Minnesota, Miriam (Mrs. C. H. Jeglum) of Swarthmore, Pennsylvania. and Eloise (Mrs. Eloise Kibbe) of Sac City.

Mr. Perkins was a member of the Presbyterian Church and held membership in Sac City Blue Lodge of Masons and the Rose Croix Chapter, and Commandery No. 38, Knights Templar.

Death came to Mr. Perkins October 4, 1955, at Sac City.

CHRIS REESE 1957



Chris Reese was born June 21, 1881 at Hovedgaard, Denmark. He came to the United States with his parents in 1891 and settled at Storm Lake. He was in the newspaper business since 1906 and edited the Lynn Grove Independent, Remsen News, Carroll Times, Marshalltown Marshalltownian, Marcus News, Fenton Reporter and the Whittemore Champion. He was co-editor of Upper Des Moines at Algona from 1941 to July, 1945, when he purchased Ocheyedan Press. He returned to Algona in 1947 and since then was with the Upper Des Moines.

Mr. Reese was elected to the Senate in 1932 and served in 1933 and during the special session in 1935. He was named to the State Highway Commission and later was Assistant State Printer until 1939.

Mr. Reese was a professional musician and past president of the Iowa Federation of Musicians Union. He had his own orchestra at one time.

Mr. Reese was a member of the Knights of Columbus, Calicex Society, Moose Lodge, Iowa Press Columnists and the Izaak Walton League.
