Services For E. E. Wieben Held Today

Attorney Edward E. Wieben of Dysart passed away in an Iowa City hospital, April 26, 1954. He was born in Oneda township, Tama county, Iowa, November 20, 1882, the son of Peter C. and Louise (Schultz) Wieben. In 1894, he came to Dysart and has resided here ever since. In 1904, Mr. Wieben graduated from the University of Iowa Law School. He was a member of the State Bar Association and the Lutheran Church in Dysart. He was a former Dysart Mayor, Councilman and City Attorney; a member of the Iowa State Historical society, a former State Representative, a member of the Interim Committee and a long time secretary of the Dysart School Board.

Mr. Wieben is survived by two sons, Edward E. Wieben and Carl P. Wieben; one grandson Edward Ervin; one brother Dr. F. F. Wieben of Keystone; two sisters, Mrs. Anna Lorenzen and Mrs. Emma Willer of Dysart.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. today (Thursday) at the Zion Lutheran Church in Dysart. Mrs. Carl Wuest was organist and accompanied Duane Heller as he sang. Casket bearers were: R. V. Leo, Arnold Wunder, James Wilson, Carl Wuest, Adolph Moeller and Eldon Leo. Interment was in the Dysart Cemetery.

The contract price as accepted is lower than expected as the REA allocated approximately \$120,000 for this purpose. Easements have been secured from the property owners to permit tree clearing which started this week.

Contract for central office equipment has been approved and awarded to The North E. Mfg. Co. for the bid of \$37,000. The REA allocated \$58,000 for this part of the construction. A total of four bids were received on the central office construction and ten bids on the outside construction.

The telephone company is stalling the new dial telephones rather than letting this work proceed under the present contract. Manager Charles [name] has been busy doing wiring in the homes.

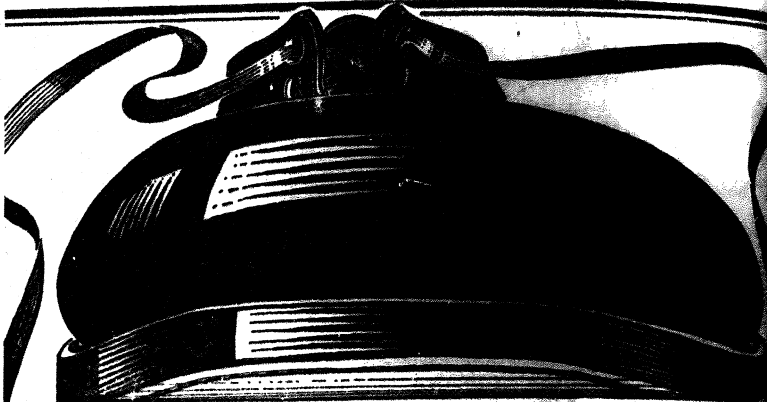

Elizabeth Wylie in Hospital With Right Arm Fracture

A freak windstorm which hit Traer about 2 o'clock Monday afternoon and lasted barely more than a minute or two broke the large plate glass window at the east end of the front showroom of the Moen Motors garage. It is the third time one or more large sections of glass have been broken by wind in this building which is only about six years old. The loss is covered by insurance.

The storm was also the cause of the serious injury of a Traer woman, Elizabeth Wylie, who had been in the yard and just opened a door to enter the house when the wind struck. The door was pulled out of her grasp with such force that she was thrown to the ground, fracturing her right arm near the shoulder. When she was able to get up and into the house she phoned a neighbor for help, and was taken to Allen Memorial hospital where she is still a patient.

During that minute or two, Traer folks were reminded of what they have read about dust storms in the southwest. No rain accompanied the wind in Traer, but there were scattered showers in some areas near town.

The only heavy damage from the wind in the country we have heard of was the destruction of a corn crib on the Gerald Howard farm, northeast of Traer. Two large trees were felled in the area where his employee, Robert Fuller lives, and four trees were taken down where Mr. Howard lives. Many shingles were ripped off the roof of a garage.
