Wiese Rites From Chapel

Death of State Representative Shock to Host Of Friends.

Funeral services for Louis II. Wiese. Scott county representative, who died Friday night at Mercy hospital after a brief illness, will be held at 1 p. m. Tuesday at the Runge chapel. Burial will be in the Allen's Grove cemetery. Members of Trinity Lodge No. 208. A. F. & A. M. will be in charge of the services at the grave.

The death of Mr. Wiese came as a shock to his host of friends. both in business and political circles. He was taken ill a week ago and was removed to the hospital Thursday. Death was due to a kidney ailment. He was 45 years of age.

Born Near Tipton. He was born in Cedar county near Tipton, Dec. 9, 1890, and was educated in the schools of Cedar and Scott county. He also attended Browns' Business college. He was married to Jenuie Leindrud, Nov. 7, 1923, in Minncapolis.

Since 1923 he has lived in Davenport. His residence was at 2138 Harris street. He operated a grocery store at Fourth and Marquette streets for a number of Vears.

He was a member of St. Paul's English Lutheran church, the Benevolent Order of Eagles, the Fraternal Order of Elks, Trinity lodge, No. 208, A. F. & A. M., Mohassan Grotto and the Northwest Turner society and the American Legion. He served with the American army in the World war.

Surviving are his wife, his mother, Mrs. Julia Wiese, Maysville, and a brother, Walter, Lost Nation.

Elected in 1932.

Mr. Wiese was first elected to the state assembly in 1932 and served thruout the 45th session of the legislature and in the special session. Re-elected in 1934 Mr. Wiese was named chairman of the committee on pharmacy. The committee was exceptionally active during the session and accomplished a great deal in clarifying and strengthening laws governing drugs and pharmacists.

Druggists attending their recent convention in Davenport paid high tribute to Mr. Wiese and his work for them. . He was an honored guest at their convention.

He was exceptionally well-liked at the capitol and was held in Republicans alike. His friendship there is no use in your talking.

FOUND GUILTY At 1 Tuesday IN SLAYING OF **IOWA FARMER**

Laborer Awaits Sentence On Verdict of Manslaughter.

Sidney, Ia., Feb. 22. - (AP)-Found guilty of manslaughter in the "kiss slaying" of W. J. Mawhor, Riverton, Ia., farmer, Charles Brown, Phelps City, Mo., laborer, remained in jail here tonight awaiting sentence, March 7.

The jury, which found Brown guilty, received the case at 10:40 a. m. Friday and deliberated all last night before arriving at a verdict early Saturday.

Jurors reported they took 22 ballots, two members, and then one, voting for acquittal.

Brown's attorneys asked District Judge Grover Brown to set appeal bond. He fixed the amount at \$5, 000, but Brown had not supplied it tonight. He has been held in jail since the slaying, Dec. 2.

Contending he shot Mawhor in self defense, Brown testified he went to the farmer's home to ask him to "take care" of his daughter, Ruby Brown, 18. He said the girl told him Mawhor had made advances to her while she was employed as a domestic at the Mawhor home.

Attorneys in their final plea argued whether a "kiss could be worth Mawhor's life."

The house where he was born still stands and is on the farm of Arthur C. Pike east of Whiting.

Tuesday, December 1, 1936 he suffered injuries when he fell in the barn at the country home resulting in three broken ribs, one of the ribs puncturing his lungs and causing infection which was the cause of his death Friday, December 4, 1936.

Funeral services were held on Monday, December 7, at two c'clock in the afternoon at the Whiting family home east of Whiting, with the Rev. Raymond Swisher, pastor of the First Congregational church at Whiting officiating. Interment was made in the Whiting cemetery.

His life span was seventy-nine years. The town of Whiting, Monona county and western Iowa has been made better because Will C. Whiting lived. His memory will go on down to the generations as a man who helped to build and build well this great country of ours. Surviving are his son, Elliott, with whom he made his home during his later years. Four sisters, Mrs. E. M. Cassady of Des Moines; Mrs. Ella M. HONORABLE LOUIS H. WIESE

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public services of the late Honorable Louis H. Wiese, former member of the General Assembly of Iowa, beg leave to submit the following memorial:

Louis H. Wiese was born near Tipton in Cedar county, Iowa, December 9th, 1890. He received his education in the public schools in Cedar and Scott counties and also attended the Brown Business College. On November 7th, 1923, he married Jennie Leindrud in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Mr. Wiese was a member of the Lutheran church, and also belonged to the Fraternal Order of Eagles, the Elks, and the Masons. He was also a member of the Northwest Turner Society and of the American Legion, having served in the army in the World War.

In the early part of his life, Mr. Wiese was engaged in mercantile business. He had lived in Davenport prior to his election to the State Legislature, which election occurred in 1932. He served in the Forty-fifth General Assembly and also the Extra Session, and was re-elected in November, 1934, and served in the session of the Legislature in 1935. He was active in legislation and rendered excellent service to his constituents in Scott county. He was an honest, conscientious man and a gentleman. He gained many friends in his contact with members of the Legislature while serving as a member.

He was especially active in assisting in clarifying laws governing drugs and pharmacists, being chairman of that committee during one of he sessions.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Forty-seventh General Assembly of the State of Iowa, That in the passing of the Honorable Louis H. Wiese, the state has lost an honored and valuable citizen, a man of high ideals in brotherly living and useful citizenship.

HONORABLE FRED W. YEAR

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Fred W. Year, of Osecola county, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

Fred W. Year was born in Prairie Du Chien, Wisconsin, March 26, 1869. When two years of age he moved with his parents to O'Brien county, Iowa. He homesteaded with his father south of Hartley, Iowa. On March 1, 1902, he moved to a farm adjoining Melvin, Iowa, where he lived up to the time of his death, August 16, 1935. During his residence there he contributed to the upbuilding of this community. He was progressive in politics and was always active in the support of the beliefs which he considered right.

He represented Osecola county in the Thirty-ninth General Assembly and for a number of years was the republican county chairman. Always interested in education, he was director of the Melvin Consolidated

attended school but little during his boyhood, as it was necessary for him to labor on the farm. When twenty years old he attended school at Hopkinton, Delaware County, two terms, taught a term of country school, then attended high school three years. In 1881 he removed to southeast of Ireton, Sioux County, where for over thirty years he devoted himself to farming and raising livestock, in which he was highly successful. He was a school director ten years, and school treasurer fifteen years. He was elected representative in 1993, re-elected in 1906, and served in the Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second general assemblies. As citizen and as legislator he was faithful to his trusts. He retired from business in 1909 and removed to Pasadena, California.

Frank Thomas Vasey was born at Taylorsville, Illinois, October 26, 1876, and died in Springfield, Illinois, April 1, 1936. Burial was at Tokio, Missouri. His parents were Dowsland and Elizabeth (Hadley) Vasey. He attended high school at Livergood, Nebraska, received his A. B. degree from the University of Nebraska in 1904, and his A. M. from the State University of Iowa in 1918. He began teaching in rural schools in 1992, was principal of high school in Pawnee City, Nebraska, 1994 to 1996; superintendent of schools of Tarkio, Missouri, 1996 to 1910; of Albia, Iowa, 1910 to 1913; of Charles City, 1913 to 1918; of Mason City, 1918 to 1930; and of Springfield, Illinois, from 1939 until his death. He was president of the Northeast Iowa Teachers' Association in 1916, and of the Iowa State Teachers' Association in 1927. He was held in very high regard as an educator and as a public citizen.

Louis H. Whese was born near Tipton, Iowa, December 9, 1890, and died in Davenport February 21, 1936. Burial was in Allen's Grove Cemetery several miles north of the city of Davenport. His education was acquired in district schools in Cedar and Scott counties, supplemented by two terms in Brown's Business College, Davenport. He served fifteen months in the World War. He was in the grocery business in Davenport for five years, and for several years he was a salesman. In 1932 he was elected representative and was re-elected in 1934, and served in the Forty-fifth, Forty-fifth Extra, and Forty-sixth general assemblies. He was chairman of the Pharmacy Committee in the Forty-sixth. He was highly regarded as a legislator and as a citizen.

HARRY J. Miles was born at Miles, Jackson County, Iowa, September 13, 1869, and died at Miles April 13, 1936. His parents were Forrest and Henrietta Graham Miles. He acquired his education in the grade schools of Miles and in Grinnell College. He spent his entire life in Miles, where he served as mayor four terms. His business was farming and stock raising. In 1916 he was elected representative as a Republican, and was re-elected in 1918, and served in the Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth general assemblies.
