a sister, Mrs. Ike Scott of Farragut.

After completing his schooling
in the rural community in which
he lived he completed his educational
training by graduating from
the college at Quincy, Ill. All of
his lifetime he was a serious student
of current problems, both
national and world wide. He was
an anxious questioner and a constant
seeker for knowledge. He sought
the companionship of leaders
in the social, educational and
religious world to learn from them
the wisdom they had gained by
their study and experiences.

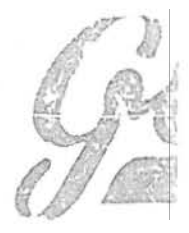
