Former Senator Joseph Frailey Dies Yesterday

Joseph R. Frailey, former state senator and one of the most prominent attorneys of Lee county, died at his home in Fort Madison yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock after an illness of two years.



Born in Fort Madison on March 2, 1876, he was a life-long resident of that city and was graduated from the Fort Madison high school in the class of 1893. He was graduated with a B. A. degree from the University of Iowa in 1898 and received his L.L.B. in 1900.

He was married Oct. 20, 1905, to Genevieve Albright, who survives.

He was employed for a time in the legal department of the A. T. and S. F. railway and later took up the practice of law here. He served as city attorney from 1905 to 1914. He was state senator from 1914 until 1922 and from 1926 until 1934. He also served as a director of Catermole library for 12 years.

During the Spanish American war he served in the 2nd Infantry, Co. F of the 50th Iowa U. S. Volunteers.

He was a member of the Lee county and Iowa Bar associations, the Iowa State Historical society, B. P. O. E. Lodge 374, as past exalted ruler, A. F. and A. M. 440.

Besides the widow he is survived by a sister, Margaret S. Frailey of Fort Madison.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 10:30 a. m. in Clements chapel with the Rev. Russell T. Rauscher officiating. Burial will be in the City cemetery.

Lt. Gov. Robert D. Blue Address at Junior High

Opened yesterday with a flying vice-presidential candidate, the Keokuk got into full swing here next Monday. Lt. Governor Blue delivered a political address at 7:45 o'clock.

Candidate for the governorship now held by Bourke B. Hickenlooper who is himself a candidate for the U. S. senate, Lt. Governor Blue is regarded as one of the ablest speakers of the party in the state and a capacity crowd is expected to hear him present his views on the political situation.

He will arrive in Keokuk Monday afternoon to visit with party leaders and will be entertained at a dinner in the Hotel Iowa by the candidates for county offices.

Born in Eagle Grove on September 24, 1898, Lt. Governor Blue was graduated from the college of law at Drake university in 1922 after he had served during World War I. He has actively engaged in the practice of law since his graduation and in addition operates a 150 acre corn-hog farm near Eagle Grove.

A former city attorney at Eagle Grove, he served as county attorney for Wright county from October 1924, until January of 1931 and was elected to the legislature in 1934, 1936, 1938 and 1940.

Republican floor leader in the 47th and 48th general assemblies, he was speaker of the house in 1941 and in 1942 was elected to the office of lieutenant governor, thus serving as president of the senate for 1943 and 1944.
