Death was sudden and unexpect-Mr. Grell had tended to his farm duties Thursday and had not complained of illness.

A life resident of Scott county, Mr. Grell was born in Allen's Grove township Aug. 19, 1878. He ohtained his education in schools of that community and as a young man embarked on a career of farming, first engaging in stock feeding and dairying and later in saw specializing in manual milling, training supplies and farm machinery repair stock.

Active in civic affairs; he had been a member of the district school board in Donahue and held the office of justice of peace for more than 20 years. He was formerly a member of the Scott county board of supervisors and was also prominent in community social and literary activities.

One of the most widely known farmers in Scott county, Mr. Grell was a charter member of the Farm Bureau and served as county president of Farmers Educational and Co-operative Union of Scott County for five years.
