Played Active Part in Rural Affairs for Many Years.

Christian Grell, former state representative and a leader in Scott county farm activities for many years, died suddenly of a heart attack in his home, two miles north of Donahue, at 12:05 a. m. Friday. He was 63 years of age.

Death was sudden and unexpected. Mr. Grell had tended to his farm duties Thursday and had not complained of illness.

A life resident of Scott county, Mr. Grell was born in Allen's Grove township Aug. 19, 1878. He obtained his education in schools of that community and as a young man embarked on a career of farming, first engaging in stock feeding and dairying and later in saw milling, specializing in manual training supplies and farm machinery repair stock.

Active in civic affairs, he had been a member of the district school board in Donahue and held the office of justice of peace for more than 20 years. He was formerly a member of the Scott county board of supervisors and was also prominent in community social and literary activities.

One of the most widely known farmers in Scott county, Mr. Grell was a charter member of the Farm Bureau and served as county president of Farmers Educational and Co-operative Union of Scott County for five years. He was also a sponsor of the Farmers' Protective Association of Iowa. He was elected to the state legislature in November, 1932, on the Democratic ticket.

He was formerly president of the Scott county Farmers' Union and was one of the organizers of the Farmers' Process Tax Recovery association.

On Feb. 28, 1906, he was married to Miss Alice A. Mohr, who survives together with four daughters, Mrs. Ivan Olson, DeWitt, Ia., Mrs. Wilbert Matzen, Stockton
