- William with his 10 brothers and 2 sisters came with his parents to Iowa in 1866, settling on a farm 3 miles southwest of Ridgway, Iowa. They broke the virgin soil and worked with the ox team and plow.
- In 1872 he moved into Ridgway to go into the drug store owned by his wife's father, Dr. George Ballou.
- He really wasn't a druggist, so he soon established a lumber yard in Ridgway. It grew over the years.

W. H. Klemme, 94, Grand Old Man Of Ridgeway, Dies At His Home

Funeral services for William H. Klemme, 94, former member of the Iowa house and senate, were held at the Ridgeway Methodist church Sunday afternoon, with the pastor, Rev. L. J. Faris officiating. Burial was in the Decoral cemetery.

During the service Clara Gilbertson-Norma Quill and Betty Jean Rue sang, "One Sweet Solemn Thought," "Nearer My God to Thee," and "Abide With Me."

William Henry Klemme was born in Brookville, Indiana, Feb. 17, 1849, and died March 11, 1943, being 94 years and 23 days old. His wife preceded him in death seven years ago in April.

One daughter, Mrs. J. D. Parker of Fayette, Iowa, was his only child. He has three grandchildren, Hugh Klemme Parker of Newark, New Jersey; Mrs. Dorothy Goebel of Fayette and Mrs. Eleanor Parker Fox of New York City. There are four great grandsons. Also surviving are five brothers, Charles Klemme of Manhattan Beach, Cal. of Boulder, Colorado; and Steven Klemme of Dysart, Iowa; and one sister, Mrs. Mary Ferguson of Mason City.

The father and mother of Mr. Klemme were born in Germany, came to America when children. They met in Brookville, Ind., and

were married when 20 and 22 years of age. To this union were born 11 sons and two daughters, William being the second son and oldest one; two other brothers lived to be 92. These sons and daughters all grew to maturity and lived useful lives. His father always was proud of the fact that he had nine grandsons in service in the first world war. It should be mentioned that his father and mother were most devoted church workers and never missed a church service if possible to attend.

To Iowa in 1866

William, with his ten brothers and two sisters came with his parents west from Indiana to Iowa in 1866. They came in a covered wagon and settled on the old farm three miles southwest of Ridgeway. He helped break the virgin soil working long days with ox team and plow. A few years ago he flew over the old farm—a definite contrast to his first mode of travel.

In the fall of 1868 a young woman by the name of Mary Augusta Bolles came to teach school near the farm and boarded with the Klemme family. William went to school to this young lady and a romance developed. They were married March 22, 1870.

In 1872 Mr. Klemme came to Ridgeway to go into a drug store owned by his wife's father, Dr. George Bolles, not being a druggist at heart he soon established a lumber yard in Ridgeway. This lumber yard has grown with the years and is now the oldest lumber yard and was owned by the oldest lumberman between Calmar and Minneapolis. He spent 14 years in the Iowa House of Representatives and Senate at Des Moines and his integrity and honest devotion to the good of his state won him many friends and loyal supporters.

Civic-Minded

He always was interested in home activities, the church, the town hall, school and all organizations which worked for the good of the town and its citizens. He also served in educational work having been a trustee of Upper Iowa University many years. He gave liberally to this institution and al-

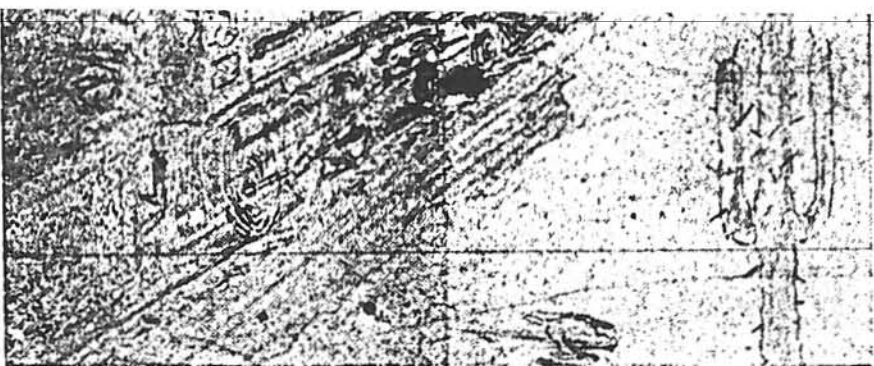
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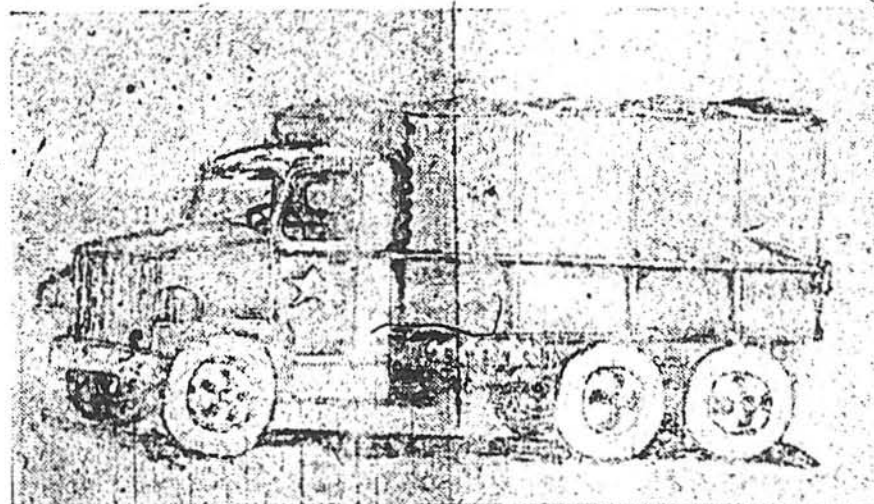
