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## Former Resident Killed In Saw Accident

Greenfield relatives were notified of the death of Donald Mitchell, 29, that occurred at the Gulf Red Cedar Products Co., Stockton, California, when a heavy plank he was sawing "backfired" striking him in the face, breaking his neck and jaw, dying instantly according to deputy county coroner, Hugh Maden. He was working the plank through the saw when it became stuck in some manner. He was sighting along the plank in an effort to determine what was wrong when a scrap piece of wood became lodged in the blade, caught in the plank and threw it back along the table at him resulting in his death.

Donald Mitchell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alva Mitchell of Oakdale, California was born in Grove township, Adair county where he spent his early boyhood days. He had been a resident of Stockton the last five years.

Mrs. Nettie Shreves of Greenfield and John Ellis of California are an aunt and uncle of the deceased. Funeral services were held Saturday, April 3 at 10 a.m. in the Wallace & Son chapel, Stockton.

Mrs. Mitchell is the daughter of Mrs. Maude Morgan, formerly of Oskaloosa, Iowa, now residing in Stockton, California.

## DEATH SUMMONS JOHN McDERMOTT

### Bridgewater Pioneer Dies Friday

John McDermott, 86, Bridgewater business man for 51 years and former state representative from Adair county, died at his home Friday of last week after a brief illness.

John McDermott, son of Henry and Elizabeth McDermott was born in Richmond county, Ohio on February 17, 1857 and passed away at his home in Bridgewater, Iowa on Friday, April 9, 1943 at the age of 86 years, 1 month and 24 days, following a brief illness of a few days having been at work at the lumber office on Saturday, April 3.

During his first year he moved to Iowa with his parents and settled in Benton township, Cass county. After reaching adult age, he began farming on his own account in Cass county. On March 11, 1884 he was united in marriage to Anna E. Marsh. Eight children were born to this union, 8 of whom are living. They remained in Cass county until 1892 and then moved to Bridgewater and he has been engaged in the lumber business here until the time of his death, a period of 51 years. He became a member of the Methodist church in Bridgewater in 1906 and has remained a faithful member, worker and attendant through all the years up to the time of his death, serving as a trustee for the past many years. He was a shareholder of the Union State Bank of Bridgewater and a director of that bank at the time of his death. He was elected Iowa State Representative of Adair county in 1932 and served two terms.

Mrs. McDermott preceded him in death on August 22, 1940. He is survived by three sons and three daughters who are: Burt, Kent and Clayt all of Bridgewater, Mrs. Ethel Love of Bridgewater, Mrs. Verna Arnold of Dallas, Texas and Mrs. Ella Stewart of Elliott, Iowa, one sister, Mrs. John Gallagher of Anita and one brother, Charles McDermott of Denver, Colorado and sixteen grandchildren and other relatives and a host of friends who will miss him greatly as Mr. McDermott was a good neighbor and friend for these many years here.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist church in Bridgewater, Sunday afternoon, April 11 at 3 o'clock. The services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. Ida I. Roberts. The music was furnished by a mixed quartette composed of Mrs. Harvey Gipple and Mrs. Dean Stuva, Mr. Elto Williams and Mr. Leroy Warrior who sang "Rock of Ages," "Saved By Grace" and "Sometime We'll Understand." The accompaniment was played on the piano by Mrs. G. L. Campbell. The pall bearers were Burt, Kent, Clayt and Clarence H. McDermott, H. S. Love and R. B. Stewart. The interment was made in the Massena cemetery.

### Parking

Winter is gone and we can now tell where the curb and sidewalks are. Yet some of us still park where convenient, without regard for the rights of the other fellow.

I do wish to thank everyone for their fine cooperation last year, and hope you do as well this summer.

### Clean Up

Now is a good time to clean up your places, and many are doing so. Complaint has come in about collecting papers and trash in alleys. Such stuff as will burn should be burned on dry still days in a wire pen far enough away from buildings so as not to be a fire hazard.

Especially vigorous has been complaints about burning grass, leaves and other trash in the gutter or ditch at the side of the road or street. This just don't work out. Part of the material never burns, and the ditch fills up with mud. Culverts or drains catch this rubbish, and some one complains because the water flooded their place.

Burn such trash (1) in the unplanted part of your garden, (2) in your own driveway, or (3) haul it to the city dump. Don't rake it in or attempt to burn it in the gutter or street ditch.

### Gardens and Chickens

In some places gardens are being planted and plowed close to the street or sidewalk, so that dirt is dragged into the ditches. Remind your plowman not to do this. You will probably be the first fellow later on to complain that the road never was worked or street cleaned in front of your place, and an overworked commissioner is apt to not be very sympathetic.

We are at war, and there is a shortage of help in town as well as in the country. You won't get as much work on the streets this year as formerly. Don't make needless work for the city street marshal.

People have been encouraged to raise both chickens and gardens to help with the food supply. I don't want to discourage either, but the two don't go well together. If your chickens must have a garden to play in, fix your fences and turn them in your own, but keep them away from the garden of your neighbor. It will keep him much more friendly, and your mayor can figure out a lot of things to do besides helping you herd your chickens. He may be busy with his own.

## MISSIONARY TELLS OF LIFE IN INDIA

### Urges Independence For Country

The industrialization of India was graphically explained by Rev. Halsey Dewey, a missionary in that country for 23 years, at the Greenfield Methodist church, Friday night of last week.

Rev. Dewey told of visiting a town in India 22-years ago, which then had a population of 500 inhabitants. This same town now has a population of 50,000 and contains one of the largest steel mills in that country as well as vast coal and manganese mines. Workers in India are paid 12 to 14 cents per day.

Independence for India is the only solution to the Indian problem, according to the speaker. He believes that if granted independence, India would solve her own internal problems and would eventually bring all of her castes and factions together.

In the matter of education of her masses, India is slipping backward. Big industrialists in the country are striving to keep down the living standards, which if raised would mean that the workers would require higher wages. Their efforts are more than offsetting the system of education sponsored by the British government.

Rev. Dewey knows Ghandi intimately and spent some time at his home studying the great Indian National Society of Iowa Library, Des Moines, Iowa.

For forty years he served as treasurer of the Bridgewater Independent District. He served over twenty years as town councilman. Mr. McDermott became a member of the board of directors of the Union State Bank in Bridgewater at the time of its organization, and was named its first president. In 1932 Adair County honored him by electing him to the office of state representative on the Democratic ticket. He was returned to the office for a second term, thus he served in the 44th, 45th, and 45th extra sessions of the General Assembly. In the passing of Honorable John McDermott, the state has lost a valued and honored citizen.

### ED CAMPBELL

Henry Edward Campbell, "Ed", started barbering in Bridgewater in 1907 in the building known as the Hood Barber Shop.

He was the son of Hezekiah and Clara Campbell. They had come to the Avondale vicinity from Hillsboro, Ohio. He was born March 27, 1878, and grew to manhood there.

He started his barbershop in town in 1907, and married Mrs. Doroty Brigham from Des Moines, who had come to do housekeeping for his grandfather.

She already had two sons, Granville and Samuel, by a former marriage. They lived in the old Chafa place where Edna was born. The family then moved to the rooms behind and above the barber shop. Helen and Robert were born here. All the children, except Robert, started to school in Bridgewater.

In 1919 Ed moved his family to Guthrie Center, where he barbered for two years, then to Sioux City, where he barbered two more years.

Mrs. Campbell died October 4, 1921, while in Sioux City. The family then moved back to the home of his mother and brother, John, in Bridgewater, where they stayed until the children were raised.

Ed worked for Doc Hood for a few years, then had a shop of his own on the north end of the block on the west side of the business street. He later moved to the building north of the lumber yard, and later two buildings north. That building burned in 1932. After it burned, Ed went back to work for Doc Hood and barbered until 1948, when he had a bad car accident that crippled him. He lived with his children until July 13, 1957, when he died at his daughters' home of a heart attack.

In all, Ed barbered about 41 years in and around the Bridgewater area, and also did some

work taking and painting photographs. Ed also made some fiddles.

Ed's children include: Granville Campbell, deceased in 1966 with two children and grandchildren; Samuel A. Campbell and wife live in Dallas, Texas—they have two children and four grandchildren; Mrs. Edna C. Bayman, Asatin, Washington, with two children and six grandchildren; Mrs. Helen Morgan of Massena, with four children and eighteen grandchildren; and Robert L. Campbell of Santa Cruz, California, with three children and two grandchildren.

### THE HISTORY OF SAM LOVE

Harry Samuel Love was born in 1888, and departed this life in 1961, at the age of 72. He was united in marriage with Ethel McDermott, and four



children came to bless this home, namely: Hildreth, Betty, Jean and Larry.

"Sam", as he was known to everyone, had an interest in politics which brough renown the place of his birth. Outside of the 15 years that he served the county, district and state, Sam Love spent the 72 years of his life in the Bridgewater community.

He served his town as a councilman, and began to attend county conventions as a Republican delegate. He became a candidate for state representative, was elected and served from 1934 to 1940. In 1940, he was elected senator from the Adair-Madison district.

He resigned as senator to accept an appointment by Governor Blue to the State Board of Social Welfare, which he served as member, vice-chairman, and then chairman.

Sam was in the produce business in Bridgewater for 37 years, but his main interest was in politics. No honest man makes money in politics. Instead, it calls for financial sacrifice.

Sam Love was not an outstanding orator. For some reason, voters are suspicious of "silver tongues". Folks voted for him because he was honest and sincere. He talked their language and was for economy in government and equity in taxes.

It is our opinion that Sam Love liked politics because it was an avenue through which he could serve his fellowmen. He never courted distinction

#### JOHN McDERMOTT

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the Honorable John McDermott, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

John McDermott was born in Richland county, Ohio, on February 17, 1857, the son of Henry and Elizabeth McDermott, and died at Bridgewater, Iowa, April 9, 1943, at the age of 86 years, 1 month and 22 days.

On March 11, 1884, he was united in marriage to Anna E. Marsh. To this union eight children were born, six of whom survive. Those left to mourn his passing are the three sons: Bert, Kenton and Clayton McDermott all of Bridgewater, and three daughters: Mrs. H. S. Love of Bridgewater, Mrs. Mac Arnold of Dallas, Texas, and Mrs. R. B. Stewart of St. Charles, Iowa. The wife and mother passed away in August, 1940, and two sons, Dallas and Ellis, also preceded him in death. He also leaves one brother, Charles McDermott of Greeley, Colorado, and 16 grandchildren.

During the year 1857 Mr. McDermott's parents moved to Benton Township, Cass County, Iowa. Here he engaged in farming and continued to farm after his marriage until 1892, when the family moved into Bridgewater.



Mr. McDermott lived a long and useful life. Through sound judgment he became one of his community's outstanding business men, at the same time carrying on extensive agricultural interests. At the time of his death he was still active in the management of his lumber and coal business.

He was active in church, civic and political affairs. He was deeply interested in the Methodist Church with which he was affiliated and faithfully attended, serving a great part of the time on the official board. To him was entrusted much of the responsibility of the construction of a new church building. For forty years he served as treasurer of the Bridgewater Independent District. He served over twenty years as town councilman. Mr. McDermott became a member of the board of directors of the Union State Bank in Bridgewater at the time of its organization and was named its first president.

In 1932 Adair county honored Mr. John McDermott by electing him to the office of State Representative on the Democratic ticket and he was returned to the office for a second term, thus he served in the 44th, 45th, and 45th Extra Sessions of the General Assembly.

On October 15, 1923, he was united in marriage to Agnes McEwan Davis, and they were the parents of one daughter, Mary Dallas McIntosh, both of whom survive him.

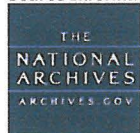
