Senator Myers Dies Following Short Illness

Funeral Services for Prominent Lawyer Were Held Wednesday.

Death Comes at 3:50 O'clock Monday Evening, Following Illness of Uraemic Poisoning.

State Senator O. P. Myers, 76, died Monday evening at 8:50 o'clock at the Skiff Memorial hospital of uraemic poisoning. He had been in failing health during the winter and was taken to the hospital a week ago.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the First Methodist Episcopal church and interment was in the Newton Union cemetery. Dr. L. B. Logan, pastor of the church, was in charge of the rites and was assisted by Dr. W. R. Moore, pastor of the First Presbyterian church. Members of the Jasper County Bar association attended in a body.

Brilliant Career.

A prominent career in the public affairs of the state and community and a marked success in the professional life of Jasper county was brought to a close by the death of Senator Myers. Dean of the Jasper County Bar Association, he was a charter member of the organization and the oldest practicing attorney in the county at the time of his death.

Surviving relatives include his widow; one son, Kenneth of Chicago, Ill., who with his wife arrived this morning; two daughters, Mrs. John Sherk of Ida Grove and Miss Ruth Myers, substitute teacher in the local schools; a brother, Joe Myers, of Brighton, Ia., and a grandson, Kenneth Sherk. Mrs. Sherk and son are convalescing in an Ida Grove hospital and are unable to be in Newton for the services.

Des Moines, March 9 —UP— Memorial services were held in the Iowa senate Tuesday for O. P. Myers, 76, of Newton Jasper county, who died Monday night at his home in Newton.

A committee consisting of Senators White, Carden, and Peterson was appointed by Lt. Gov. Kraschel to prepare memorials and attend the funeral. The chair Myers occupied in the senate chamber will be purchased from the state by a subscription among senators and sent to the Myers family as a memorial.

Senator Myers was elected by the Democratic party to the Iowa Senate in 1930 for a four year term, occupying a place of prominence in the activities of this body. At this last session, he introduced the bill to vote on the "Lame Duck" amendment, under which Iowa's approval of the national amendment was obtained.

At the time of his death, he was serving as chairman of the important ways and means committee of the senate and was also a member of the following other committees: appropriations, constitutional amendments, rules, manufacturing and commerce and trade, reduction of public expenditures and retrenchment and reform.

Previous to his election to the senate, in 1930, he had been nominated for many offices by his party. He received the nomination for District Judge of the Sixth Judicial District in 1910, but was defeated although carrying his home county. In 1914, he was a Democratic candidate for Lieutenant Governor and carried his home district. In 1920, he was a candidate for Congress from the Sixth District and in 1926, he was candidate for State Senator from Jasper county, running nearly 2,000 votes ahead of his ticket. His talent as a speaker was manifested at various meetings over the

Mrs. Burnell, who was active until four months ago, took her first airplane ride on her hundredth birthday anniversary, March 1, 1930. His death was attributed to her advanced age.

Oliver Perry Myers was born July 30, 1856, in Washington county, Iowa, the son of John and Mary (Ward) Myers. He was born on a farm in a log cabin and there grew to maturity, knowing the meaning of hard work in developing a farm from the wild prairie.

He received his primary education in the country schools there, going directly from the rural schools into the sub-freshman class at the State University at Iowa City. Here he made a splendid record in scholarship and was graduated from the institution in 1880. He taught school, worked on the farm and read law at Iowa City, beginning the study of law in earnest in 1882.

A short time after coming to Newton, Mr. Myers was admitted to the bar in 1883. He formed a law partnership with A. M. Harrah on Jan. 1, 1884, which was continued until 1891, in which year Mr. Myers went to South Dakota and lived at Huron until Jan. 10, 1898. While there, he taught school and served as county superintendent.

BOARD OF TRADE SEATS GAIN VALUE

Chicago, March 9.—UP—President Roosevelt's bank plan brought a sharp demand for memberships on the Chicago Board of Trade today. A sale around noon was made of \$5,000, a gain of \$500 over the previous sale. Later a seat changed hands at \$5,000. Since the banking moratorium was declared prices have advanced from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

RAINEY ELECTED SPEAKER OF HOUSE

Washington, March 9.—UP—Representative Henry T. Rainey, dem., Ill., today was elected speaker of the house for the 73rd congress. Rainey's selection was a mere formality ratifying the action of the recent democratic caucus which nominated the veteran. Republican leader Snell of New York was nominated by house republicans for the speakership.

CHINESE COUNTER OFFENSIVE LAUNCHED

Peiping, March 9.—UP—A Chinese counter offensive against the Japanese armies massed along the great walls in Jehol, threatening North China was officially announced today. The statement said 66,000 troops would be thrown into action.

LISTS OF GOLD HOARDERS COMPILED

Washington, March 9.—UP—The federal reserve board today expanded its orders to federal reserve banks in compiling lists of gold hoarders so that the lists might include withdrawals during the past two years. Late yesterday the board instructed reserve banks which presumably relayed the orders to member banks to compile lists of large individual withdrawals of gold since last Feb. 1.

MYERS SERVICES HELD WEDNESDAY IN LOCAL CHURCH

Dr. L. B. Logan Pays High Tribute to Character of Newton Man.

Delegation of Senators, Other State Officers From Des Moines Attend Services; Moore Assists

Paying their last respects to the man they knew and admired, friends and acquaintances of State Senator O. P. Myers gathered in the Methodist Episcopal church here Wednesday afternoon to attend funeral services for the Newton man, who died Monday night at the Skiff Memorial hospital.

Dr. L. B. Logan, pastor of the church, paid high tribute to the character and accomplishments of Senator Myers, taking as his scripture the words of Jesus on Lebanon—"In my father's house are mansions."

Set High Pace

"It is so rarely we have a man of his character and integrity," Dr. Logan declared. "He has set a high pace for any man who may aspire to his seat in the senate, and his going has left a vacant place against the sky not easily filled. There is no room there for anyone of lesser idealism."

Dr. Logan was assisted by Dr. W. R. Moore, pastor of the First Presbyterian church and a next-door neighbor of Senator Myers for many years, paid tribute to the man as a "Christian soldier of the highest type—a truly Christian man in the realistic sense. He was God's man."

Music was furnished by Fred Hough, who sang "My Jesus as Thou Wilt" and "Going Home," accompanied on the organ by Miss Lois Hundling. Pallbearers were E. E. Duer, M. R. Hammer, jr., H. C. Korf, E. M. S. McLaughlin and Ross R. Mowry of Newton and George C. Kipp of Monroe, and flowers were in charge of Mrs. E. E. Duer, Mrs. Arthur Beardshaw, Mrs. W. R. Cooper and Mrs. J. H. Fugard. Interment was in the Newton Union cemetery.




