Paul Ostby, 74, Dies at Kenseit

Rites to Be Friday for Former State Legislator; Twelve Children Survive

Paul I. D. Ostby, 74, died Sunday at 3 p.m. at his home in Kenseit following a stroke Saturday morning on the streets of Kenseit. He did not regain consciousness. Although in rather feeble health in recent months there was no warning of the fatal attack.

Funeral services have been set for Friday at 2:30 p.m. at the Bethany Lutheran church in Kenseit, following rites at the Conner funeral home

in Northwood. Rev. Thor Sigmond, Kenseit, will conduct the services at both places.

Mr. Ostby was the father of 12 children, all of whom are living. They had all visited him some time during the past few months. It is not known at this time just how many of them will be here for the funeral.

Mr. Ostby was a colorful personality. He was active in southern Minnesota politics during the early days of the Farmer-Labor party, at that time living near Emmons. He moved to a farm in Brookfield township west of Kenseit in 1931 and the following year ran for state representative for Worth county on the Democratic ticket.

In the Democratic landslide of that year he was elected by 27 votes, defeating Lewis Horvel, Republican, and Ole Grosland, who was on the independent ticket. He served one term in the legislature. Later he was an unsuccessful candidate for commerce commissioner.

In late years Mr. and Mrs. Ostby had lived in Kenseit after retiring from the farm.

Mr. Ostby was born Oct. 27, 1876, in Austin, Minn., a son of the late Rev. and Mrs. P. G. Ostby.

He is survived by his wife, six sons and six daughters. They are: (Palma), Mrs. Andrew Nygaard of Madison, Sask.; Canada; (Rachel) Mrs. P. E. Gauthier, Brementon, Wisn.; (Pearl) Mrs. L. O. Sgt. Phil Huber Says There's Too Much

Politics in Korea

Praises English, Aussie and Turkish Troops

"There has been so much politics in this Korean war that the G. I.'s doing the fighting have become most disgusted," said Phil Huber in discussing the Korean situation as speaker at the Lions club meeting Monday evening.

"Congressmen are continually writing the generals, and finally even General MacArthur was removed."

Huber, formerly a sergeant with the medical corps attached to an artillery unit in Korea, arrived home last month after seeing some of the bitterest action of the war in Korea for six months.

Sergeant Huber was in Korea in 1946-47-48 with the U. S. occupation forces. He said he thought the United States made a tragic mistake in not training the Koreans in the art of modern warfare at that time. "If we had, we would have saved many lives in the present so-called police action," he said.

Phil said he saw Chinese killed by the hundreds, had walked over scores of Chinese bodies in getting to our wounded men. He paid high tribute to the efficiency of the medical corps. "The wounded are often removed from the field and taken to emergency hospitals within ten minutes,"

he said. Helicopters are used in many cases where the terrain is such that jeeps cannot be used, he mentioned.

High tribute was paid to the British soldiers, also to the French and Australians. "But," said the sergeant, "the Turks are the tightest of all the forces in Korea, with their reckless defiance of death, and it makes no difference whether they're fighting with knives or guns; they just seem to love to fight."

He said the United States has by far the largest number of troops in South Korea, and is furnishing supplies for many troops of other countries. He emphasized the tremendous cost of the war, with the stepped-up use of heavy artillery and hundreds of planes. Considering the number of men we have in action in Korea the casualties are remarkably low, said Huber in conclusion.

Phil was discharged from the service in 1948 but remained in the enlisted reserve. He was recalled to service in the fall of 1950 and went to Korea in January, 1951. He went to Ames Tuesday to enroll at Iowa State college.

Sunny Days Hurry Corn's Maturity

Season's First Frost Reported Sunday Morning

Clear, sunny days have been hurrying the corn and soybean crops toward maturity in Worth county this week, but farmers still were crossing their fingers and hoping for at least 10 days or two weeks of frost-free weather.

County Agent William St. Clair reported today that a small part of the county's corn is already safe from killing frost, but that beans aren't in quite such good shape.

Corn was planted late this year over most of the county—and beans after that. Much early-maturity corn is denting well and out of danger from light frost; however much corn also was planted so late that there never has been much hope of its being usable for other than silage.

Two-Three Ears per Stalk This year there has been a phenomenon in corn growth seldom if ever before experienced in the county. In many fields most of the corn has two or even three ears instead of the usual one.

This has come about, Mr. St. Clair explained, because it has been an ideal growing year due to the large amount of rain.

While this condition means a lot of corn, it also poses a problem—corn of different maturity in the same field. If all such corn is stored together, the green, soft corn might start spoilage. Corn with too much moisture also cannot be sealed under the PMA loan program.

Mr. St. Clair said about the only solution to this problem is for a farmer, when elevating his corn, to have someone standing by the elevator to throw out green ears.

Slight Frost Sunday A slight frost was noted early Sunday morning in low spots in some isolated parts of the county.

Temperature in Northwood was 30 degrees that morning. Frost often forms at temperatures a few degrees above freezing. The slight frost Sunday was not sufficient to have any general effect on crops.

PAUL I. D. OSTBY

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Paul I. D. Ostby, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

The Honorable Paul I. D. Ostby was born October 27, 1876, in Austin, Minnesota, and passed away at Kensett, Iowa, on September 16, 1951, at the age of 74 years. He was the son of the Reverend and Mrs. Paul G. Ostby.

He received a rural school education, and attended St. Ansgar Seminary and Institute in 1892 and 1893.

He was active in southern Minnesota politics during the early days of the Farmer Labor party.

Mr. Ostby was united in marriage to Emma C. Gavle in 1898 and to this union were born six sons and six daughters: Mrs. Andrew Nygaard, Madison Saskatchewan, Canada; Mrs. F. E. Ganther, Bremerton, Washington; Mrs. L. O. Erickson, Hudson, Wisconsin; Mrs. Helmer Bakken, Albert Lea, Minnesota; Mrs. Reuben Stovern, Colorado Springs, Colorado; Mrs. Francis Ryan, Kensett, Iowa; William Ostby, Silverdale, Washington; Eugene of Albert Lea, Minnesota; Roger of Graettinger,

Iowa; Thomas of East Detroit, Michigan; Wallace of Kensett and Otto of Kensett.

He moved to a farm in Brookfield Township, Worth County, Iowa, April 7, 1931. He was elected State Representative from Worth County in the Democratic landslide of 1932, having been a resident of the State of Iowa but one year and seven months on the day of election. Mr. Ostby was a Democrat in politics. He served in the Forty-fifth and Forty-fifth Extra sessions of the House of Representatives. Later, he was an unsuccessful candidate for commerce commissioner.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Paul I. D. Ostby, and twelve children.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fifty-fifth General Assembly of Iowa, That in the passing of the Honorable Paul I. D. Ostby, the State has lost a valued and honored citizen, and the House would tender its sincere sympathy to the surviving members of his family in their sorrow.

HENRY B. OWENS

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Henry B. Owens, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Henry B. Owens was born on March 9, 1874, at Missouri Valley, Iowa. He was the son of Elias and Catherine Owens, early settlers of Harrison County. He passed away at his home in Logan, Iowa, August 16, 1951, at the age of 77 years.

He received his education in the rural schools of Harrison County and at Woodbine Normal School, Woodbine, Iowa.
