Tax Credits or Mahaska \$200.00

homestead Mahaska county owners are slated to receive tax credit totaling approximately \$204,000 on their 1949 bill Auditor Roy E. Hinkle said today.

This is almost \$17,000 more than was credited on 1948 taxes under the homestead law which bases exemption on 25 mills of the total homestead valuation as approved by supervisors and certified to the State Tax commis-Supervisors only recently completed their check of applica-

Hinkle said that 4,904 applications for homestead exemption have been approved this year on erty carrying a valuation of \$0.157,717 for exemption purposes.

On 25 Mill Basis

Tax credit is figured on a 25 mill basis on all approved homesteads up to a maximum of \$2,500. No credit is allowed on valuation in excess of that figure. Counties are reimbursed for the amount or exemption from state funds.

Following the trend since the homestead law became effective, both the number of applications and valuation has set a new record this year. Applications are 128 more than the 4,776 approved a year ago while the exemption valuation exceeds that of 1948 by more than \$600,000. A year ago the exemption was based on total valuation of \$7,549,171.00.



Fresh Endorsement

Party leaders from 16 midwestern states gave the plan a fresh endorsement as a double-edged answer to farm supplies and the party's chances for victory in the 1950 congressional elections.

They acted after Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan, author of the plan, assured the conference that "a great deal of progress" has been made in winning public support for the program which "promises cheaper food and farmer prosperity."

The conference is composed of the midwest democratic committeemen and state party chairmen who originally endorsed the plan at a party rally at Des Moines, Ia., last June.

Majority Of Farmers For Plan


Although congress has coldshouldered the plan, Brannan said newspaper polls show that a majority of the farmers who understand the plan favor it. He agreed with the party leaders that a "real selling job" must be done to explain the plan to those who now "don't know enough about it to express an opinion."

The Brannan plan would let market prices fall to "give consumers a break," and the government would send out "production payment" checks to farmers to hold farm income up. Brannan said no one has come up yet with any other "real suggestion" for providing a reasonable return to farmers and reasonable consumer
