

Geo. Stanzel Dies at Home This Morning

Former Representative Had Been Ill For Months.

George C. Stanzel, well known Sac county farm owner and former state representative, died at his home on South Ninth street in Sac City at 4:30 on Thursday morning of this week.

Mr. Stanzel had been in poor health for some time and had suffered severely with a cancer for the past six months. He had been bedfast two months prior to his death. He spent some time at a hospital at Rochester, Minn.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist church in Sac City next Saturday afternoon at 2:30.
Was 69 Years Old.

Mr. Stanzel attained the age of 69 years. He was born August 31, 1865, in Clinton county, Iowa. On March 1, 1876, he moved with his parents to Sac county, and during the past half century has been actively connected with the life of the county.

The decedent was married to Miss Carrie Fulcher on Feb. 19, 1894, and has three children. Mrs. Stanzel's mother died on Sunday of this week, so the home has suffered a double bereavement within a few days.

Mr. Stanzel's interests have been primarily those of farming and although he retired from active farm work a number of years ago, he owns considerable Sac county land and gave it his individual attention.

Representative Two Terms.

In the fall of 1930 Mr. Stanzel was elected state representative from Sac county, and was reelected in 1932. Naturally of a retiring disposition, his voice was not often heard in the legislative halls, but he gave Sac county fine legislative service, guided by a sincere honesty of conviction as to what he considered best for the interests of all the people.

Prior to his election to the legislature Mr. Stanzel served as councilman in Sac City. He also had served as a bank director, president of the Early Farmers Telephone Co., and director of the Early Farmers Elevator Co.

A more complete obituary and account of the funeral services will be printed in the Sun next week, compiled by volunteers and staff at the State Historical Society of Iowa Library, Des Moines, Iowa.

Farmer Found Dead in His Field

Harry Shadle is Stricken While at Work in Cedar Township.

News of the death of Harry Shadle, 53, well known resident in Cedar township, came as a great shock to numerous relatives and friends last Saturday morning.

Mr. Shadle was in his usual health that morning and had gone about his work, going to the field to disc. Early in the day, his son, John, noticed the team standing alone in his field and went to investigate, finding his father dead, lying a short distance from the disc.

He apparently became ill while at his work and had left the disc with the intentions of lying down when he was taken with apoplexy and died immediately.

The librarian's report shows that borrowers' cards are now outstanding to the number of 1081. Of these 1704 live in Sac City and 274 in the country. The past year 205 new city borrowers and 84 new rural borrowers were added to the list, a decided increase in percentage of those from the country who make use of the library.

The library received from the city tax levy almost \$2,200. A little over \$1000 was spent the past year for new books, while the salaries of librarian, assistant and janitor amounted to \$1,366.30. The library has a balance of \$685.59 on hand at the close of the fiscal year. Hundreds Pay Honor To Memory of Former Representative.

The pastor, Rev. Corwin Taylor, preached the sermon. Music was provided by Mrs. Ray Deibert, Mrs. P. A. Lauterbach, R. M. Wilson and Elmer Irwin. Pall-bearers were Ray Deibert, F. C. Hoyt, Sam Hawks, H. E. Colburn, J. C. Weltzel, and Chas. H. Smith. Burial followed at the Clinton township cemetery.

George C. Stanzel, a son of William A. and Laurinda Clark Stanzel, was born in Berlin township, Clinton county Iowa, August 31, 1865. His parents passed to their reward in 1911 and 1921 respectively.

The family moved from Berlin township to a farm near Elwood, Iowa, when the deceased was nine years old. A year later they moved to Sac county. Mr. Stanzel grew to manhood on a farm in Clinton township.

January 2, 1935, he returned to Rochester for another operation which proved unsuccessful. His last nine months were spent in intense suffering from which he was released at 4:30 Thursday morning, April 18, 1935.

Besides his wife and three children he leaves to mourn his passing ten grandchildren, three brothers and three sisters. One brother and two half brothers preceded him in death.

of the committee. He was on February 19, 1914, named by President Wilson as United States marshal for the Northern District of Iowa. Opposition to the selection prevented confirmation by the Senate for a time, but it was finally made June 19, 1914. He administered the duties of that office until in 1919. Soon after retiring he removed to Miami, Florida, where he became interested in real estate.

DAVID MEREDITH was born on a farm near where now is located the town of Searsboro, Poweshiek County, Iowa, April 13, 1867, and died in a hospital in Oskaloosa April 18, 1935, death resulting from a fall from a windmill on his farm near Lynnville two days before. Burial was in Friends Cemetery, Lynnville. His parents were T. Jefferson Meredith and Susanna Macy Meredith. In 1881 the family removed to a farm in Jasper County, near Lynnville. He was graduated from the Lynnville High School in 1887, and attended Penn College, Oskaloosa, one year. He then took charge of his father's farm and livestock business, and during his life farming was his principal occupation. He spent most of his time for a few years at Whittier, California, in his later life where he and his son, Robert D. Meredith, were engaged in the apiary business, although he retained the management of his farm near Lynnville. He held the office of township trustee, and member of the Lynnville Town Council. In 1912 he was elected representative from Jasper County, and was again elected in 1916, serving in the Thirty-fifth and Thirty-seventh general assemblies. In 1918 he was elected senator and served in the Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth general assemblies. He was a birthright member of the Society of Friends and took an active and useful part in its affairs.

GEORGE C. STANZEL was born in Berlin Township, Clinton County, Iowa, August 31, 1865, and died in Sac City April 18, 1935. Burial was in Clinton Township Cemetery. He was with his parents, William A. and Laurinda Clark Stanzel, in their removal to a farm in Clinton Township, Sac County, in 1876. There he grew to manhood, was educated in public schools, became a farmer, and during most of his life farming was his chief vocation. His farming activities were first in Clinton Township and then in Boyer Valley Township. He served as president of the Early Farmers Telephone Company, and was a director in the Early Farmers Elevator Company. In 1919 he removed to Sac City, was a member of the city council eight years, and in 1930 was elected representative and was re-elected in 1932, serving in the Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth general assemblies.

J. K. MONTGOMERY was born near Sandy Lake, Pennsylvania, December 20, 1840, and died in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, February 18, 1935, at the home of his son, the Rev. W. A. Montgomery. Burial was at West Union. He was with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Montgomery, in their removal to near Colesburg, Delaware County, Iowa,

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public services of the late George C. Stanzel, of Sac county, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

George C. Stanzel was born in Clinton county, Iowa, on August 31, 1865. He moved to Sac county with his parents in the year 1876 and was educated in the public schools of that county. He passed away at his home in Sac City on April 18, 1935, after a lingering illness of several months.

He was united in marriage on February 19, 1894, to Miss Carrie Fulcher, who with their three children, Mrs. Florence M. Laudon, George A. Stanzel, and Fred E. Stanzel, mourn the death of their beloved husband and father.

Mr. Stanzel's interests have been primarily those of farming and although he retired from active farm work a number of years ago, he owns considerable Sac county land and gave it his individual attention.

In politics Mr. Stanzel was a republican and served as representative from Sac county in the Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth General Assemblies and in the Forty-fifth Extra Session. He also served as treasurer of the school board of Sac City, was a member of the city council, and a member of the K. P. Lodge.

Mr. Stanzel took an active interest in community affairs and held the highest regard and esteem of his fellowmen. He was a faithful public servant, always giving the best he had for the good of the greatest number of people. He was a kind and loving husband and father, devoted to making the home life as comfortable and as happy as possible for those dependent upon him. He was an attendant of the Methodist church and gave of his time and substance unstintingly.

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public services of the late Honorable Otto Starzinger of Polk county, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

Otto Starzinger was born in Des Moines, Iowa, April 25, 1881. He was graduated from East High School in 1900 and from the Iowa State College at Ames in 1904. He was associated with the General Electric Company for several years and was general manager of the Hotel Northwestern from 1908 until the time of his death March 12, 1935.

He was a prominent athlete at East High School and also at Ames. He was a good scholar, holding degrees in both electrical and mechanical engineering. Being trustworthy and unselfish, he had a host of friends in all walks of life.
