

FOR SIX TERMS SUDDEN DEATH OF J. H. AIKEN SHOCKS

Served Sin Terms in Legislature and 15 Years on School Board

Few tragedies in recent years have so stirred Ida county as the untimely death Tuesday morning, January 14 of John H. Aiken, six times representative from Ida county in the General Assembly and a member of a genuine Ida county pioneer family.

Mr. Aiken's body was found hanging in the second story of the Pilcher garage and implement building, about 7:30 a.m. The discovery was made by Ralph Pilcher, an employe, whose work took him

early to that part of the building. John H. Aiken, one of the five sons of Benjamin Franklin and Patience Williams Aiken, was born at Iowa City, Iowa, March 27, 1875 and was in his sixty-first year. The parents came of a long line of American descent originating in Vermont. The family came to the valley of Soldier river in 1876 and were pioneers in that portion of Ida county.—One of the early be-reavements sustained by the family was the loss of a fifteen year old brother of John's in October 1879. A prairie fire swept over the Soldier valley and in the effort to save some stock, the lad was cut off by the flames and perished.

John Aiken grew to manhood on the extensive Aiken farm proper-ties in Grant township and re-mained on the place after his parents moved to town. The father died in 1900 and the mother three

years later.

judgment in the solution of school problems. He was a member of the board during the superintendency of Ray Latham, now president of Iowa State Teachers college. Mr. Latham said that Mr. Aiken was one of the best posted and efficient board members, he had ever served under.

In 1920 he was elected as Ida county's representative to the Iowa General Assembly and was reelected five times, quitting office January 1, 1932. During that period, he attended six regular and two extraordinary sessions of the legislature. He was conservative in his views and a brake against the enaction of hasty, ill-advised and half baked legislation. He opposed with all his might the centralization of political power in Des Moines and Washington, feeling that it rightfully belonged within the jurisdiction of the common people who gave it.

He was appointed assessor of Ida Grove city more than a year as and discharged these duties in 1935 and had been sworn in for similar service only last week. In this work

he was thorough and conscientious. Mr. Aiken was a man of intelligence and understanding. He was a very interesting conversationalist and a great reader. He was prepared to defend his convictions with courage. He was tender and loving to his family, and considered it a privilege to serve them unselfishly

Mr. Aiken was a member of the Masonic order, of the Eastern Star and a charter member of Sioux City Consistory of 32nd degree Masons.

His funeral will be held this Thursday afternoon, with brief services at the home at one thirty and public services in the Metho dist church in charge of Rev. G. W. Dunn at two o'clock. The Masonie order will have charge of the burial.
