

J. F. BABCOCK.—Representative from Chickasaw county, was born October 19, 1875, at New Hampton, Chickasaw county, Iowa, and has lived there continuously. He was educated in the public schools, State Teachers College and Wormley Business College of New Hampton, Iowa. He is the owner of a large dairy farm which he operated himself for a greater part of his life and which he now rents on shares. He is a member of the local board of education, secretary of the New Hampton Farmers Creamery; belongs to the Methodist Episcopal church, Masonic lodge, Odd Fellow lodge, and M. W. A. Democrat in politics.

J. PARK BAIR .-- Representative from Buena Vista county, Iowa, was born March 17, 1864, in Perry county, Pennsylvania. When he was one year old he moved with his parents to Gerardston, Berkly county, West Virginia. When six years old, his parents moved to Bedford, Indiana. He received his education in the county schools and southern Indiana Normal school at Mitchell, Indiana. When twentyone years old he went to Arcola, Illinois, where he was married to Clara Belle Louthan. To them were born four children, two girls and two boys. The oldest boy died when seven years old. For sixteen years the family lived on a farm in Arcola, coming to Storm Lake, Iowa, March 1st, 1901, where he purchased a farm of 320 acres and lived on it one year. For the past thirty years he has lived in Storm Lake. For fifteen years he was engaged in buying and shipping live stock. For the past fifteen years he has farmed eighty acres of land, which wowns within and adjoining the city of Storm Lake. He has served as township trustee, school director sixteen years, city councilman of Storm Lake, and member of the Buena Vista county board of supervisors ten years. A member of the Storm Lake cham-ber of commerce, the Masonic order, A. F. & A. M., and the Royal Arch Chapter, the Eastern Star, K.-P. lodge, M. W. A., R. N. A., and a member and ruling elder in the Presbyterian church Was elected representative from Buena Vista county in 1926, in 1928, and again in 1930.

HOWARD BALLEW.—Representative from Appanoose county, was born on a farm near Moulton, Iowa, February 19, 1892. Graduate of the Moulton schools and of Iowa Wesleyan College, completing his college course May 8, 1918. Married Edna Richardson December 22, 1917. Served in the World war. Engaged in farming. Was farm bureau director the years 1926, 1927 and 1928. Member of the fortythird and forty-fourth general assemblies. A republican in politics.

F. H. BEATH.—Representative from Adams county, was born on a farm near Nodaway, Adams county, Iowa, February 17, 1872, and since 1875 has lived on the farm where he now resides. Received his education in the rural schools of his community. On January 15, 1896, was married to Nellie Cramer. Served as township assessor two years; president of the school board ten years; township trustee seven years. Is charter member of the Adams county farm bureau, serving as president four years. Is chairman of boys' 4-R club, and is also a member of local shipping association. Was chosen master farmer in 1927. Is republican in politics.

H. S. BERRY.—Representative from Monroe county, was born on a farm in Wapello county, Iowa, July 22, 1857, moving with his parents to Monroe county in 1865. Received his education in the country schools; taught school four years; served as member of the board of supervisors six years; served as mayor of the city of Albia eight years. Is married and has three children. His occupation is that of a farmer and live stock dealer. Elected representative in 1920, re-elected in 1922, 1924, 1926, 1928, and 1930. A republican.

A. H. BONNSTETTER.—Representative from the eighty-fifth district, Kossuth county, was born on a farm near West Bend, Iowa, November 20th, 1892. He was educated in the schools of this locality and took a two year normal course at Highland Park college. He taught in the public schools of Iowa three years and completed four years of work at Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Indiana. In August, 1919, he was married to Miss Charlotte Anderegg. They have one son, Rex. About the time of his marriage Mr. Bonnstetter went back to farming. He
