Recent Deaths Here and Elsewhere That Will Interest Marion County People.

Wm. Alexander Clark, son Daniel and Nancy Clark, was born near Gallipolis, O., April 22, 1867, and died at the home of his daugh-

ter, Mrs. H. H. Phillips, near Pleasantville, Friday, November 1, 1946, at the age of 79 years, 6 months and 9 days. He moved to Marion county in 1886. After spending several years in the mercantile business, he was elected deputy county auditor and served capably in this office in 1895 and 18966.

He was joined in marriage Edna McQuerry, February 2, 1890, in Pleasantville. Three were born to them, McQuerry, Callie and a daughter who only lived a few hours.

The deceased moved to a farm east of Pleasantville in 1900 and spent twenty years as a farmer. He had lived in Iowa for fifty years and in Marion county forty-eight.

He was 'treasurer of Marion county from 1921 to 1925 and took the oath of office as state senator her from the fifteenth district, January 12, 1925. In this office he gave much time and effort toward serving beneficial legislation, some of it for his own secton of the state Mar and some for the benefit of Iowa she as a whole, such as his tax payment method bill. He worked hard and constantly in the interest of livin better roads for this part of the the. state, and was always greatly con- mai cerned as to legislation that would benefit the farmers and improve the school system.

Mr. Clark was not a mere politician. Always a republican, he had devoted friends and supporters in both parties, and proved himself. a true public servant. He took an active part in promoting the welfare of his community and always stood for the things that were just and fair. Never doing things by halves, he invariably put his very best into every task.

His active life came to an end seven years ago when his illness began, but he continued to retain an active interest in public affairs and was blessed with a keen mind to the very last. Four years of constant weakness with much suffering was his to bear, but he kept his cheerful happy disposition.

The deceased was one of a family of six children. One brother and four sisters preceded him in death. His wife died in 1928. He became a member of the Methodist church in Ohio during his early years.

Mr. Clark is survived by his daughter. Callie, Mrs. Harrison Phillips, who cared for him during his long illness, a devoted son-in-law, two indchildren, Carroll and Berniel, whom he always loved as his own children, and was loved by them in return.
