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# Prochaska Pens Five-Year Plan For Safety Dept.

Five years' worth of growth for the public safety department was outlined to the city council Monday by Commissioner E. A. Prochaska.

He listed construction of two fire stations, a traffic signal synchronization move, provision of more offstreet parking and interior changes at the police station as the most important projects on tap.

Monday's move followed up a request last month by Mayor Milo Sedlacek that all department heads submit a "five-year plan" of necessary city work.

Prochaska's was the first to result. It listed mainly a series of steps for expansion of personnel and facilities in the police, fire, building inspection, parking and traffic study fields.

Along with the items he singled out for top attention was a proposal to consolidate the various building inspection services under one head and to modernize the building code.

No estimate of cost for the various projects accompanied the public safety blueprint.

Prochaska said only that it was compiled "according to the limited allowance under the budget laws of Iowa, which limit the amount of money allowed to various city departments."

There was no step-by-step timetable, either, for the action suggested by Prochaska for a period carrying from 1955 through 1959.

Outlined in general terms without specific data as to execution, the over-all plan included these five-year proposals for each of the departments under Prochaska's jurisdiction:

### POLICE.

1. Obtain more manpower, especially for the traffic and juvenile bureaus but also in the patrol and detective divisions. Increase the number of vehicles too.

## Retired Attorney C. F. Clark Dead At St. Petersburg

C. F. Clark, 510 Knollwood drive SE, a veteran Cedar Rapids lawyer and legislator, died at 11 a.m. Sunday in St. Anthony's hospital, St. Petersburg, Fla. He was 83.

Mr. Clark served in the Iowa house of representatives from 1919 to 1925 and in the Iowa senate from 1922 to 1932. He was chairman of the house judiciary committee for three sessions and served one session as chairman of the joint legislation committee on taxation.

He was defeated as a candidate for lieutenant governor in 1932. Mr. Clark was a Republican.

Survivors are a son, Herbert F. Clark of Nashville, Tenn., and a brother, David F. Clark of Twin Falls, Idaho.

Services will be held in the Turner chapel at a time to be announced later.

Born in Belle Plaine, Aug. 13, 1871, he was educated in Cedar Rapids schools. He received a B. A. degree from Coe college in 1891 and a Bachelor of Law degree from the University of Iowa in 1894.

He was married to Elizabeth A. Besler, Nov. 29, 1900, in Cedar Rapids. Mrs. Clark died in 1952. From 1894 to 1921 he was a partner with his father, Frank G. Clark, in the law firm of Clark and Clark in the Dows building in Cedar Rapids.

Until his death, Mr. Clark was a member of the Coe college board of trustees and a director of the Morris Plan. He had also served as secretary of the Coe

## Lamont Robbery Linked to Holdup In Minneapolis

LAMONT (AP) — A possible link with a Minneapolis holdup was seen Monday as authorities continued their investigation of the \$3,000 armed robbery of the Lamont bank.

The Lamont office of the Farmers State Savings bank Independence was robbed by an unmasked gunman who entered the place at 1:45 p.m. Friday and locked nine persons in the vault as he departed.

An Oelwein man, F. Michaels, called the attention of Buchanan county officers and the FBI to a description of a similar holdup of a Minneapolis bar 1:05 a.m. Friday.

The description of the Minneapolis bandit was similar to that of the Lamont gunman. He herded patrons of the bar into a cellar before fleeing. In both holdups, the bandit's first action on entering the place was to ask if he could cash a check. And in each instance, the holdup man used vulgar language.

The Lamont bandit is reported to have had chipped and dirtied fingernails, suggesting that he also works as a mechanic or some similar job.

2. Expand the fire alarm system for better coverage of schools, factories and business places.

3. Remodel and improve older fire stations and improve the department's personnel.

4. Buy sites for future fire sta-

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Until his death, Mr. Clark was a member of the Coe college board of trustees and a director of the Morris Plan. He had also served as secretary of the Coe board.

He was a member of the original YMCA board of directors, was once president of the association and helped organize a student YMCA on the University of Iowa campus.

He also served as president of the Linn County Bar Association, director of the Chamber of Commerce, trustee of the First Congregational church and secretary and chairman of the Linn county Republican committee.

During the last 20 years he was active with the Pioneer Lawmakers Association of Iowa, an organization of former legislators. He was chairman of a committee to search war records for the names of Iowa lawyers who lost their lives in war.

He was also affiliated with the Iowa and American Bar Association; Knights of Pythias as a 50-year member; Crescent lodge, No. 263, A.F. and A.M.; Scottish Rite, and Knights Templar.
