George C. Figgins, Former Legislator From County, Dies

Well-Known Creston Man Dies Today At Age of 82

George C. Figgins, 82, former
state representative from Union
county and for many years a jus-
tice of the peace and insurance and
real estate dealer in Creston, died
early today.

Mr. Figgins died about 8:30 a. m.
at the Dory nursing home, 208
North Jarvis street, where he had
been a patient for about three
months. He had suffered a stroke
three weeks ago.

Funeral arrangements have not
been made and will be announced
later. His body will be at McGre-
gor Brothers and Coens funeral
home.

George C. Figgins was born in
Montgomery county, Ia., October
17, 1868. He was the son of Daniel
and Rebecca Lane Figgins. He
spent his boyhood in that county
and later resided for a time in Ad-
ams county, before moving to Un-
ion county in 1886. He had resid-
ed in Union county and Creston
since that time.

He had attended public schools
in the counties where he lived
and graduated from the Afton Nor-
mal and Business college in 1892.
He taught school in Union county
for a short time.

He was married, August 9, 1893,
at Afton to Gelia M. Fluckey.
They purchased a Union coun-
ty farm where they resided for a
number of years. In 1922 he was
elected clerk of the Union county
district court and filled that office
for two terms. He filled numer-

the 43rd and 44th general assem-

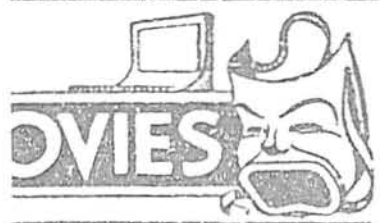

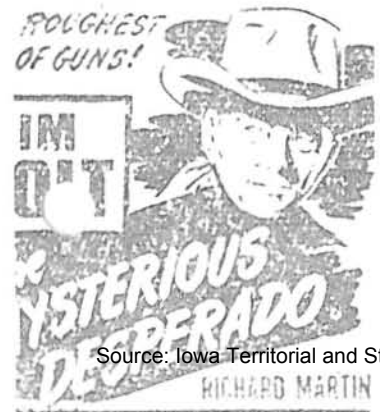

Since leaving the legislature he had operated a real estate and insurance business in Creston and served as justice of the peace for many years. He retired from the office and from business on January 1, 1949.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Gelia H. Figgins, who is in ill health and is a patient at the Dory nursing home here; two brothers, William of near Afton and Alfred of Knoxville, Ia.; and three sisters, Mrs. Nellie Taylor of Diagonal, Mrs. Jessie Canfield of Shannon City and Mrs. Jane Smith of Afton.

The killing was an apparent case of what psychologists call sibling rivalry — rivalry between offspring of the same parents—said Sheriff J. W. Ripperdan. The twins were not identical.

Eymann quoted Alice:

"I hated her for a long time and had it in the back of my mind to do it.

"Stupid and Loud"

"I hated her because she was stupid and loud and always acting like a nut. I learned to hate her when we were in the sixth grade and ever since then this has built up."

A quarrel Saturday evening over use of a telephone brought her antagonism to a boil.

But my brother, Edgar, 16, held Sally so Alice could use the phone.

Alice screamed, "I'm going to kill you and I'm going to do it with a gun."

Iowa Student is One of Winners of Rotary Fellowship

One of Iowa's students has been named to receive a Rotary Foundation fellowship for overseas study from Rotary International headquarters. He is David Crosby Garfield, son of Judge and Mrs. Theodore G. Garfield, of Ames, and is a senior in Iowa State college, where he graduates this June. His father is one of the judges on the Iowa Supreme bench, and is a frequent visitor in Creston. He is a son-in-law of Mrs. E. C. Keith of Burlington and Creston. The Creston Rotary club is one of the supporters of the Rotary Foundation, having subscribed a year ago 100 per cent toward financing it.

The awards were made by a committee of Rotarians from Chile, England and the United States, meeting at Rotary headquarters in Chicago. 85 fellowships are granted to outstanding students of 25 countries. Garfield, who was recommended by the Rotary club of Ames, plans to study economics in Great Britain. He has majored in economics in the college at Ames.

This program of fellowships was started in 1947, as a memorial to the late Paul Harris who founded the first Rotary club in Chicago, 45 years ago. The grants range from \$1800 to \$3400 apiece.
