Family Returns

Y, Australia (P) — The royal family left by London Sunday at the air nine-week tour of New Zealand, Tonga

North Vietnamese troops, informed sources reported.

And a North Vietnamese-Viet Cong force seized a key river crossing from Cambodian forces 37 miles southeast of Phnom Penh, the nation's capital.

In South Vietnam, enemy forces launched widespread attacks, the heaviest in a month.

The fighting inside South Vietnam was sharpest in the town of Hiep Duc, 35 miles southwest of Da Nang.

There, allied forces battled hard to drive out remnants of a North Vietnamese regiment that occupied part of the town Thursday.

Allied commanders, at the risk of higher casualties among their own men, barred the use of artillery and air strikes in hopes of saving the town from destruction.

Associated Press correspondent Peter Arnett, with the allied task force thrusting into the Fishhook, reported a major battle appeared shaping up for Mimot.

American armor and infantry moved to the edge of the rubber plantations less than two miles east of Mimot along Highway 7.

The informants in Saigon said the Air Force planes bombed out the main rubber factory in Mimot, a key town in the Fishhook where U.S. and South Vietnamese troops crossed into Cambodia on Friday seeking to destroy Communist command headquarters.

Ex-Judge, Legislator Dies at 79

Linus Bernadotte Forsling, 79, Anthon, a former District Court judge and state legislator, died Saturday at his home. Funeral services will be at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday at the United Methodist Church in Anthon. The Rev. Donald Harbour will officiate. Burial will be in St. Joseph Cemetery at Anthon under the direction of Walter Funeral Home.

Masonic rites will be conducted at 8 o'clock tonight at the funeral home.

Mr. Forsling served as a district judge for Woodbury and Monona Counties from 1940 to 1958, and prior to that was a member of the Iowa House of Representatives and the Iowa Senate.

He was born March 23, 1891, at Sioux City, attended Sioux City schools and was graduated from Cumberland University in Tennessee. He began practicing law in 1915 at Sioux City and was Municipal Court Judge until entering the Iowa House in 1920.

He served in the lower house from Woodbury County until 1930, and was state senator

 The allied task force of 8,000 American and 2,000 South Vietnamese troops doubled its area of operations in an attempt to block an escape northward by the 1,000-4,000 North Vietnamese troops believed in the region.
 Armet reported that the U.S. troops established a third artillery base called North, inside Cambodia.
 It is about 18 miles north of the point on the South Vietnamese border where the offensive was launched last Friday on orders from President Nixon. The new base straddles Highway 7.
 The allied task force reported 18 sporadic contacts Sunday, and uncovered a North Vietnamese motor pool, bunker complexes, and large caches of rifles, ammunition and other military equipment. Allied casualties were described as light.
 But the allied task force failed in the third day of the Cambodian offensive to find its major objective, the top command post for all Communist command military and political activities in South Vietnam.
 Armet reported that U.S. reconnaissance troops uncovered a North Vietnamese motor pool with seven 2½-ton trucks, 3 Jeeps, 19 trailers, 430 gallons of oil and 110,000 pounds of rice.
