## Attorney Frank Hollingsworth Dies

Frank Hollingsworth, 77, an attorney in Boone for half a century, died early today at the Boone county hospital where he had been taken Tuesday. He had been in failing health for some time, but had been confined to bed only the past 10 days.

Mr. Hollingsworth had practiced law here since 1899 when he came to Boone after completing his law training at the University of Iowa. He served as Boone county attorney from 1910 to 1915, and in 1927 was elected as state representative from Boone county, serving in this office until 1933.

During World War I he was chairman of the Liberty Loan drives, and was active in the organization of many Boone civic these organizations. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Royal Arch Masons, Commandery, Eastern Star, Consistory and Shrine, and of the Elks lodge. He was a past officer of most of these organizations. He was a charter member and past president of the Lions club.

Mr. Hollingsworth was born in Edgerton, Wis., but spent his early youth in Perry, and was graduated from the Perry schools before going to the university.

Motion pictures were a hobby of Mr. Hollingsworth and he had taken movies of many extensive visits to foreign lands.

He is survived by his wife, Kathern; one sister, Mrs. Grace Calhoun and a brother, J. H. Hollingsworth, both of Perry; one niece and three nephews, also of Perry.

Funeral services will be held at the First Methodist church Saturday at 2 p. m., with Dr. W. Frank Lister in charge. Friends may call at the Welin chapel after 4 p. m. Thursday. The relatives request no flowers. Any gifts left by friends will be given to the Cancer Society organization.

## Will Ask New Taxes

UP) — for the fiscal year starting July 1 is expected to be about \$75,000,000,000, most of it for defense. So arithmetic says tax revenue would have to be hiked about \$25,000,000,000—a jump of 50 per cent—to balance the budget.

Government officials are toying with the idea of a \$15,000,000,000 sales tax. This would be in addition to a \$6,000,000,000 to \$10,000,000,000 boost in taxes on individuals and corporations.

Snyder did not discuss new revenue plans on the president's recommendations in terms of figures. He said the budget message—due next Monday—will give the overall figures on revenue and expenditures. And Mr. Truman, he added, will send a detailed tax message to congress before Feb. 1.

Snyder emphasized Mr. Truman's pay-as-you-go policy. He flatly denied that the treasury has abandoned hope of balancing
