

He was the first president of the Sac County Farm Bureau and took an active part in politics. He was elected to the State Legislature in 1922, serving in the House of Representatives for three terms and then was elected to the Senate. While in the Senate he was appointed to fill a vacancy in the State Highway Commission where he served for two years.

Mr. Quirk was a member of the Sioux City Consistory and the Pioneer Lawmakers of Iowa, and a fifty year member of both the Masonic Lodge and the Order of the Eastern Star.

He is survived by his wife, Fannie, of Lake View, Iowa, their son, Edward, of McNary, Arizona, and a brother, George, of Storm Lake.






