L. S. RATLIFF FUNERAL

(Mt. Pleasant News)

Scores of friends of the late Z. S. Ratliff gathered at the Presbyterian church Tuesday afternoon for the funeral rites for the former state representative. The Rev. E.L. Jeambey was in charge of the service and was assisted by Rev. J. R. Fraser Rev. Ruring, an old friend of the family and one time minister of the Congregational church at Salem. A quartet composed of Mrs. E.L. Jeambey, Mrs. Geo. Luberger, Mrs. Robt. Willits and Miss Katherine Van Brussel sang with Mrs. Dan Winter at the organ. The numbers were "Beautiful Isle," "One Sweetly Solemn Thought' and "Nearer, Still Nearer." Pallbearers were C. H. Cook, James T. Gillis, Roy Wolfe, Robert H. Johnston, Raymond Kerr, Louis Fricke.

Z. S. Ratliff was born November 25, 1862, near Salem, Henry county, Iowa, and passed away at his home in Mt. Pleasant Ia. on July 26, 1936.

He was the son of Ephraim and Anna Ratliff who settled at Salem in the early days and who belonged to the Quaker faith. He was the youngest of a family of nine children and was the last survivor.

Whittier college, which had been established by the Quakers and their friends, afforded him an opportunity for an education. It may be of interest to note that this college was namedafter John Greenleaf Whittier, the great Quaker poet, who retained a kindly interest in it as long as it remained in existence.

On October 7, 1891, Mr. Ratliff was married to Amelia D. Kramling of Kahoka, Missouri. She was a real helpmate to him and comforted and sustained him throughout all the years of their married life. They established their home on a farm near Salem, Ia., and continued to live there until February, 1914, when they moved to the farm near Mt. This farm had been acquired while his mother was still living in Salem, but not until after his mother's death did he leave Salem and move to his farm. As long as his mother lived she had his ardent devotion. It was a beautiful relationship and one that will be long remembered by who were familiar with it.

Mr. and Mrs. Ratliff retired from active life in May, 1928, and came from the farm to Mt. Pleasant, where they lived during the remainder of his days.

Mr. Ratliff was a strong man and a good man. His character was entirely above reproach. No one ever doubted his integrity. No one ever questioned his motives. He had the complete confidence of all who knew him.

He was a very reverent and devout man. His Quaker training left an indelible impression upon him. He had a kind heart and a gentle spirit. He abstained from personal controversies. He loved peace and was at peace with all men.

After coming to Mt. Pleasant, there being no Quaker church here, identified himself with the Presbyterian church and remained a faithful member of that church until his death. In his church relationship, as in all other relationships of life, he did his full duty. He was always present at the services, he always aided in sustaining the church and he always set a good example in his daily life.

In all movements affecting the public Mr. Ratliff took an active interest and the public had confidence in his judgment and in his sincerity. was elected representative in the State Legislature in 1924, and was re-elected in 1926, 1928 and 1930. This was an unusual record. In the legislature he took high rank. He was given appointments on important committees and served his people well.


