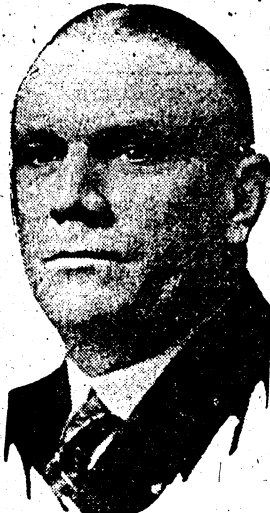

FORMER STATE SENATOR DIES

B. M. Stoddard, Sloan Longtime Resident, Expires in Illinois

Bertel M. Stoddard, 75, of Minonk, Ill., a former state senator from this district and active in lodge circles in northwestern Iowa,

died Thursday in Minonk after an illness of a year.

He served as senator from this district from 1918 to 1935. He was an active church worker and was state chairman of the Congregational Laymen for Iowa. The funeral will be held at 2 p. m. Monday in Minonk.

The former senator was born January 21, 1871, in Minonk. He moved to Sloan in 1901. Mrs. Stoddard died there December 28, 1942. In 1943 he returned to Minonk to make his home with a sister.

In the state legislature he was a strong advocate for good roads and broader education. He served as a member of the board of education in Sloan 27 years.

Mr. Stoddard was a member of the Masonic lodge in Sloan and Sioux City Consistory 5, Abubekr Shrine, the Sioux City Chamber of Commerce, the Sioux City Rotary club and a past president of the club and a former president of the Sioux City Knife and Fork club.

Survivors include a son, Bela M. Stoddard of Monticello, Ill.; a daughter, Jane Stoddard Wilson of Boulder, Colo., and six grandchildren.

tee will recommend "a very sensible bill."

President William Green of the American Federation of Labor called upon the senate Friday to reject the house bill and continue O. P. A. for another year without crippling amendments.

"The house bill if left unchanged, threatens to force the cost of living up to unprecedented heights and to endanger our entire economy," Green said in a statement. "It is likely to usher in an era of unbridled profiteering at the expense of the nation's wage earners."

Labor Favors O. P. A. End

"The American Federation of Labor does not believe in the perpetuation of government controls. We favor the abolition of O. P. A. as soon as such action can safely be taken. But to undertake such a move now, when production of many necessities of life is still far below consumer demand, is an open invitation to suicidal inflation."

On the senate floor Senator Wiley (R., Wis.) said the O. P. A. had set up a "gestapo to hunt citizens down like criminals."

"It has done more to damage the morale of the American people than any other agency," he said.

SCHWELLENBACH TO TAKE CHARGE

Will Personally Attempt to Get Factions Together

Washington.—Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach Friday assumed personal direction of government efforts to get John L. Lewis and the soft coal operators back into contract negotiations to end the 19-day bituminous mine strike.

Meanwhile the number of workers in associated industries made idle by the coal strike reached nearly 60,000, with the prospect of further layoffs.

The principal industries affected were steel mills and coal carrying railroads.

Schwellenbach disclosed his personal entry into the conciliation attempts after a cabinet meeting at which the coal strike presumably was discussed.

He said he will call the operators back to Washington next week, and suggested he may invite them to meet with him Monday or Tuesday.

The labor secretary will confer with John L. Lewis and his United Mine Workers' negotiating committee at a separate meeting, he said. Lewis is due to address the anthracite tri-district convention Wednesday at Hazleton, Pa., at which plans will be made for terminating the contract covering 75,000 hard coal miners. It can be ended June 1.

Lewis terminated the bituminous contract, covering 400,000 striking soft coal miners on April 1.

giving priority to areas abroad most urgently in need of special aid."

Millers' Excess for Relief' Anderson said that millers' output in excess of what they would be permitted to sell domestically would be bought for famine relief abroad.

"These measures," Anderson said, "have been taken only out of dire necessity to meet urgent relief needs. We are faced with a situation in which every additional bushel of grain that can be saved in this country will save additional lives abroad."

"These measures are not a substitute," he said, "for voluntary conservation efforts."

30 Cents Wheat Bonus

The secretary said that the government expected to accomplish two results with the wheat and corn bonus payments—to make more grain available for food purposes immediately, and to encourage farmers in the surplus corn producing states to market more corn and stop feeding livestock to heavy weights.

The 30 cents bonus on wheat will be paid in addition to the price the farmer may claim under a government wheat certificate purchase plan announced early this month.

Under that plan, the farmer is given a chance to speculate on future increases in prices and at the same time to deliver his grain now while it is urgently needed abroad.

Hoover Uses Hard Figures

The price which the farmer will receive under the certificate plan will be that prevailing whenever the farmer elects to collect for his wheat, which may not be later than March 31, 1943.

He was a charter member and the first president of the Grundy Center Rotary Club; a past grand chancellor of the Knights of Pythias of Iowa, a member of the I.O.O.F., O.E.S., A.F. and A.M., Shrine, a 32 Degree Scottish Rite, and a member of the First Presbyterian Church.

On June 12, 1889, he was married to Gertrude Edna Moffett who preceded him in death. Two sons were born to them, Lawrence Ervein, also deceased, and Robert Moffett Rogers of Kansas City, Missouri.

Mr. Rogers was a capable, conscientious and honest citizen and a man who devoted many years of his life to community service.

BERTEL M. STODDARD

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable memorial commemorating the life, character, and public service of the late Honorable Bertel M. Stoddard of Sloan, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following report:

Bertel M. Stoddard was born at Minonk, Illinois, on January 21, 1871. His boyhood was spent at Minonk. Later he attended Illinois College, Jacksonville, from which he was graduated in 1891. For the next seven years he was engaged in the grain business at Toluca, Illinois.

He was married in 1897 to Wilhelmina E. Simater, and to this union were born two children, a son, Bela M., and a daughter, Jane M.

In 1901 Bertel M. Stoddard removed to Sloan, Iowa. Here he was most active in community affairs, serving as a member of the Sloan school board for twenty-five years, as a member of the county board of supervisors, and as county chairman for Red Cross and Y.M.C.A. drives and war loan campaigns.

Senator Stoddard with his son operated grain elevators at Sloan and Owego, Iowa, as well as engaging in farming and stock raising.

Senator Stoddard's record in the Iowa legislature was long and distinguished. After first serving in the House of Representatives he represented Woodbury county in the Iowa Senate from 1918 until 1934. He was prominent in securing road legislation and ranked high upon com-

mittees. He was aggressive in public affairs and a Republican in politics. Senator Stoddard passed away on April 18, 1946, at his boyhood home of Minonk, Illinois.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Fifty-second General Assembly of Iowa, That in the passing of Senator Stoddard the state mourns the loss of a valuable and honored citizen; a man who devoted many years of his life to public service.

Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of this memorial resolution be printed in the Journal of the Senate and that the Secretary be directed to send enrolled copies to the members of the family of the deceased.

HOWARD SPICER VAN ALSTINE

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Howard Spicer Van Alstine, begs leave to submit the following:

Howard Spicer Van Alstine, banker and legislator, died at the Lutheran Hospital at Fort Dodge, Iowa, August 5, 1945; born at Poplar Grove, Illinois, May 16, 1869, son of Sewell Van Alstine and Ellen Hawley Van Alstine, who came to Iowa in 1870 and settled in Pocahontas county on the virgin prairie two miles northwest of the present town of Gilmore City, where Mr. Van Alstine has lived the most of his life and resided at the time of his demise. A post office was established at the Van Alstine farm home, known as the Blooming Prairie Post Office, and the mother was named postmistress; its operation continued until after 1880 when the railroad was built and the town of Gilmore City established by the elder Van Alstine. The school opened near the farm homestead which he attended and obtained his only formal education in four terms, which he supplemented by reading and study during hours engaged in herding cattle on the prairie. In 1889 he joined with his brother, L. H. Van Alstine, in a partnership establishing the Gilmore Exchange Bank.

In 1896 Mr. Van Alstine married Mary Bertha Beers of Gilmore City, who with two sons and two daughters survive him; one son, Howard Dana Van Alstine, died in 1928. He was one of the three last survivors of the original settlers of Gilmore City. With his brother he was a leader in the movement resulting in the drainage of thousands of acres of Pocahontas county slough bottoms long before the first drainage ditch was established in the county under the provisions of law. The bank extended its financial operations throughout the county and obtained valuable eastern loan connections which were utilized in developing the wild prairie into productive farms. Later in the depth of the depression the shrinkage of deposits from a high of \$1,800,000 to \$303,000, occasioned the decision of the Van Alstines to close the bank and it was liquidated be-
