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



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

An area premiere screening of Jahangal ... Your African Saferi" has been slated for Sunday at 8 p.m. in the Zoar Lutheran church. Announcment has been made by the Rev. Herman Engebretson, chairman for the event which is planned in the interest of African missions.

Described as "a missionary film that is different." the dramatic documentary takes the viewer on an exciting 10,000 mile safari. Two tightly edited animal sequences, featuring the continent's wildlife wonderland, reach twin climaxes in a dispute over the right-of-way with a pride of lions and a leopard kill seen from the car window. One shares the photographer's spine-tingling experience of being stalked by a wild rhino.

Of human interest is the visit to the market place where imported candy "life savers" are sold as medicines and goats are bartered for wives. Primitive Africa is personified by the witch doctor whose headache remedy is "the fin of a fish, the tail of a rat, the head of a snake, the foot of a fowl." Patients are to "tie these in a bundle, place beneath the nose and inhale deeply." Presto, the headache is supposed to disappear.

The film depicts Africa as "the Continent of suffering, the open sour of the world," and points up the work of medical missions with a visit to a hospital where lepers are cleansed. It then moves right into an operating theater to witness the miracle of sight restored to a blind Mohammedan through the skill and devotion of a missionary surgeon.

The public is invited to attend the screening. There will be no admission charge

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



Samuel R. Torgeson was born at Hanlontown, Iowa, on May 28, 1892, and passed away in Minneapolis on September 25, 1954. He received his early education in the rural schools and at Waldorf College. In 1917 he received the Bachelor of Arts degree from St. Olaf College.

Mr. Torgeson married Miss Emma Dahl of Worth County. A son, Dean Nathan, was born May 2, 1926.

After a two-year period of teaching, Mr. Torgeson began in 1919 a long career in banking, serving first as assistant cashier of a bank at Hanlontown, and later as cashier of the Farmers Trust and Savings Bank at Joice, Iowa. Since 1933, he served as cashier, later as executive vice president and director of the Farmers and Merchants State Bank in Lake Mills. Lawrence I. Truax was born on a farm near Yale, Guthrie County, Iowa, on June 5, 1884. He passed away at Des Moines, Iowa, on October 14, 1953.

His parents were John and Clara Truax, farmers, near Yale, Iowa. The early part of his life was spent in and around this home. His early education was received in the rural schools and the Guthrie County High School. He then attended Cornell College for two years after which he taught in rural and grade schools in Guthrie County. He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Bagley.

He married Dora Corsaut-Edmand of Bagley who preceded him in death.

His law education was obtained at the University of Iowa law school. He was admitted to the Iowa Bar in 1912, and to the California Bar in 1913 where he practiced law. He was also a certified public accountant. In 1914 he returned to Guthrie County and was elected county auditor there, serving three terms consecutively. He acted as a draft official during World War I. In 1920 he was elected as Representative from Guthrie County to the State Legislature and served in the Thirty-ninth General Assembly.

Thereafter he served in the state auditor's office and from 1939 until the time of his death he was supervisor of county audits. Upon making his home in Des Moines, he transferred his church membership to Westminster United Presbyterian Church where he served faithfully as a deacon. He was also associated with the Masonic bodies—Scottish Rites, Commandery, and the Shrine. He was a member of the National Association of County Officials, Pioneer Law Makers Organization, University Club and East Des Moines Club.

At the time of his death, he left to survive him, his wife, Ellie S. Truax, two stepdaughters, one sister, and three brothers.
