tured on its territory would be treated as war criminals.

The official Hanoi Daily Nhan Dan said the two American soldiers shot by the Viet Cong Sunday "would have been put to death long ago had it not been for the lenient policy (of the Viet Cong) which had spared their lives and given them good treatment."

Then the Communist paper said that the policies of the Americans and the South Vietnamese, such as the execution in Da Nang last week of three Vietnamese charged with leading an anti-American demonstration, "have given them no chance to continue enjoying that leniency."

The Viet Cong will no longer "allow the aggressors to take advantage of this (lenient) policy to carry out criminal acts," Nhan Dan said.

The Communist government made its statement to the Red Cross in a letter dated Aug. 31.

Death Claims Charles Baker, Former Councilman, State Rep.

Charles E. Baker, 91, a former Newton city councilman and state representative, died Tuesday evening at the Soldiers Home at Marshalltown.

Mr. Baker, a native of Mingo and dairy farmer in the Mingo area, served in the Iowa house of representatives from 1928 until 1930.

Mr. Baker served on eight legislative committees and

devoted considerable time in the promotion of agricultural legislation and legislation for the improvement of the Iowa road system.

Prior to his election as a representative, Mr. Baker served as alderman from Newton's first ward.

Funeral services for Mr.

Baker, a resident of the Old Soldiers Home at Marshalltown for the past two years, will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday at the Morgan-Loehr Funeral Home.

Burial will be in Newton Memorial Park Cemetery.

Mr. Baker will lie in state at the funeral home after 3 p.m.-today.

Survivors are two sons, L. T. (Bill) Baker of Newton and Lee Baker of Peru, Ill.; six grandchildren; nine great-grandchildren; and three sisters, Mrs. Lola Frey of Mingo, Mrs. Ethel Southern of Des Moines and Mrs. Nettie Baker of Gresham, Ore.

He was preceded in death by his parents; wife; three brothers and a sister.

Mr. Baker was a member of the Mingo Methodist Church.

Mr. Baker enlisted in the 51st Iowa regiment at the start of the Spanish American War and served in the Philippines.

He was associated with the Mingo Trust and Savings Bank for a time and later was engaged in the mercantile business in Mingo.

The son of Theodore and Amanda Penquite Baker, he was born Dec. 20, 1873 at Mingo.

Mr. Baker was a graduate of Mingo Schools and Simpson College at Indianola.

He was married to Etta Baker in 1900 at Mingo.
