S. A. BARNES DIES APRIL 20 AT HIS HOME

**Death Comes Unexpectedly
To Long Time Resident
Who Was Brother Of For-
mer Eagle Publisher, And
Political And Business
Leader In This Community**

Funeral services for Solon A. Barnes, 77, were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 in the First Congregational church with the Rev. Dale D. Brown officiating. Burial was in Rose Hill cemetery.

Mr. Barnes died late time during the night of April 8 at his home on West Broadway where he lived alone. Coroner Robert Eaton of Clarion set April 9 as the date of death and internal hemorrhage as the cause of death.

Mr. Barnes had been retired from business life since 1928 but had been a daily visitor to the business district.

Friday he became ill and sought the advice of a physician. The doctor attempted to persuade him to go to the hospital but he refused and went to his home alone, stating he didn't want any help.

Saturday when he failed to show up for his daily paper or to visit the recreation club where he usually stopped friends became suspicious and notified police. The police forced entrance to his home that evening and found his body near the bed as if he had not stepped out of bed.

Mr. Barnes was a prominent figure in Eagle Grove and Wright county during his younger years. He was cashier of the Security Savings Bank for 20 years and was twice elected to the state legislature as a Republican.

He also served briefly as a printer and as a brakeman on the C&NW RR. He came to Eagle Grove in 1897 when his father bought this newspaper the Eagle Grove Eagle. Although not always active in civic affairs he was always intensely interested in Eagle Grove and Wright county. He was also a loyal member and worker in the Republican party. He read the Chicago Tribune daily for many many years.

He was preceded in death by his parents with whom he lived until their death, his brother Ward who was editor and publisher of the Eagle, another brother Raymond, two sisters Lois and Lydia, nephews Clarence and Glen, and a niece nephew Harry.

He is survived by a nephew Arthur M. Barnes of Iowa City, a niece Mrs. Mary Barnes Baxter of Rochester, N. Y. and several grand nieces and nephews.
