BENJ. JAYCOX DIES MONDAY

Summons Comes to Former Representative at His Farm Home.

BURIAL WEDNESDAY

Burial to be Made at Blairsburg, Ia., Former Home, on Thursday.

Benj. Jaycox, representative in the 33d General Assembly of Delaware county, died at his farm home in Milo township Monday evening, Sept. 4, 1939, following a long and painful illness. Last June he entered the University hospital, Iowa City for a major operation and it was discovered he was suffering from a malignancy which grew progressively worse, although the operation was successful and gave him temporary relief.

Brief funeral services will be held at the home Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, in charge of the Rev. W. A. Adix, pastor of the First Lutheran church of this city. The body will be taken to Blairsburg, Ia., Thursday morning, and services will be held there in the afternoon, in charge of the pastor of the Congregational church of Iowa Falls. Interment will be at Blairsburg beside his wife, who died Aug. 22, 1925.

Mr. Jaycox was born near Webster City, Ia., Dec. 27, 1869, and grew to young manhood there. He received his early education in the Webster City schools and later attended the seminary at Osage, Ia. He was married to Miss Anna S. Christensen at Lake Benton, Minn., Aug. 28, 1894. They went house-keeping at Blairsburg, where for many years Mr. Jaycox was engaged in the lumber, feed and live stock business. In June, 1918, the family moved to the farm in Milo township, Delaware county, known as the Capt. Hutchinson place, which he purchased before moving here.

Survivors are two sons and two daughters: Ray, of this city; George, who operates the home farm in Milo township; Mrs. Emma Winterfeld, Iowa Falls; and Mrs. M. H. Muter, Iowa City; six grandchildren.

Mr. Jaycox was at all times interested in things which made for a better community and state. He was well informed on matters of general interest and was active in community affairs. The Farm Bureau had enlisted his wholehearted support at a time when it was getting under way in this county. He whole-heartedly supported every movement to improve the educational program of his county and state.

Mr. Jaycox's death brings a distinct loss to the community so long his home and the county which he served so well in the legislature. His children have the sincere sympathy of the community.
