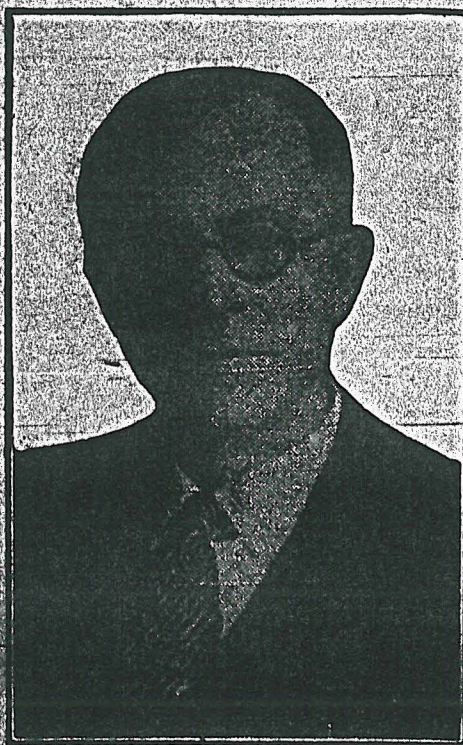
HON. A. H. MOUNCE, LEGISLATOR-EDITOR ANSWERS LAST CALL

Death Occurred at Ottumwa Hospital, Following an Operation

Hon. Arthur H. Mounce, representative of Van Buren county in the Iowa state legislature, died about midnight Wednesday, Dec. 3, at a hospital in Ottumwa.

Mr. Mounce became seriously ill on Tuesday of the previous week and on Wednesday was taken to Ottumwa, where an operation for appendicitis was performed, his condition then being very critical.

On failure to rally from the operation the members of his family were called to his bedside and on Monday a transfusion of blood was

Was again married in 1926 to Ruie Sheets of Keosauqua, Iowa. Has four children: James Rex, Charles Roy, Arthur Merle, and Lona Marguerite.

Followed farming until Jan. 1, 1913, when he was appointed deputy clerk of the district court of Van Buren county. Served four years and was then elected clerk of the district court and served six years, when he was again appointed deputy clerk and served four years and five months.

He also held the following offices: Township assessor, member to town council, secretary of school board and county chairman of republican central committee. Elected representative in 1928. A republican in politics.

Carrie. Carrie is the widow of James E. Sedgwick and lives at Waterloo, where her husband was for many years prominent in business life.

Lucius A. Cobb, Jr., attended the West Side schools of Waterloo, including high school, and in 1890 began his apprenticeship at the jeweler's trade, with C. W. Norton, of Waterloo. After two years he went to Elgin, Illinois, and worked under the instruction of a Swiss watch maker six months, then three months in the Elgin watch factory, and for another six months under the direction of a German watch maker at Bay City, Michigan. He followed his trade for a time at Yankton, South Dakota, for two years at Waterloo, and for twelve years was in the jewelry business at Denver, Colorado. For about fifteen years Mr. Cobb has conducted a business of his own at Waterloo. He is a member of Waterloo Lodge No. 105, A. F. and A. M., and Helmet Lodge No. 89, Knights of Pythias.

He married, in 1905, Nira B. McClung, who was born at Waterloo, daughter of William and Rebecca McClung. They have two daughters, Jean and Grace, Jean having graduated from the West High School in 1928, and Grace is a member of the class of 1930.

ARTHUR H. MOUNCE, of the firm Rowley & Mounce, publishers of the *Keosauqua Republican*, was for many years clerk of the District Court of Van Buren County, and his name has many associations in the political and business life of that section of the state.

Mr. Mounce was born in Jewell County, Kansas, October 4, 1872. His father, James S. Mounce, was a native of Indiana, and came to Iowa when a boy, finishing his education in this state. He enlisted and served in the Union army as a member of Company C of the Fifteenth Iowa Infantry. His active years were devoted to farming, and most of the time in Iowa, though for a few years he lived in Kansas. By his first marriage he had three children, two of whom are now living, George A., of Des Moines, and Mrs. Lizzie Olney, of Clinton, Iowa. The mother of these children died in 1866, and James S. Mounce then married Mary Metcalf, a widow, who by her first marriage had two children, Ernest L. Metcalf, of Lawrence, Kansas, and Mrs. Libbie Hassel, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. By his second marriage James S. Mounce was the father of three children: Arthur H.; Mrs. Lorena Jones, of Livingston, Montana; and Mrs. Bell Kerr, of Coffeyville, Kansas. James S. Mounce died in 1896 and his wife in 1928.

Arthur H. Mounce was educated in common schools in Kansas and Iowa, finishing his high school work at Keosauqua in 1891. He grew up on a farm, helped his father, also attended Beatty's Business College at Wellington, Kansas, and learned telegraphy in preparation for railroad service. After his father's death he returned to the home farm, and was active in its management until January, 1913, when he began his public service as deputy clerk of the District

Court. In 1916 he was elected district clerk, and held that office six years, until 1923. Then followed another four year period as deputy clerk, and in November, 1928, he was elected to represent Van Buren County in the State Legislature. He has served as township assessor, and is now secretary of the local school board and a member of the Keosauqua city council. Mr. Mounce for four years has been chairman of the Republican central committee. He is a trustee and treasurer of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Mr. Mounce has been a member of the publishing firm of Rowley & Mounce since May, 1929, and devotes most of his time to this old and influential Van Buren County newspaper. Mr. Mounce is a member of the Sons of Veterans.

He married, December 23, 1896, Miss Ida May Cross, of Center Point, Iowa. They have an interesting family of four children. James R., the oldest, is superintendent of schools at Garner, Iowa. The second son, Charles Roy, is a teacher in the Hawaiian Islands. Arthur Merle Mounce is a farmer at Bonaparte, Iowa, and the daughter, Lona Marguerite, lives at Keosauqua. The mother of these children died March 21, 1925, and on July 1, 1926, Mr. Mounce married Miss Ruie Sheets, of Keosauqua.

ROYAL C. DANLEY, M. D. With the exception of the period of his military service during the World war the entire professional career of Dr. Royal C. Danley has been passed at Hamburg, where he is numbered among the leading physicians and surgeons of Fremont County. In addition to a large personal practice Doctor Danley is the owner of a modern hospital at Hamburg, which he purchased in 1928, and which has grown to be a beneficial asset of the city and surrounding community.

Doctor Danley was born in 1888, at Clay Center, Kansas, and is a son of Joseph W. and Mattie (Berryman) Danley. His great-great-grandfather Danley (or Fairchild) met a soldier's death on the battlefield of the Brandywine, during the Revolutionary war, and his great-great-grandfather on his mother's side, William Clark, was an own cousin of President Buchanan. His paternal grandfather was Joseph W. Danley, Sr., who was born in Ohio and volunteered for service in the Union army during the war between the states. During the assault upon the works at Petersburg he was mortally wounded, and died in an army hospital.

Joseph W. Danley, the younger, was born in 1860, in Ohio, and in young manhood went to Kansas, where for some years he was a traveling man and subsequently engaged in a mercantile business. He followed the latter line also at St. Joseph, Missouri, and then moved to Olathe, Kansas, where he has served three terms as assistant county clerk of Johnson County. He is a York Rite Mason and a charter member and a past eminent commander of Olathe Commandery, Knights Templar. Politically Mr. Danley is a Republican and one of the highly re-

HON. ARTHUR HARRISON MOUNCE

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life and public service of the Honorable Arthur Harrison Mounce, state representative, reports as follows:

Mr. Mounce was born in Jewell County, Kansas, October 4, 1872, and died at a hospital in Ottumwa, Iowa, December 3, 1930. Burial was at Keosauqua. He was taken by his parents, in their removal in 1874 to Van Buren County, Iowa, which continued to be his home during the remainder of his life excepting six years spent in Polk county, Missouri. His education was secured in rural schools and in the Keosauqua high school. He followed farming until he entered the office of the clerk of the district court of Van Buren county where he served as deputy from 1913 to 1917, as clerk from 1917 to 1923, and again as deputy from 1923 to 1927. In 1928 he was elected representative and served in the Forty-third General Assembly. In 1929 he formed a partnership with R. B. Rowley in editing and publishing the Keosauqua Republican in which work he was engaged at the time of his death.

Mr. Mounce had a pleasing personality and a host of friends. He was honored and appreciated by all who knew him. His life was given to the best interests of the district in which he lived.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Forty-fourth General Assembly, That in the death of Hon. Arthur Harrison Mounce, the state has lost a worthy and influential citizen; and

Be It Further Resolved, That this resolution of respect and appreciation be printed in the Journal of the House.

HONORABLE HENRY LINN PIERCE

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions in commemoration of the life and services of the Honorable Henry Linn Pierce, beg leave to submit the following:

Henry Linn Pierce was born at Bellville, Illinois, March 19, 1867, and died May 1, 1930, at Freeport, Illinois. Surviving him are his wife, two daughters, Helen and Grace, and one son, Edwin V. Pierce, all of Freeport, Illinois.

Mr. Pierce came to Iowa with his father at the age of nineteen years, his mother having passed away when he was a small boy. For a time he lived in the vicinity of Gillette Grove and also attended school at Spencer. For a few terms he taught school and about the year 1891 he entered the employ of the late C. L. Ward in the Bank of Linn Grove. He continued in that position continuously until the death of Mr. Ward in 1918 and then served as executor of the estate of Mr. Ward until January, 1926, when he turned it over to the court for liquidation.

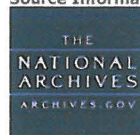
