# FORMER STATE **REP. PAULSON DIES IN CITY**

## Death Takes Prominent Clinton Co. Resident Early Today.

Harry C. Paulson, former state representative from Clinton county, died at 8:30 o'clock this morning in the Jane Lamb hospital. His death came after an illness of several months' duration.

Tentative plans call for funeral services Wednesday afternoon with the Rev. J. Albert Clark, pastor of the Community church, officiating. Burial will be in Springdale cemetery.

Mr. Paulson served in the Iowa general assembly for one term during the years 2929 to 1930. He was elected on the republican ticket. After expiration of his term he retired to his farm northwest of the city where he had resided since. Bern in Clinton

The deceased was born in Clinton on March 23, 1891, the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Paulson.

When nine years of age, he moved with his parents to a farm on the outskirts of the city. He was educated in the rural and city schools of Clinton county and attended Augustana college in Rock Island. Iil., and also lowa State college at Ames. While at Ames he won a scholarship in a competitive judging contest

In 1916 he married Rachael Chapman, daughter of the Rev. R. K. Chapman, then stationed in DeWitt.

He first entered politics in 1914 when elected to a two year term as township officer. In 1928 he was named a director of the Farm Bureau.

#### Interest in Railroads

HON. HARRY C. PAULSON, a representative of Clinton County in the Iowa Legislature, has lived all his life in that section of the state. He is a graduate of Iowa State College, and his record in Clnton County is that of a thoroughly practical and scientific farmer, a man of excellent judgment and frequently called to positions of leadership in local affairs.

Mr. Paulson was born at Clinton, March 23, 1891. His father, Gustav Paulson, was born in Sweden and grew up and received his education in that country. The mother, Alice (Johnson) Paulson, was born in Norway and she too lived in her native country until about twenty-four years of age, when she came to America to join an uncle at Grand Mound, Iowa. Gustav Paulson on coming to this country lived about a year in Pennsylvania, where he was connected with a tanning industry. On coming west to Clinton, Iowa, he was assistant engineer in the W. J. Young saw mill until 1900, and then bought the 200 acres since known as the Paulson homestead farm. This farm is located about a mile from Camanche. Gustav Paulson died January 17, 1929. The mother is still living at the old homestead with her son Harry C. The latter is the oldest of five children, the others being Clara E., Gardie H., Arndt M. and Howard O.

Gardie H., Arndt M. and Howard O. Harry C. Paulson was educated in the Lincoln School at Clinton, spent two years in Augustana College, and from early boyhood has been interested in the practical side of farming. In January, 1909, at the age of eighteen, he won the Armour scholarship of \$200 for expertness in live stock and grain judging. He subsequently entered the Iowa State College at Ames and graduated in the agricultural course in 1913. Mr. Paulson in addition to operating his mother's home place owns a farm of 160 acres in Center Township.

Since early manhood he has been interested in local affairs and from 1914 to 1917 held the office of township assessor. He was elected as one of the representatives of Clinton County in the State Legislature in 1928, taking his seat in the General Assembly at Des Moines in 1929. He has been a director of the Clinton County Farm Bureau, is a Republican, a member of the Masonic fraternity and his family belong to the Congregational Church.

He married, June 17, 1915, Miss Rachel Dorothy Chapman. Mrs. Paulson is a daughter of Rev. Richard Knill and Martha (Babcock) Chapman, and a granddaughter of Rev. Charles Chapman, who was for thirty-nine years president of the Western Theological College of Bristol, England. Her father has had a long and active career in the Congregational ministry in this country, and in August, 1929, retired from the pastorate of a church at Walnut Grove, Minnesota. Mrs. Paulson after graduating from the high school at Mitchell, Iowa, attended the Cedar Valley Seminary at Osage and spent two years in Grinnell College. She is a member of the auxiliary of the Grand Army of the Republic and the Ladies Legislative League. To Mr. and Mrs. Paulson were born three children: Eugene Chapman, Stanley Howard and Margaret Gene. The daughter, Margaret, died at the age of twentytwo months.

THOMAS CHARLES LODER is a leading mortician in the City of Anamosa, judicial center of Jones County, and his undertaking establishment, known as Loder's Funeral Home, is metropolitan in all details of equipment and service.

On the parental home farm south of Mount Vernon, Linn County, Iowa, the birth of Thomas C. Loder occurred December 27, 1883, and he is a son of Joseph and Frances (Calod) Loder, who were born in Bohemia, Germany, and who were aged respectively five and six years at the time of the immigration of the families to the United States, both the Loder and Calod families having become pioneer settlers in Linn County, Iowa. Joseph Loder was reared and educated in Linn County, there assisted in the work of the home farm, and there he eventually engaged in farm enterprise in an independent way. After many years of successful association with agricultural and live stock industry in Linn County Joseph Loder retired from his farm to the City of Cedar Rapids, where he now maintains his home, his wife having died in 1918, at the age of sixtyfour years.

After completing his studies in the Cedar Rap-ids High School Thomas C. Loder took a course in the Cedar Rapids Business College. In 1909 he came to Anamosa, and after having here been employed two years in the undertaking establishment of Meak & Beam he was for one year a partner in a furniture and undertaking business at Prairieburg, Linn County. In 1911 he passed the examination before the Iowa State Board of Examination before the lowar State Board of Examiners for undertakers and em-balmers, and during the ensuing year he was associated with the Hill Furniture Company at Allison, Butler County. He next passed three years as representative of the same concern at Greene, that county, and in 1916 he returned to Anamosa and engaged independently in the undertaking business, in which he has here continued with unequivocal success during the intervening years. His original quarters were on Main Street, where he remained ten years. He then leased a large and attractive corner residence at 306 East First Street, and remodeled and equipped the building into his present modern and beautiful establishment, Loder's Funeral Home, the attractive consistency of the place

being enhanced by the large and beautiful grounds and fine trees and shrubbery that mark the establishment. Mr. Loder has shown all of sympathy and consideration in conducting his business, and the success of that business at tests the popular appreciation of the service accorded.

The political alignment of Mr. Loder is in the ranks of the Republican party, he and his wife are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in the Masonic fraternity he is a Knight Templar and a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, in which latter his wife likewise has membership, and he is affiliated also with the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, the Knights of Pythias and the Modern Woodmen of the

Pythias and the Modern Woodmen of America. April 5, 1911, marked the marriage of Mr. Loder to Miss Martha L. Brown, daughter of William and Caroline (Lockwood) Brown, of Linn County. Mr. and Mrs. Loder have no children.

DougLAS B. STAGES, M. D. One of the very able medical practitioners of Jackson County Dr. Douglas B. Staggs, of Monmouth, has earned his own way in life, and gained his present large patronage through his ability, sympathetic personality and professional skill. He was born at Dewitt, Clinton County, Iowa, January 23, 1872, a son of George and Maria (Fuller) Staggs. The father was born at Canton, Ohio, in 1887, and came to Iowa with his grandfather, William Fuller, in 1848. William Fuller was a wagonmaker by trade and operated a general store at Dewitt, and there George Staggs grew to manhood. He became identified with the farming and stock interests of Clinton County, and won a reputation for the Poland-China hogs and Shorthorn cattle he raised. He was a Democrat and a factor in the councils of his party, and was elected county supervisor for three terms. The death of this able man and good citizen occurred August 5, 1899. The wife and mother, Mrs. Maria Staggs, is still living and very active, although eighty-five years old December 13, 1929. Eleven children were born to the parents, of whom eight are living: William A., George E., Cecil H., Julia, Charlotte, Pearl, Edith and Doctor Staggs. Three children died, one in infancy, and James and Jessie. The maternal grandmother of Doctor Staggs was a cousin of Mrs. William McKinley, and belonged to the Saxon family, which gave many of its sons to the service during the different wars of the country

Little Rock, Ia.; Fred Oehmke, in the naval service of his country and stationed at Coronado, Calif.; and William Oehmke, of Chicago.

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Mr. Oehmke was a citizen whose first thought was for others. Unselfish in his devotion to family and friends, he counted his friends by the hundreds. #### HONORABLE ROBERT M. PEET

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public services of the late Honorable Robert Melvin Peet of Jones county, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

Robert Melvin Peet was born in Fairview Township, Jones county, Iowa, the son of James M. and Anna Dallas Peet. Gideon Peet, his grandfather, entered five hundred sixty acres of land in Fairview Township at the land office in Dubuque in 1840. He lived only a few years after that and his sons assumed management of the place. Mrs. Gideon Peet died in 1847. Soon after James M. Peet purchased the interest of the seven brothers and one sister and became the sole owner of the farm. James M. Peet was the father of Robert M. Peet, better known as Mel, and Mel assumed control of the land in 1877 when James M. Peet retired and moved to Anamosa. Since 1877 Robert Peet added to the original acreage of the farm through sane investments and hard work until the place is listed at twelve hundred acres all in one farm in addition to large acreages in other localities. It is one of the largest farms in this part of the state and one of the finest-a beautiful monument to a man whose greatest joy in the success he attained was in the happiness it enabled him to bring to his family and friends.

On Thanksgiving day of 1878, Robert Peet was married to Miss Carrie Belle Carbee, daughter of William and Harriet Smith Carbee, and they


