JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE

HON. ASA B. SMITH

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life, character and public service of Asa B. Smith, an honored member of the Twenty-third General Assembly, beg leave to submit the following report:

Asa B. Smith was born in Morgan County, Ohio, January 27, 1841. He grew to manhood in Ohio. August 8, 1862, he enlisted in Company C, 97th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, where he served three years. He participated in many major battles, and was severely wounded at Missionary Ridge.

In 1866 he moved to Dewitt, Iowa, where he married Nancy Ellen Mummey, with whom he lived in loving companionship for nearly fifty years. He moved to Sac county in 1878, and settled on a farm east of Odebolt. In 1890 he was elected to the House of Representatives from Sac county, and faithfully discharged his duties as a public official.

In later years he made his home with his daughter at Mt. Vernon, Iowa, where he died July 25, 1930. Three children survive him, Charles H. Smith, Odebolt, Iowa; Mrs. S. L. Chandler, Mt. Vernon, Iowa; and Harlan A. Smith, Onamia, Minnesota.

He was a worthy citizen, a brave defender of his country, and a staunch Christian gentleman, whose influence was always directed towards right and justice in the community where he lived.

Therefore, Be It Resolved that the House of Representatives of the Forty-fourth General Assembly, Take this occasion to express its appreciation of the splendid character and public services of the deceased, and extend to the surviving members of his family its sincere sympathy in their sorrow.

And Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the Journal of the House; and that the Chief Clerk be directed to forward a copy to the family of the deceased.

HON. JOHN B. TRUAX

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life and service of the Hon. John B. Truax, late of Buchanan County, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

WHEREAS, The Honorable John B. Truax of Independence, Iowa, who was a member of the House in the Forty-first, Forty-second, Forty-second Special and Forty-third General Assemblies, died at his home in Independence, Iowa, on November 19, 1930, at the age of seventy-one years.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Forty-fourth General Assembly, That this resolution be accepted commemorating his life, character and service to the statue.

JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE

John B. Truax, representative from Buchanan county, was born in Indiana in 1859. In 1864 he moved to Iowa with his parents who settled on a farm in the northern part of Buchanan county. He followed the occupation of fiarmer until 1884, when he met with an accident which made it impossible for him to continue. He worked in a general store for a number of years, and in 1898 was elected county recorder for Buchanan county and served twenty consecutive years. During that time he purchased a set of abstract books and followed that occupation for a number of years. He was married to Ella O. Lawrence of Hazelton, Iowa, November 7, 1880, and to them was born one daughter who is now the wife of A. J. Schuette, who is the proprietor of the book store in Independence. Mr. Truax was a member of Independence Lodge No. 87, A. F. & A. M., and was its secretary for twenty-six years. He was also a member of O. E. S. and off the Methodist Church. He was always a republican in politics. He was elected representative of the Sixty-seventh District in 24 and re-elected in 1926 and 1928.

Mr. Truax was greatly handicapped physically for a number of years, being umable to walk without the aid of a cane, and in his latter years only with crutches. He always bore his affliction patiently, was ever cordial and pleasant, had many friends who esteemed him highly. Was a kind husband and father and as a legislator was highly regarded and well thought off, always showing a Christian spirit.

HON. G. H. VAN HOUTEN

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life and service of the Hon. G. H. Van Houten of Taylor County, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

George H. Van Houten was born near Rockport, Missouri, Atchinson county, February 24, 1847, and died at Lenox, Iowa, October 17, 1930. In the year 1848, with his parents, he came to Madison County, Iowa, about five miles east of Winterset, moving to Cass county in 1850 near Lewis, then the county seat of Cass county, again in 1855 moving to Taylor county mear Conway.

In the year of 1864 he volunteered his service and was accepted in Company E, 4th Missouri Cavalry, United States Service, at Sedalia, Missouri, and was honorably discharged at St. Louis, July 5, 1865.

In 1866 he was married to Salina A. Jenks, a playmate of his childhood ays. They began life together near Lenox, Iowa, where twelve children were born to them who grew to maturity, besides helping to raise eight orphan children. On account of poor school facilities and impaired eyesight caused by measles, his education was neglected until when his



He went to the family cemetery and took the old headstones to use for the floor of the porch and sidewalk. Later, when the farm was sold, the new owner decided to bulldoze the limestone house, porch, and sidewalk into the basement. Mr. Walker discovered what had happened too late to stop it. He did point out to us where the cemetery had stood and the old limestone foundation.

SUMNER TOWNSHIP

This township was so named in honor of Charles Sumner who was a member of the United States Senate representing the state of Massachusetts. It was organized in 1857. Its boundaries were changed in 1878 when the grounds of the asylum for the insane were separated from Sumner and annexed to Washington Township.

The first election in the township was held in March 1857 electing John Ginther, Jube Day and William Boyach, trustees; B.W. Ogden, Justice; and Norman A Bassett, Clerk. There were twelve votes at this election.

The Wapsie River passes through the township on the northeast side and has Bear Creek passing through the center. The soil is light sandy loam.

After the sorrow and turmoil of World War I the residents of Sumner Township enjoyed several good and profitable years of farming. Many buying and fixing up their homes and farmsteads, only to be plunged into the bitter depression years of the late 1920s and early 1930s. But again the sturdy people picked up and went on and for many years times were good. During this time rural electricity came into being and changed the way of life for the farmers. As always there were very wet and very dry years that have an adverse effect on farming, but again they are weathered.

In the late 1940s the people of both Sumner and Washington Townships felt the need of rural fire protection. After many months of going to other towns, going to numerous meetings the clerks and trustees of the two townships purchased a fire truck that was to be kept in Independence, manned and used by the town, if needed, as well as the two townships. This was the first venture of its kind and a very wise move.

Early in the 1950s the school systems all over the county were going through a big change. All the rural schools were closed and all grades were bused to the surrounding towns. Thus the little one room schools were a thing of the past leaving no place for voting. In the early 1960s Mrs. Russell (Laura) Greenley very generously offered the #2 school which was on her land for a community center, if the people would fix it up and repair it. It had not been used for 13 years. Many many people responded, and went door to door asking for help and donations. After hours and hours of scrubbing, painting, etc. the community center came to be in 1963.


As the years went by and farm progress grew with the coming of very large machinery the once very popular 80 acre farms were swallowed up into much larger ones. Thus farm buildings, trees, fences etc. were gone giving the township a very different look with the big farms and sparse homes. As a rule livestock is raised only on a large scale.

For the older people living today, it is hard to believe the change in the wild life pattern. Deer were never seen in earlier years where as today there is a huge population of them. Wild turkeys, coyotes, grouse, etc. are being seen again also.

Sumner Township has always been the smallest township in the county and has become even smaller with the city limits of Independence being extended south of town, and the four lane highway going through and taking its toll of Sumner Township's rich, fertile land.

Cemeteries

MOUNT HOPE CEMETERY - Mount Hope Cemetery in Independence was dedicated June 1915. The cemetery is located on 10 acres of the Sargent place near the south bridge. The land was sold to the Dains Land and Townsite Company, a group of investors, from Waterloo. Mr. Dains spoke at the ceremony, stating that the cemetery was needed because the Oak Grove Cemetery was becoming crowded. In the 1940s Mr and Mrs Colin Shillinglaw

In the 1940s Mr and Mrs Colin Shillinglaw bought the cemetery. Mark and John White purchased Mount Hope in March 1989.

WILSON CEMÉTERY - Land for this cemetery was given by Elzy Wilson in 1852. The 1886 Plat Book of Buchanan County shows this cemetery with the name 'Union'.

In 1895 a ladies organization called the Good-Will Society was formed to maintain upkeep of the cemetery.

In August of 1938, two and two-fifths acres were purchased for an addition to the cemetery. In 1944 the Good-Will Society and the Wilson Cemetery Association met to consolidate.

WASHINGTON TOWNSHII

Early records of this township were lost (the period of years, so we know the organiza was in the year 1848 but do not know who early elected officials were. Some of the early tlers were Isaac Hathaway who lived about miles east of Independence. During the winter 1845 and 1846 he traveled to Centre Point corn, paying twenty-five cents a bushel. neighbors were Henry Baker in Byron Towns E.G. Allem, Joseph Collier and Gamaleil Wa in Liberty Township. Supplies came mostly f Dubuque at this time, with the exception of. tle store in Quasqueton and a mill owner Davis and Thompson where they ground c The abundance of game kept their table well plied with meat during the months that tr was difficult

Other early settlers were John Obench Oscar Witcham, Martin Ginther and Thc Barr.

The land of the township is so similar to other Wapsie river townships that we do not it necessary to occupy space with a descriphere.

John Boone settled in the township in Nov ber 1846. He and Isaac Hathaway built a school house and hired a teacher in the wint 1847.
