## Death of John Eden

John Eden, mayor of Calamus, and one of Clinton county's most publicspirited men, died at his home in Calamus last Wednesday evening, March 5th, at 7:30, at the age of 60 years.

He was born on a farm near Cala-mus December 25th, 1870, and lived in that community all his life. He was married October 3, 1895, to Agnes B. Kuebler, who is left to mourn him with three sons, Lester J., Richard J., and Bernard W. He also leaves two brothers, Edward and William of Calamus; two sisters, Mrs. Henry Kassel of Calamus, and Mrs. Chester J. Hover of Davenport; a half-sister, Mrs. Betty Smith of Idaho, and Albert Eden of Tennessee.

He was well known in fraternal circles, being a 32nd degree Mason, a member of DeMolay consistory, member of the Modern Brotherhood of America, of the Modern Woodmen of America, and an earnest member and worker of the Calamus M. E. church.

While at all times he was a most progressive and successful farmer, yet he was a man to whom his many friends and neighbors looked up to as a leader in all business affairs of their community, their county and their state. Never did he consciously fail them in the performance of the many duties that were imposed on him, most of which were totally unremunerative and some times unappreciated. As road boss, director and president of the school board, president of the Calamus branch of the Red Cross, president of the Farmers Elevator Co., supervisor of Clinton County for six terms, state representative in the Iowa legislature for two terms, and finally as mayor of Calamus, in all those offices mentioned he proved his worth to his constituents and to his community. He was a liberal giver for any worthy cause, and his time belonged to whatever project he ac-cepted as worth while. His real value to his community will be more strongly felt as time goes on, while the friendship of those years of service to his friends will forever remain as a monument to his true character and worth.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at the Calamus M. E. church, conducted by Rey. Kildow. Masons had charge of the burial rites. Scores of friends from a distance were present to pay their final respects, and the floral tributes were beautiful.
