**S. E. Fackler Funeral  
 Held Last Friday**

Samuel Edwin Fackler was born in  
 Huron county, Ohio, September 7th,  
 1867, and departed this life at his  
 home in Prescott, Iowa, August 23rd,  
 1938, aged 70 years, 11 months and  
 16 days.

Mr. Fackler located in Prescott in  
 1888 and it was here he met Miss  
 Mayme Allen of Ogalalla, Nebraska, a  
 teacher in the Prescott schools. On  
 December 23rd, 1896, they were united  
 in marriage and established a home  
 which has long been noted for its  
 hospitality.

Two children were born to Mr. and  
 Mrs. Fackler, Edwin Jr., of Corning,  
 Iowa, and Theodore of Hollywood,  
 California.

Mr. Fackler has been a loyal mem-  
 ber of the Prescott Christian church  
 the past 45 years. He was also a mem-  
 ber of the Masonic and A. O. U. W.  
 lodges. He has been one of Prescott's  
 most enterprising citizens, always ac-  
 tive in the affairs of his community.  
 He served for a number of years as  
 a member of the school board, and as  
 secretary of the telephone company,  
 and for several terms as mayor. He  
 was a member of the House of Repre-  
 sentatives in the 39th and 40th Gen-  
 eral Assembly and of the State Sen-  
 ate in the 41st and 42nd General As-  
 sembly.

He has been one of Prescott's fore-  
 most business men for 50 years, 44  
 years of which he was owner and  
 manager of his business. He was ac-  
 tive in patriotic work, serving his  
 country during the World War for one  
 dollar per year.

He leaves to mourn his passing, his  
 beloved wife, two sons, Edwin and  
 Theodore, their wives Phoebe and  
 Mary; two grandchildren, Edwin and  
 Gerald; also one brother, Winfield  
 Fackler of Loxley, Alabama; two sis-  
 ters, Mrs. Jennie Boles of San Ber-  
 nardina, Calif., and Mrs. Carrie Tra-  
 bert of Indianola, Iowa; many nieces  
 and nephews and a host of friends.  
 He was preceded in death by one  
 brother, Charles of Loxley, Alabama,  
 and a grandson, James Robert Fack-  
 ler.
