FORMER SUPERVISOR DIED THURSDAY IN AUSTIN HOSPITAL

John Frederick Hale, LeRoy Farmer, Served Nine Years in County Office, Year in Legislature.

John Frederick Hale, age 77, well-known north Howard county resident, died at Saint Olaf's hospital in Austin, Minnesota, last Thursday.

A native of the LeRoy community, Mr. Hale spent all of his life in the neighborhood in which his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Hale, were pioneers 90 years ago. He was born near LeRoy June 27, 1870, on a farm still known as the Hale farm.

He received his elementary education in a rural school, and he later attended the Spring Valley schools for a few years.

Farming was always his chief interest. He was first engaged in farming on the Hale farm, until 1900 when he purchased the Garvey farm in Oak Dale township, where he continued to live until he retired from the farm in 1920.

Mr. Hale was active in community affairs for many years. He served as a township officer, a member of the school board, member of the Howard county board of supervisors, from 1918 until 1927, and a member of the Iowa house of representatives from Howard county during the 1927-1928 Iowa assembly.

His other activities were varied. He was one of the organizers of the LeRoy Cooperative creamery and served as its secretary for 10 years, from 1932 to 1942. He was also instrumental in the formation of the Cooperative Grain and Lumber company. He served as president of both the creamery and the grain and lumber cooperative at various times.

Mr. Hale was a director of the First National bank of LeRoy and during part of the time he was president of the bank, a position he held at the time of his death.

He was married to Meda Horn, and the couple became the parents of two children, Mrs. Hale and the

Business Owners, Home Owners Asked to Join in Cooperative Program Sponsored By Kiwanis Club.

As the first step in Cresco's fly control program, sponsored by the local Kiwanis club, the clean-up is to start tomorrow in the business district, it is announced by Robert Davies, committee chairman.

Cooperation of all business owners and home owners is asked by Mayor F. O. Luehr both in cleaning up the premises of the stores and downtown business places and the homes of Cresco.

He points out that a city ordinance of Cresco, provides that the premises of the property owners be kept free of trash.

Following the clean-up, which is to start tomorrow and continue until Saturday night, July 19, the fly spraying program will begin Monday, July 21.

Spraying equipment has been secured to take care of the downtown district. Provision for the cost of the spraying of the business section is made through the finance committee of the fly control program. Ray Farnsworth is chairman of the committee, which is to start soliciting funds soon.

According to plans announced by Mr. Davies, the cooperative fund will provide for free spraying of alleys and front and rear entrances of all stores in the business district. This will also provide spraying service for the interiors of all business places handling food or refreshments in any form.
