# ARTHUR'S PLAN WOULD SAP OTHER AREA OF POWER

Washington, May 21—(AP)—General Omar Bradley today led the United States would strip military power elsewhere to carry out MacArthur's proposals. He told senate investigators the joint chiefs of staff recommended MacArthur's removal because he was "not in sympathy" with administration plans to contain the war to Korea. He said substantially more air and naval power would be needed to carry out MacArthur's plans in the Far East. He said he would have to strip our other resources to get the necessary force to carry out the MacArthur program. He told senators there was no military objection to "stripping the wraps" off the case Nationalist forces to pass Red China if American forces aren't involved.

# CITY COMMISSION TAKES STEPS TO EXTEND FRANCHISE

Among the actions taken by the city commission at its meeting this morning was the adoption of a resolution authorizing publication of a notice of intention to grant a twenty-year franchise to Kansas Gas and Electric company.

The present franchise does not expire until December 15, 1966, and calls for payment of two percent of the gross revenue derived from Cherryvale customers as a franchise tax. The proposed franchise would expire April 1, 1971, and the tax is increased to three percent, effective January 1, 1951. On the basis of last year's payment, the increase would amount to \$831.00. If the company's business continues to grow as it has in the past, the difference would, of course, be even greater, it was pointed out.

The franchise is similar in all its terms to one granted by the city of Independence early this year. The increase in tax is offered by the company to cities of 2500 population or more.
