Theo. Martin Dies in Minn.

Theodore Martin, 86, a native of Bellevue, died Saturday, Oct. 19, at the hospital in Tracy, Minn. He had moved there two years ago to be near his daughter, Mrs. E. K. Bicek.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at a Tracy funeral home with Rev. Thomas Lindsay officiating. Interment was in the Tracy cemetery.

Theodore Martin was born May 7, 1882, at Bellevue, son of Theodore and Susan Martin. He attended school here and married Laura Weis Sept. 3, 1912.

He farmed at Bellevue and Green Island, gaining fame as a breeder of purebred cattle. From 1921 to 1925 he served as representative from Jackson county in the Iowa legislature. While in office he worked toward establishment of Bellevue State Park.

After leaving the livestock business he was an auctioneer, then went into business at LaMoille, Iowa. Mr. and Mrs. Martin lived in semi-retirement at Seattle, Wash., and Sacramento, Calif., before moving to Tracy.

Mr. Martin was member of the Presbyterian church and of the Masonic lodge at Bellevue and the Consistory at Clinton.

He is survived by his wife of Tracy, four children, Theo. J. of Newton, Mrs. Billy E. Hopkins of Sacramento, Mrs. Clarence Bennett of Logansport, Ind., and Mrs. Ernst Bicek of Tracy. Six grandchildren and four great grandchildren also survive.

Maquoketa Lawyer Pleads Guilty to Tax Evasion

Atty. James R. Sokol, 46, of Maquoketa pleaded guilty Monday to a charge of failing to file a federal income tax return in 1963 at Cedar Rapids.

U. S. Judge Edward McManus sentenced Mr. Sokol to a year in prison, then suspended the sentence. Mr. Sokol was also fined \$10,000 and placed on probation for five years.

The Internal Revenue Service accused Mr. Sokol of failing to file a return in 1963 when he had a gross income of \$29,000, a taxable income of \$15,000 and owed \$3,771 in federal income taxes.
