# Former Senator Clipper Mills Accorded Legion's Final Rites

REDFIELD: A full roster of Redfield Legionnaires conducted a graveside ceremony Tuesday morning for Redfield Clipper Mills, 74 who had passed away June 12 at the Soldiers Home at Marshalltown.

A memorial service conducted by Rev. John Lata was held in the Methodist church. A duet was sung by Mrs. H. L. Huggins and Harold Ellis, accompanied by organist Mrs. Donald Shaw. Assisting with flowers were Mrs. A. L. Hoff and Mrs. Harry Nielsen.

Mr. Mills is survived by his wife, Ella; sons, Donald, Locke, John Paul, Clipper E.; and two daughters, Mrs. C. H. (May Alice) Barr and Mrs. Richard (Janet) Hall.

Sons and sons-in-law were casket bearers.

Honorary casket bearers were A. L. Hoff, Clarence Crowl, Lonnie Tompkins, Charles Lamb, Frank Knoll and George Leeper.

The achievements of this Redfield citizen of state-wide fame are summarized in the following history prepared by Mr. Mills, himself around 1960.

### AUTOBIOGRAPHY

Dr. Redfield Clipper Mills (named after Redfield Newspaper) son of John H. Mills and Sarah A. Mills, was born in Redfield, Iowa, January 22, 1891, in the house on corner directly west of lumber yard. When six years of age he moved to a farm south of the town of Linden, where he lived until 1905. While there he attended the Walnut Vally School commonly called "Slab Hollow."

In the year 1905 he moved back to Redfield in which he lived until 1912 with his par-

ents on an acreage.

In 1912 at the age of 21, he entered the Kansas City Veterinary College from which he graduated in 1915. He entered Veterinary practice right after graduation in his home town of Redfield, Iowa. In July, 1917, he was called to the colors in World War I in which he enlisted as a 1st Lieutenant. He was overseas 8 months and at one time during his tour of duty almost drowned in the Irish Sea in 1918 when his ship collided with another. Several hundred of the soldiers were drowned.

After the War he again took up practice in his home town of Redfield. He was married to Ella Frances Shaw in 1920. Six children were born to this union. All are now grown and have families of their own.

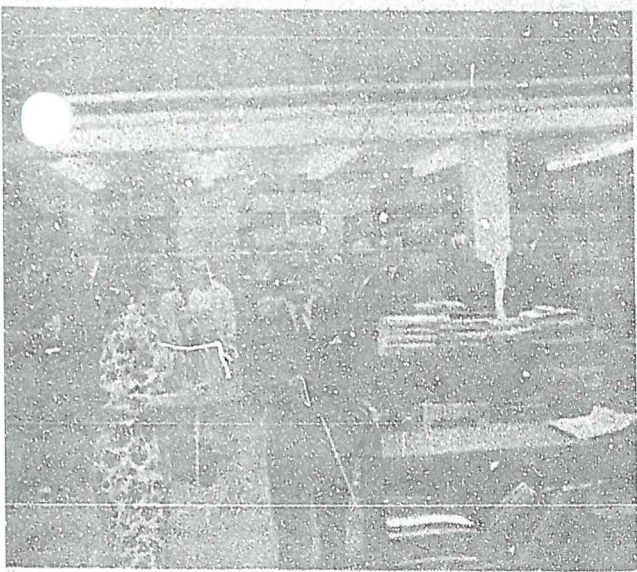
Dr. Mills helped form the American Legion in Redfield in 1919 and has held membership in this Post continuously since that date.

Some of the offices held were Post Commander for two years and later served as Dallas County Commander after which he served as State Vice Commander. He is listed in "Who's Who" in the National Records. He has been a long time member of "Sons of Union Veterans" and the "Knights of Pythias".

Dr. Mills has been a life long member of the Methodist church of the town. He also served two terms as president of the "Old Settlers Reunion".

He was speaker at the dedication of the Rock Monument in the city park in 1928. In addition he has delivered sev-

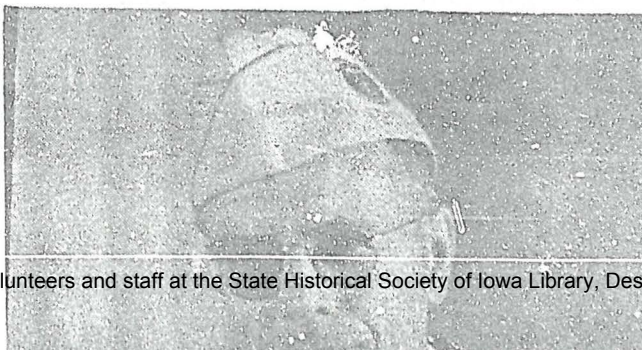

eral Decoration Day and Am-  
 istice Day addresses over the  
 State plus the dedication of  
 several plaques during World  
 War II. He had three sons in  
 this conflict and one in the  
 Korean War.

Dr. Mills entered actively  
 into politics as soon as he be-  
 came of age. He cast his first  
 vote for President in 1912 at  
 which time he voted for Theo-  
 dore Roosevelt, the Progress-  
 ive Party candidate.

In 1924 he became a candi-  
 date for Iowa State Senate on  
 the Republican Ticket, and  
 subsequently was elected in  
 the Nov. election of 1924. In  
 this capacity he was the first  
 man elected as State Senator  
 before he became an officer in  
 the Northern Army and served  
 as Colonel of the 39th Iowa

Infantry.

Dr. Mills was an unsuccess-  
 ful candidate for Lt.-Governor  
 in 1948. In 1950 he gave up  
 private veterinary practice and  
 was appointed a veterinary in-  
 spector with the United States  
 Dept. of Agriculture. Because  
 of ill health he resigned in  
 1954. He attended every Dal-  
 las County and State Repub-  
 lican Convention from 1920 to  
 1950. He also attended many  
 State and National Legion  
 Conventions and was active in  
 The Iowa State Veterinary  
 Assn. for many years. He was  
 also elected as Vice President  
 of the Redfield Service Club in  
 1949 and was acting President  
 part of that year.

He has always been active  
 in all Civic affairs and will be  
 well remembered by all.

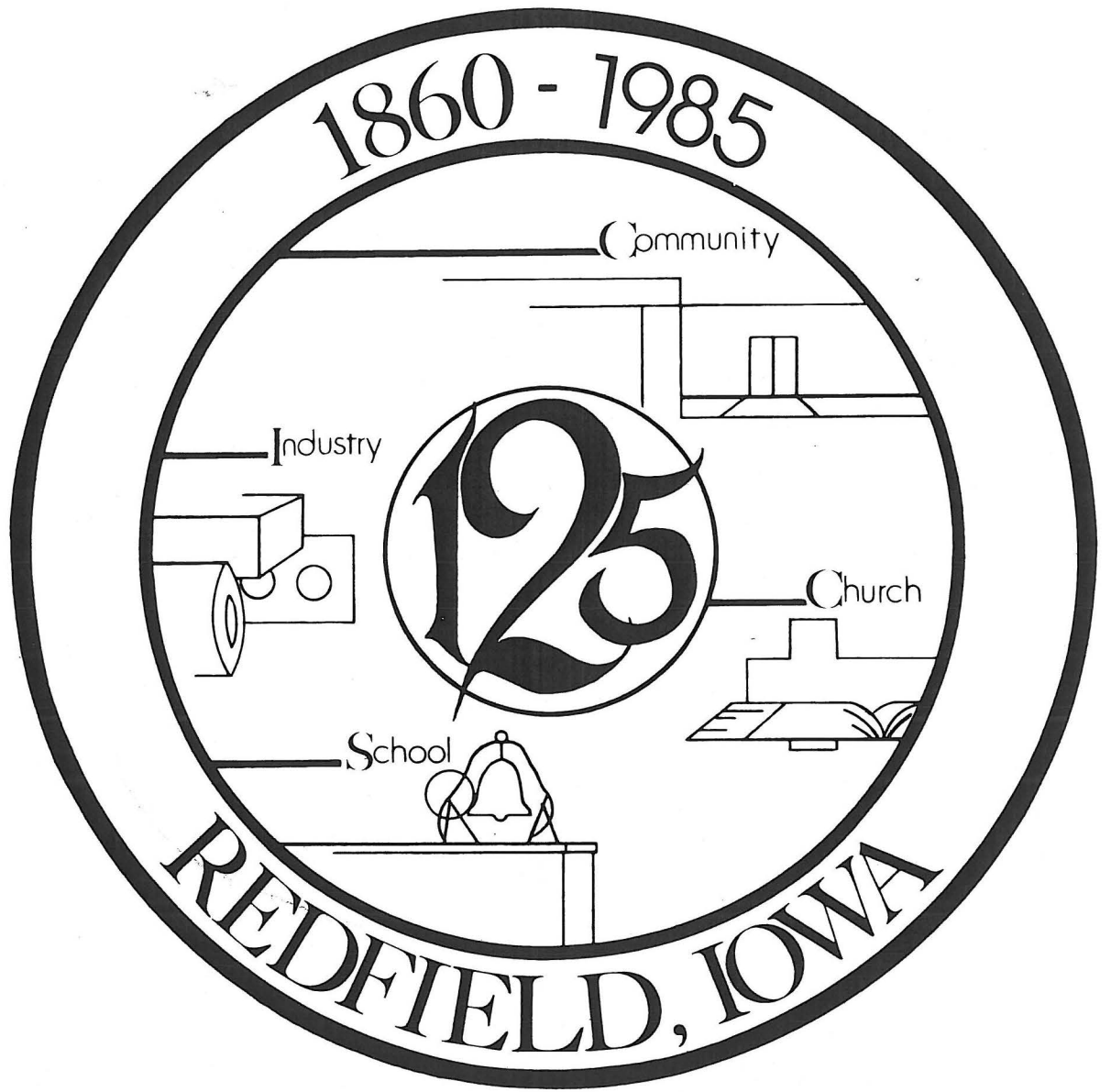

## Meacham Family

Charles and Nancy Robbins Meacham moved to a farm north of Redfield in the year 1893 coming from Dayton, Iowa. He was born in Oswego County, New York and came west Illinois to settle for sometime. Here he met and married his wife. They then came on west to Webster County, Iowa and then on to Dallas County, Iowa.

They had five living children when they came here but all were already married except Blanche.

Mr. Meacham was a Civil War veteran of short duration. They lived on the farm and attended the East Branch Baptist Church north of Redfield until their deaths. His in 1907 and his wife in 1908. They are both buried at East Linn cemetery.

Their oldest daughter Abigail married Avery Russell and lived in the Linden-Panora area until their deaths.

Their daughter Elizabeth Longshore, after her marriage and children came to Redfield and ran a millinery store for a few years. She later moved to California and died in 1956.

Their eldest son John lived on the farm after he was married to Clara Bennett of Redfield. They had one daughter Elizabeth Meacham Boyer who died in 1935. They had one granddaughter Mary Elizabeth Boyer Mason, who attended Redfield school and graduated there. She died in 1943.

John moved to Redfield from the farm and lived in a spacious home in the northwest part of Redfield, known as the Geo. Curtis home. The home and ground were later taken over by the Redfield Brick & Tile Co. John died here in 1929 and his wife also in 1950.

Son Edward lived on a farm joining the Meacham home, moving there also in 1893 from Jackson, Minn. with one son Frank who was born just prior to the move. Three more sons were born and raised on this farm.

The second son Fred still lives on this farm. He was married to former Blanche Brissler. They had two children, Vera and Verle, who attended the Redfield schools.

Frank married Victoria Hutchens and they lived on a farm 10 miles from the home farm. They raised a family of ten children here and half of them attended the Redfield schools. The rest went to Washington Twp. They moved from here to Woodward and later to Perry where they now live at age 70 for both of them.

Tracy Meacham married Katherine Cayton and they lived on farms in the area with their son Wendell for a time, later moving to Perry.

Charles, who moved with his parents to Perry while he was still in school attended school there. Edward died in 1950 and his wife in 1949. Charles now lives at Nevada, Iowa.

The youngest of Charles Meacham's children, Blanche married Lee Bandy. They lived north of Redfield and later moved to Redfield until John and Fern had graduated from high school then they moved to Oregon. There are three children still living there and one, Fern, is in Idaho.

John Meacham and wife, Edward Meacham and wife, Elizabeth Boyer, and Mary Elizabeth Mason are all buried in Redfield.

## Melton Family

Frank and Elizabeth Nickell Melton, along with their six children, bought and moved to a farm northeast of Redfield in 1913 from Taylor County, Iowa. They farmed there until 1939 when Mrs. Melton died and Mr. Melton went to live the rest of his life in California.

All of their children attended the Redfield schools. The last one to graduate was Harold in 1931. The sons were also farmers in the area. The only living member of the family is daughter Velma who lives in Sacramento, Calif.

## Raymond and Helen Merial

Raymond Lavern Merial, fifth child of Walter and Nora Merial, was born in Granger, Iowa. He had three brothers: Leon, Jim and Eugene, and three sisters: Jennie, Ervil and Bernice.

In 1923 his father was killed by lightning on a farm south of Wauke. Raymond, his mother and two younger brothers moved to Redfield to a small farm southeast of town. He received his education in Perry and Jefferson.

In 1929 Raymond went to work for Adel Clay Products Company where he worked for 41 years. The family moved to Centerville, Iowa in 1948 while he was plant manager of the Centerville plant and then back to Redfield in 1949. He was general superintendent of the Redfield plant for 20 years, retiring in 1971.

In 1931 he married Helen Elizabeth Frye. She was born on a farm southwest of Redfield and graduated from Redfield High School in 1931.

Raymond is a member of the Redfield United Methodist Church, served two terms on the town council, and was a member of the Redfield Volunteer Fire Department for several years. Helen is a homemaker, member of the Redfield United Methodist Church, United Methodist Women, Rebekah Lodge, P.N.G. Club, Thursday Club, and Friendly Neighbor Club. She has served several years on the town election board. Raymond and Helen have lived in their present home since 1937.

They had two daughters, Shirley Belle and Sandra Rae. Shirley graduated from Redfield High School and Cedar Falls University, receiving a teacher's certificate. She married Dick Mabbitt, an engineering graduate from Iowa State University of Ames and they moved to Boulder, Colo. They had four children: Steven, Julie, Jaci and Christopher. Dick and Shirley were both killed in a car accident in the Colorado mountains in 1969.

Sandra Rae, or Sandee, was a Dexfield High School graduate and attended Drake University. She married and had a daughter, Robyn Elizabeth. In 1968 they moved to Boulder. While working at Beach Air Craft, she met and married Arnold Rogers. Arnie adopted Robyn and the couple took to raise Arnie's two daughters by a previous marriage, Annette and Susan, and the four Mabbitt children.



The Mills Generation(s) - 1800-1900

The Mills generation, the 125th year of the Town of Redfield, no longer finds residence in the community! As with all families large and small, time sends (as does the wind) them to other towns and cities. The sons and daughters of Redfield Clipper and Ella Frances (Shaw) Mills, oldest to youngest, are six in number: Clipper Eugene (Virginia), Milton

Locke (Joan), John Paul (Carolyn), Mary Alice (Ralph Alshouse), Donald Thurston (Judi) and Janet Elizabeth (Richard Hall). Nearly all have children and their children have children.

All of this was and is made possible by reaching to England and noting the birth of John Mills (the immigrant) 1660- to-1665 ca. and his first born in Philadelphia year 1688, another John Mills.

The line with the Johns commenced moving west and to life through Tennessee, Ohio, Indiana and eventually into Iowa; Henry and Hannah (Thornburg) Mills, Aaron and Charity (Mendenhall) Mills, Moses and Elizabeth (Thornburg) Mills, Milton L. and Matilda Jane (Locke) Mills, then the grandparents of this 125th year generation, John Henry and Sarah Ann (Duck) Mills followed by the parents Redfield Clipper and Ella Frances (Shaw) Mills.

Grandfather (John H.) Mills reached a fine 83 years of age — fruitful yes, exceedingly active. He came to the farm north of Redfield at age eight and in ensuing years, marriage to Sarah Ann and parents of six sons i.e. Roscoe, Claude, Milton L., George and Paul (both passing in infancy), and Redfield Clipper.

John Henry farmed, was a mail clerk on the railroads, and entered the newspaper ownership in 1889 by becoming editor of the *Redfield Clipper*. His earlier life found him in the Union Army (1864) with "Sherman to the Sea and Washington, D.C." He was a do'er! His life peaked by being elected department commander, the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) of Iowa.

Redfield Clipper, the youngest son was a product of the late 19th century and was named for the newspaper edited by his father. Born in Redfield in 1891, he lived 74 years packed with life and loved his fellow man. A veterinarian (DVM), consummate politician (state senator, etc.) the best father (married to the best mother), patriot of the ultimate (a speaker at hundreds of patriotic gatherings large and small) a most active member of the American Legion, an officer many times in the Redfield post, district and statewide. This activity stemmed from his serving in World War I as an officer in the veterinary corp of the U.S. Army. There is so much more to be said about these two but we'll stand with this and retire from writing by "lifting a toast" to a marvelous grandfather and a thoroughly wonderful father.

Others of the Mills clan spending a considerable part of their lives in Redfield were James Jay Mills and sister Margaret. They were the children of Roscoe Mills. Subsequent to the passing of Redfield Clipper and Jay's wife Hilma (Kipping) he married Ella Frances (Shaw) Mills becoming stepfather and always cousin of the six R.C. Mills children of the 20th century. Jay's own children are Roberta (Dr. Dale Harding) and Jerry (Nancy) and grandchildren residing throughout Iowa.

### Delbert "Ike" and Zelda Morrison

The Morrison family has been in Dallas County since the 1840s, when Daniel and Isabella Hunter Morrison farmed east of Wauke. Their great-grandson is Delbert "Ike" Morrison.

Ike was born in Polk County, Iowa, on Sept. 26, 1901, to William Alexander (b.4/11/66-d.5/14/50) and Ida Lee Herron (b.5/24/66-d.9/29/27) Morrison. He was raised in Dallas County and farmed north of town for 30 years before he and his wife, Zelda, retired to their present home in town. Ike's grandparents were Daniel Alexander and Mary M. West Morrison, married 4/26/65, and J.W. and Nancy Ellen Shaffer Herron, married 11/10/59. His great-grandparents were Daniel (b.11/1/13-d.4/9/82) and Isabella Hunter (b.10/28/13-d.12/18/83) Morrison and David and Margaret

Sammons Shaffer, married 11/22/38. Grandfather Herron saw service in the Civil War and suffered a head wound which left him blind in one eye. Ike had two brothers, Frank and Russell, both deceased. Of his two sisters, Flossie and Wynette, only the latter, "Jo" survives. She lives in Minburn and is 88 years old.

On Aug. 2, 1934, Ike was married to Zelda L. Harding, born 3/9/10, the daughter of George Lawrence (b.12/30/78-d.4/16/47) and Hazel V. Colton (b.10/28/90-d.5/8/69) Harding. Her grandparents were Winfield S. (b.1853-d.12/24/77) and Amanda Pancoast (b.1861-d.12/13/83) Harding and George Ezra (b.9/5/55-d.10/5/28) and Minnie L. Ryan (b.2/18/57-d.3/19/35) Colton. Zelda's great-grandparents were Isaac Colton (b.1/9/16-d.6/20/90) and Bonapart (b.8/15/28-d.3/27/69) and Mary Jane (b.9/30/38-d.4/14/10) Ryan. Zelda was raised in Wiscotta, as were her parents. She attended Redfield school and graduated from high school in 1927. Her brother, Gordon, died in 1962 and her sister, Zoe, died in 1984.

Zelda and Ike have three children, Marilyn F., Larry W., and Dennis D., all grown. Marilyn, Mrs. Dayle Isaacson of rural Boone, has one son Paul and one grandson Gregg. Paul is married to the former Julie Hendershot of Ogden, and they live in Boone. Denny is a truck driver and lives at home with his parents. Larry married Margaret Pierce and they have a son William H. and a daughter Elizabeth Ann. Bill and Beth are both students at Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa.

In the mid-twenties, Ike and his brother, Russ, farmed north of where he and Zelda later lived. Times were hard and money was scarce. The young men made some wild grape wine and traded it for the things they needed to survive. They paid for the groceries they needed with wine delivered to the local grocer in egg cases. Ike would bring it in and the grocer would tell him, "Just put them in the back." No one in the store was any the wiser for the exchange and both Ike and the grocer had what they wanted! So much for prohibition!

### Murphy

Millard and Maxell Murphy came to the Redfield area in 1939. Since then they have lived in and around Redfield most of the time. Millard worked at the brickyard and for several area farmers. Maxell worked in several of the Redfield restaurants and was also employed in Des Moines and Woodward.

They are the parents of seven children: Nila Joann, Virgil, Bobbie, Carolyn, Teddy, Peggy, and Karen.

Joanne married Byron "Bud" Hoffman of Perry, they have a son Lyle Dean of Redfield. Joanne passed away in 1951 at Perry.

Virgil married Betty Goetz of Fontanelle. They have three children, Mike, Connie and Bryon. Mike married Myrna Thompson, they have one son Adam. Connie married Ronnie Burnett and they have one son Travis. Virgil is presently living with Maxell in Wiscotta.

Bobbie married Sharlene Freeman of Fontanelle, they have four children: Patti, Richard, Mark, and Pam. Patti has a daughter Bobbi Jo. Bobbie and Sharlene now live north of Menlo.

Carolyn married Harold McCorkel of Stuart. They have three children: Terry, Susan, and Patrick. Terry married Jackie Bennett of Des Moines, and they have three children: Jason, Jennifer, and Christy. 

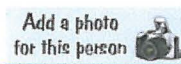

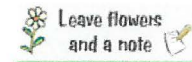
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
