Mr. Roberts died of pneumonia Friday at Michigan City, Ind., where he had lived three years. He had been in ill health for several years.

Open Osteopath Sessions Today

Seventeen speakers are on the program for the annual state convention of the

tor Berlioz in Iowa Fieldhouse. The performance will be Mitropoulos' first experience at conducting the "Requiem" in this country. And it will probably be the first time the solemn notes of the Mass for the Dead have ever sounded in a fieldhouse.

The 464-by-430-foot, 15,000-seat structure is the only one in this area large enough to contain the volume and power of the music and to provide space for the orchestra of 120 and the chorus of 225. Four small brass choirs will join the orchestra and chorus to swell their musical description of the Day of Judgment in the Requiem's second section.

Mitropoulos will arrive in Iowa City today to direct final rehearsals of the "Requiem". Instrumental rehearsals have been directed by James Dixon, conductor of the University Symphony orchestra and a protege of Mitropoulos, and choral rehearsals have been led by Professor Herald Stark, director of the University Chorus.

Mitropoulos has performed on the Iowa campus many times, and has taken a keen interest in the career of Conductor Dixon.

Born in Estherville and a former Guthrie Center resident Dixon came to the university to study conducting at Mitropoulos' suggestion, and subsequently directed the Iowa orchestra in the numbers for which Mitropoulos performed as soloist. In 1951 Dixon traveled with the New York Philharmonic to study and observe Mitropoulos' conducting at the British Music Festival.

Acclaimed as one of the most impressive of more than 1,000 musical settings which have been written for the Mass for the Dead, the Berlioz "Requiem" was not composed for church use. Berlioz was commissioned to write it in 1837 for a French government memorial service for the heroes of the 1830 revolution in France, which had exiled Charles X.

THOMAS RUTHERFORD, JR.

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Thomas Rutherford, Jr., begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Thomas Rutherford, Jr., was born on February 14, 1869, in Poweshiek County, Iowa. He passed away at the Audubon Memorial Hospital on December 20, 1956.

He came to Audubon County at the age of twelve years with his parents, Mary and Robert Rutherford, where he spent the rest of his life.

On March 11, 1896, he was united in marriage to Belle Hunt of Dallas County. They were the parents of four children, Clark, Vera, Inez and Alice.

Thomas Rutherford, Jr., was basically a farmer, having lived on a farm north of Audubon for twenty years. He retired in 1922 and moved to Audubon.

He was a member of the First Methodist church and for many years was active in Masonic activities. He served on the Masonic Association Board, and was a leader in the Commandry, and a Past Patron of the Order of Eastern Star.

Mr. Rutherford was active in the Republican party. He worked for many years as a member of the county draft board.

Thomas Rutherford, Jr., was a member of the House of Representatives from Audubon County, serving in the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh General Assemblies.

Survivors are three daughters, Mrs. Vera Boust, Mrs. Inez Graves and Mrs. Alice Shupe. Also surviving are one sister, Miss Nancy Rutherford, nine grandchildren, and twenty great-grandchildren.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fifty-seventh General Assembly of Iowa: That in the passing of the Honorable Thomas Rutherford, Jr., the state has lost an honored citizen and a faithful, useful servant, and the House, by this resolution, would express its appreciation of his service, and tender its sympathy to the members of his family.
