M.L.BOWMAN, 57, ONGE LEADER IN WATERLOO, DIES

Former State Senator, Farm Crops Expert, Commercial Club Officer Here.

Melville L. Bowman, 57, unsuc-cessful candidate- for Democratic nomination for Iowa secretary of agriculture in the primary election this month and former state senator from the Black Hawk-Grundy district from 1922 to 1926, died Friday night after being stricken by a heart attack in his automobile in Des Moines.

Formerly a farmer and purebred Holstein breeder near Waterloo, he was first secretary of the Greater Waterloo association, and had served as secretary of the Iowa Corn Growers association.

As an Iowa State college faculty member, he originated the "seed oats special" trains that toured the state in promotion of better seed oats.

Since serving as state senator he had resided most of the time in Des Moines.

In Chicago Stockyards.

Born in Galesburg, Ill., he worked as a youth in buying and shipping stocker cattle at the Chicago stock= yards, and in 1903 entered Iowa State college. Upon graduation he

became a college faculty member for five years, and was in charge of the farm crops experimental work.

He was elected to his state senatorship as a Republican, and in 1926 he was beaten by John Hammill for the Republican governorship nomination.

Bowman was widely known in Iowa and Nebraska.

In the latter state, he was a public relations representative for the central Nebraska public power and irrigation district at Hastings from 1936 to 1941, returning to Des Moines to become office manager at the Des Moines ordnance plant.

Ran for Congress.

He also was a candidate for congress in 1932 on the Republican ticket, losing to the late Cassius C Dowell, veteran representative of the old Sixth district.

He probably was best known in Iowa for his work from 1933 to 1936 as state supervisor of the farm debt adjustment program.

Bowman moved from Galesburg to Corning, Ic., where he attended an academy.

From 1910 to 1914, he headed the agriculture department of the William Galloway company in Water-He edited "The Corn Maga-100. zine" for two years and also was a real estate dealer and secretary of the Waterloo Commercial club.

Funeral at Corning.

Later he did organizational work for the Iowa Farm Bureau federation, was a supervisor for the Farmers Union Insurance company, was

a wholesale lumber dealer, and worked for the Federal Land bank at Omaha before taking the farm debt post.

In addition to his widow, he is survived by two daughters. Mrs. William Meade, Tacoma, Wash., and Marjorie Bowman, Los Angeles, Cal. The body was taken to Corning, where funeral will be, probably Monday.
