## Native of Wioterset Was Ranking Newsman and Editor

Edwin Stout, a native of Winterset who became an internationally known newsman and a ranking editor and publisher in the American magazine field. died last Wednesday, Nov. 26, 'n New York City. Death resulted from a heart attack. He was 53 years of age.
Mr. Stout was born in Winterset on Sept. 3, 1905, one of the sis sons born to Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Stout. His father, for many years, was assistant cashier of the old Madison county Savings bank. His early life, was spent in this community, and he was gradted from the Winterset high nool. Following the death of his father the family moved to Iowa City, where he graduated from the State University of Iowa with the class of 1928. During his under-graduate days at Iowa, he was married to Velma Critz of Iowa City.
He learned the printing trade on the Daily Iowan at Iowa City. and for several years served as night foreman of $t$ hat plant. About 1930 he and his wife went to Europe, where he spent a year studying the printing arts $n$ n the continent.
He entered the news field as a staff member of one of the wire services in Des Moines, then was transferred to New York City. where he joined the foreign news staff of the Associated Press.
