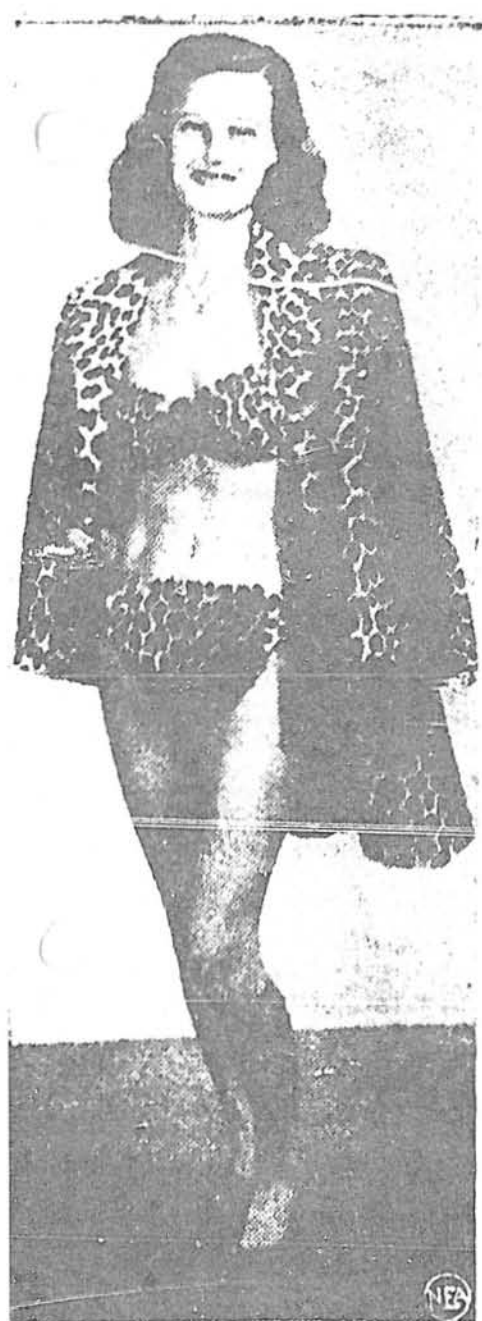

Rites of R. S. Clark To Be Held Thursday

Funeral services for Robert S. Clark, longtime resident of Estherville, will be at 3 p. m. Thursday at the Clark home. The Rev. C. J. Semans will officiate and burial will be at Oakhill cemetery.

Mr. Clark, 77, died yesterday at 1:45 p. m. at his home on North Sixth street. His death was caused from a cerebral hemorrhage. His family was at his bedside at the time.

He spent his entire life in Emmet county. Mr. Clark was born in a log cabin near the Clark farm home May 3, 1870. He retired from active farming 20 years ago and moved to his present home where he has lived since.

Mr. Clark was married to Mary Eunice Jones June 15, 1893, at the home of Mrs. Clark's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Jones, in Estherville. He took a keen interest in state and national affairs and served Emmet county as state representative from 1925 to 1927.

Five years ago Mr. and Mrs. Clark celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

Mr. Clark is survived by his widow, a daughter, Margaret, who teaches in Estherville high school; a son, William, of the firm of Schultz and Clark; and two grandchildren, Mrs. W. C. Dunlavey (the former Lois Clark) and Kathryn Clark, all of Estherville. His only sister, Mrs. Charles Carpenter, preceded him in death in 1945.

Communists Have Sabotage School Near Vienna

Vienna, March 23 (AP)—Communist action committees are attending sabotage schools in a Russian-occupied suburb of Vienna, a highly placed Austrian source said today.

Austrian interior ministry officials said they knew there was a school but did not know what was being taught there. It has been common knowledge here for some time that Austrian communists, aided by Russian officers, have been conducting schools in the Soviet zone. Earlier reports said the instruction was limited to communist ideology.

Action committees were the instruments used by communists in their coup in Czechoslovakia last month.

One Austrian official said whole families are being required to attend special evening lectures in the Soviet zone. He said workers in Russian-controlled factories are being forced to listen to speakers brought in from Czechoslovakia by Soviet authorities.

Iturbi Given Ovation in Spain

Madrid, March 23 (AP)—Pianist Jose Iturbi got a clamorous ovation last night at his first appearance in his homeland in 13 years. He conducted a Madrid chamber orchestra in a concert of Beethoven and Mozart and played the piano. He expects to give similar concerts in Bilbao and Valencia before returning to the United States to open his annual tour at Cincinnati April 14. Iturbi said he was "very happy" to be in Spain and gratified by the reception accorded him.
