Ole Natvig

Ole Natvig, the son of Ole and Gertrude Natvig was born in Bergen, Norway, on January 11, 1863. When four years of age he immigrated to this country with his parents and four brothers, and landed at Montreal, Canada, in 1867. From whence they came to Chickasaw county, Iowa, where the family established its home.

Confirmed Lutheran

He was baptized in Norway, and confirmed in the Lutheran faith at Saude, Iowa, in the church in which he held membership until the time of his death. He had resided in the home in Howard county from which death has taken him for nearly 55 years. He received his education in the public schools of Chickasaw county, Iowa, and spent three winter terms at Breckenridge college at Decorah, Iowa. He served two terms in the State Legislature and special sessions, 1923 and 1925 as Representative of Howard county.

Married in 1886

He was married in 1886 to Anna Borlaug by the Rev. John Moses, and to this union four children were born, namely, John, Oscar, Arthur and Gertrude.

During the last few years he had suffered the infirmities of old age. Death came suddenly on June 8th at the close of a day in which he had, apparently, been as well as usual. He had reached the age of 81 years, four months and twenty-seven days.

Surviving

He is survived by his wife and four children. Also by his brothers Herman, Iver, Carl, George and Day Natvig, and by the following sisters, Lena (Mrs. Geo. Miller), Mrs. Hannah Vaala, Matilda (Mrs. Andrew Vaala, and Ella, Mrs. Alf. Vaala. He was preceded in death by his parents and three brothers, Andrew, Peter and Alert.

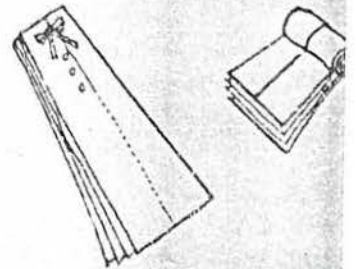

Ole Natvig Dies Age 81; Funeral At Saude Sunday

An Air Service Command station (somewhere in England) sends the following information to the New Hampton Tribune.

Cpl. Madra Anne Conroy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice P. Conry, New Hampton, Iowa, is now overseas and has participated in a course designed to bridge the gap between training in the states and soldiering in an active theatre of war. At one of the Air Service Command stations known as Control Depots, Cpl. Madra A. Conry was carefully processed by classification experts who make certain that she was well fitted for the job assigned to her.
