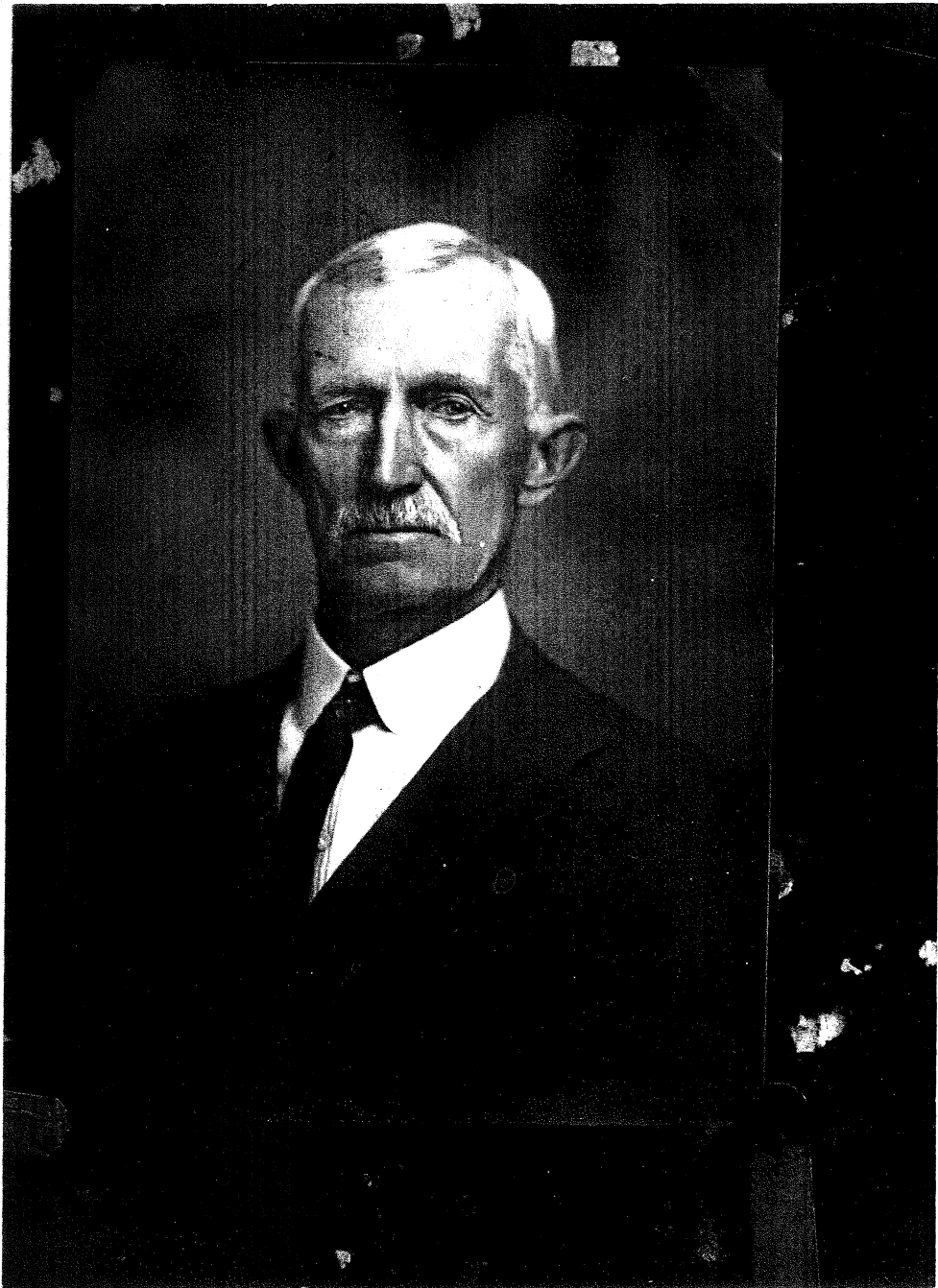

ISAAC SNOOK DIES AT HOME MONDAY NIGHT

Former State Senator Dies Af- ter Four Weeks' Illness. Burial Wednesday.

Isaac N. Snook, former state sen-
ator, died at his home in Pleasant
Ridge Township at 9:40 o'clock
Monday night, after a four weeks'
illness. He was 82 years old at the
time of his death.

Mr. Snook was born on February
20, 1848 in Union county, Pennsyl-
vania, moving here with his parents
when he was six years old. He lived
in that township the remainder of his
life.

He held all township offices, and
served as Justice of the Peace for
sixteen years. He was state thrasher
president for 14 yrs. and served as
national director for Iowa. He served
in 1923-24 as state senator.

He is survived by three sons: Ed-
ward C. Snook, of Sopulpa, Okla.;
Frank Snook, of New London, Iowa;
and Charles Snook of Purdin, Mo.
Two daughters, Ola Snook of
Pleasant Ridge township and Mrs.
Harry Bland, of Lamesa, California,
survive him, as does one brother,
Jerry G. Snook, of Sacramento,
California, and one sister, Mrs. Ella
Grice, of Purdin, Mo. He was preced-
ed in death by his wife, and two
daughters.

o'clock Wednesday at the Woollrn
Corner church, with Rev. A. B.
Hightshoe, of Ottumwa, officiating.
Burial will be at Price cemetery. A
request was made that flowers be

The bill having received a constitutional majority was declared to have passed the Senate and the title was agreed to.

Senator Hush moved that the vote by which the bill passed the Senate be reconsidered and that the motion to reconsider be laid on the table, which motion prevailed.

On motion of Senator Nelson Senate File No. 125, a bill for an act to amend the law as it appears in section 5067-d4 of the code of Iowa, 1931, relating to the maximum length of motor vehicles, trailers and semi-trailers, and combinations thereof, returned by the sifting committee, was taken up and considered.

Action was deferred temporarily.

Senator Wilson moved to adjourn until 9:30 a. m. Thursday.

Senator Wilson withheld his motion to adjourn for the consideration of a resolution.

Senator Frailey submitted the following:

SNOOK MEMORIAL RESOLUTION

Whereas, Honorable Isaac N. Snook, a former member of this body in the Fortieth, Fortieth Extra and Forty-first General Assemblies, died on the second day of November, 1931, therefore,

Be It Resolved, That a committee be appointed to draft a suitable memorial to his services in this body.

On request of Senator Frailey, unanimous consent was granted to consider the resolution.

The resolution was unanimously adopted and the chair appointed to act on such committee Senators Frailey, White and Kimberly.

AMENDMENTS FILED

Amend House File 128 in the following manner:

"Strike all after the enacting clause and substitute therefor the following:

Section 1. Any person, firm, charitable association, corporation or other institution operating any hospital in the State of Iowa, including state, county and municipal hospitals and any physician, surgeon, osteopath and/or chiropractor licensed to practice in the State of Iowa, who renders any hospital care or maintenance or professional service, or both, to any person injured by reason of the negligence of any other person, firm or corporation, may have a lien for the reasonable value of such professional services and/or such hospital care and maintenance furnished, upon:

1. Any judgment recovered by the said injured person or his legal representative on account of said injury. Said lien upon any such judgment may be made effective by filing a verified itemized statement thereof in the office of the Clerk of Court and entering same in the judgment or combination docket opposite the entry of the judgment.

2. Any valid claim for damages of such injured person or his legal representative on account of such injury. Said lien upon any such claim shall be made effective by the delivery of a written notice thereof together with verified itemized statement thereof to the person, firm or corporation owing such claim.

Section 2. In all cases the lien provided in Section 1 hereof may be enforced by proper proceedings in equity.

Section 3. The lien provided herein shall be junior only to attorney fees and costs.

Amend Senate File No. 418 as follows:

Amend Section 1 by striking the period at the end of the section and adding thereto the following: "nor permit the use of buildings under their control to be used for such purposes."

Further amend by inserting after Section 3 the following:

"Sec. 4. This shall not be construed to prevent municipalities from owning and operating public utilities, such as hospitals, water, gas, light and power plants."

Further amend by renumbering Section 4 as Section 5.

Amend Section 1 by inserting in line five (5) after the word "scope," the following phrase: "penal institutions excepted,".

Forty-third and Forty-fourth assemblies. Politically he was a Republican and an active and useful citizen and legislator.

JOHN L. BROWN was born near Rose Hill, Mahaska County, Iowa, May 25, 1861, and died at Rose Hill May 17, 1931. Burial was in Jackson Cemetery, one half mile west of Rose Hill. His parents were Jonathan and Elizabeth (Reed) Brown, who were early settlers in that locality. He was educated in rural public schools of that neighborhood. In 1884 he engaged in the trade of a mason, and in 1901 entered the hardware and furniture business in Rose Hill. For many years of his later life he was a breeder of barred Plymouth Rock chickens, winning many premiums and trophies. He was a great lover of hounds and of the fox hunt. In 1912 he was elected representative and served in the Thirty-fifth General Assembly. He was a Democrat in politics.

G. A. JUSTICE was born on a farm in Linn County, Iowa, near Marion, December 31, 1857, and died at Defiance, Shelby County, March 18, 1933. Burial was at Harlan. His parents, John and Margaret (Allsworth) Justice removed to Jones County in 1865. The son received his education in common schools, augmented by one year in Mechanicsville High School. In 1881 he removed to near Panama, Shelby County, where he engaged in farming and stock raising. He later removed to Defiance. He was a member of the Shelby County Board of Supervisors during the years 1907 to 1911 inclusive. In 1918 he was elected representative and was re-elected in 1920, serving in the Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth general assemblies.

ISAAC N. SNOOK was born in Union County, Pennsylvania, February 20, 1848, and died in Pleasant Ridge Township, Lee County, Iowa, November 2, 1931. His parents, J. C. and Jane (Cornelius) Snook, removed with their family to Pleasant Ridge Township in 1853, and that continued to be Isaac's home during the rest of his life. He grew to manhood on his father's farm and received his education in near by schools. He was engaged in agricultural pursuits all his life. He ran a threshing machine during the fall seasons for over fifty years, was at one time president of the State Threshers' Association and a director in the national association. He was a justice of the peace for sixteen years, and held several township offices. In 1922 he was elected senator and served in the Fortieth and Forty-first general assemblies.

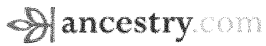
HENRY LUSK WILSON was born in Crystal Township, Tama County, Iowa, July 12, 1858, and died at a hospital in Des Moines October 12, 1932. Burial was at Osage. His parents were West and Margaret Drynan Wilson. He received his education in district schools in the vicinity of his birth and in Traer High School. He early entered dealing in live stock, operating at three or four different places, but finally in 1883 he located at Osage. Throughout his active life farming and dealing in live stock were his principal lines of business. In early life he acted
