Obituary

A. V. BRADY

Albert Verne Brady, eldest son of Clara A. and E. M. Brady, pioneer settlers here, was born September 9, 1885, in Sanborn. He graduated from the Sanborn high school in 1903; attended the Spencer Business College and was a student in the College of Law at Iowa City until he was called home by the serious illness of his father. After his father's death in 1906, he assumed the management of the home farm, making Sanborn his home continuously from that time until his death on October 13, 1943, in his home at Sanborn.

On January 1, 1910, he was married to Marguerite E. Kings. To this union were born three children, Ezra M. of Mitchell, S. D., Lieut. Norman K., United States Naval Reserve, and Betty Leone Gross, Sanborn.

Active in civic and community affairs, he served as O'Brien county representative in the 39th, 40th and 41st special sessions of the Iowa legislature. During the last two sessions he was chairman of the agricultural committee.

A pioneer in cooperative marketing work, he was a charter member and past president of the O'Brien County Farm Bureau Federation; served 12 years on the executive board of the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation; was a member of the executive board of the Iowa Co-operative Livestock Marketing Association; served as secretary and manager of the Iowa Wool Growers Association; and helped organize the Sheldon District Production Credit Association, of which he was the first president.

He was a member and past master of Onyx Lodge No. 419, A. F. & A. M. He served for ten years as a member of the Sanborn school board.

For the past two years he lived at Butte, Montana, where he was active in the livestock industry.

He is survived by his widow; three

CEILING PRICE FOR SOFT DRINKS ANNOUNCED

Cents per bottle ceiling prices, effective immediately, for bottled soft drinks sold at retail in the Sioux City district, which includes O'Brien county, were announced by O'Brien County War Price and Rationing Board.

A price of 5c per bottle for soft drinks of 5 oz. to 12 oz. sold at a counter or for consumption off of the premises was set at 5c. Sales at tables, bars or in booths and sales made at public affairs and athletic contests were set at 10c per bottle. This reflects the approximate level of prices prevailing during March, 1942, which is the date of freeze under general price regulation. ALBERT V. BRADY.

Among the younger agriculturists of O'Brien county, Iowa, who are rapidly forging to the front as successful farmers, there is no one who is more deserving of mention in this volume than Albert Verne Brady, a farmer and live-stock man of Sanborn. He was born September 9, 1885, in Sanborn, and is the son of Ezra M. and Clara A. (Roberts) Brady.

Ezra M. Brady was born March 29, 1845, in Hamden, Geauga county, Ohio, and was one of the early pioneers of O'Brien county, Iowa, coming to this county in an early day. He was the son of Barney Brady, whose father was a native of Ireland. Ezra M. Brady came to Iowa in the sixties and settled in Waterman township, O'Brien county. He was a member of the board of county supervisors early in the history of the county and later kept a mercantile establishment at Primghar. He was one of the very few business men who did not go into bankruptcy during the famous "grass-hopper" years. He rose to a prominent place in his county and even in the councils of his state. He was one of the leaders of his party and served two terms in the General Assembly of Iowa, and was a leader in Republican politics for many years. He removed from Primghar to Sanborn, where he conducted a general store for several years. In addition to his mercantile interests, he was a live stock breeder and shipper. He had large holdings of land, on which he would place sheep, which he bought in the West. He was the owner of four hundred and thirty-seven acres in O'Brien county and five hundred acres in the state of Minnesota at the time of his death. Clara A. Roberts, the wife of Ezra M. Brady, was born in Filmore county, Minnesota, June 27, 1859, and was married to Mr. Brady on April 28, 1881, and to this union there were born five children: Ralph Ray, who died in infancy; Eva Myrtle, a teacher in the Fort Dodge schools; Albert Verne, whose history is here presented; Ezra McKlimm, who was born January 1, 1888, and is now living in Mason City, Iowa, and Lawrence William, who was born June 1, 1897, and is now attending school at Fort Dodge.

Albert Verne Brady was educated in the schools of Sanborn and graduated from the high school at that place. He then studied at the business college at Spencer, Iowa, and later attended the State University of Iowa. His college education was interrupted by the death of his father on August 26, 1906, when he was called home to take charge of his father's large estate. He continued in the same general line of farming which his father had found profitable, the buying and feeding of live stock, and he is a large feeder of live stock, particularly of sheep, annually feeding from one thousand five hundred to two thousand head for the markets. He is the owner of two hundred acres of land, besides having general charge of the extensive interests of his father.

Mr. Brady was married January 1, 1910, to Margaret King, of Sanborn, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. King, the former being one of the oldest railroad men in Sanborn, and to this marriage there has been born one child, Verne, Jr., born June 2, 1913.

Politically, Mr. Brady is a Democrat, but has never held any public position other than that of being a member of the Sanborn school board. Fraternally, he is a member of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, and has attained to the thirty-second degree and is also a member of the Mystic Shrine at Sioux City. He and his wife are attendants of the Presbyterian church, and contribute liberally of their substance and time to its support.

JOHN J. DELAN.

Far-away Norway has furnished but few residents for O'Brien county, Iowa. Those who have made this county their home have prospered to an unusual degree. The same spirit still animates the people of that country which induced them to cross the unknown Atlantic in the year 1000 to the bleak coast of northern North America. During the Middle ages the people of Norway and Sweden were great sea rovers and from the time of the Saxon invasion in the sixth century the people of Norway have been important factors in the history of Europe. No more prosperous people are found in Europe today than are the people of Norway, and the same holds true of those who have made their homes in O'Brien county.

ALBERT VERNE BRADY

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Albert Verne Brady, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Albert Verne Brady, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Brady, was born September 9, 1885, at Sanborn, Iowa. He graduated from the public school and attended Spencer Business College before entering the School of Law at the University of Iowa. Because of the serious illness of his father, he was called home from the University and was unable to finish his college work, as he took over the management of his father's estate at that time.

He was united in marriage to Marguerite E. Kings on January 1, 1910, and to this union were born two sons, E. M. Brady of Mitchell, South Dakota, and Lieutenant Commander N. K. Brady of the U.S.N.R. and one daughter, Betty Brady Gross, Lieutenant in the Army Nurses Corps, all of whom survive him. He is also survived by a brother, Dr. E. M. Brady of Sanborn, Iowa, and a sister, Miss Eva M. Brady of Waterloo, Iowa.

"Verne," as he was best known throughout the state, was prominent in Farm Bureau work from the date of its organization. He served as president of the O'Brien County organization and was a director on the State Board for several years. He was also a pioneer in the co-operative marketing movement in the state.

Verne served in the Iowa Legislature during the Thirty-ninth, Fortieth and Fortieth Extra Sessions and while there introduced the bill under which all the co-operative marketing associations were finally organized. His father had served in the Legislature during the previous Code Revision Session.

He passed away at his home in Sanborn on October 13, 1943. Interment was made in Roselawn Cemetery with the Masonic Lodge in charge of the services.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Fifty-first General Assembly, That in the passing of the Honorable Albert Verne Brady, the State has lost a valued and honored citizen and the family a loving husband and father and the House would tender, by this resolution, its sincere sympathy to the surviving members of his family in their sorrow; and

Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the Journal of the House and that the Chief Clerk be instructed to send an enrolled copy to the family of the deceased.
