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Funeral Tomorrow

HEART ATTACK FATAL TO WELL- KNOWN LAWYER

**Funeral Services Will Be
At Methodist Church;
Many Condolences
Expressed**

Funeral services for Charles M. Dutcher, former member of the Iowa senate and dean of the Iowa City bar, who was widely-known throughout the state for his 40 years of practice in the legal profession, will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Methodist Episcopal church. Dr. Edwin E. Voigt, pastor, will be in charge of the service, with interment in Graceland at Oakland cemetery.

Dr. Sylvester E. Ellis, resident pastor, who is ill, will offer a tribute to the noted lawyer and legislator which will be read at the services at the church.

Friends Pay Tribute

Scores of messages of condolences were received at the family residence, 620 South Summit street, Tuesday evening and today following the death of Mr. Dutcher in the chambers of the Supreme Court of Iowa at the statehouse in Des Moines late Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Dutcher had completed an argument before the high court justices only a few moments before he was stricken. His face blanched, Mr. Dutcher leaned forward in his chair, his head resting on his arms on the table in front of him.

The services tomorrow will be attended by many dignitaries from all parts of the state, the messages being received today expressing the intentions of many persons to be here tomorrow to pay final respect to Mr. Dutcher.

Court Will Adjourn

Members of many of the groups with which Mr. Dutcher was associated are planning to attend the last rites in a body. Judge Harold D. Evans will adjourn the Johnson county court for the afternoon, and members of the Johnson County Bar association will attend the service.

Members of the Iowa City Rotary club, of which Mr. Dutcher was a past president, will attend the service following their noon meeting which will honor Mr. Dutcher's service to the community and state. Masonic services are being planned at the interment in Graceland.

Stand in Silence

Word of Mr. Dutcher's passing spread quickly over the statehouse and many groups of officials hurried to the courtroom or stood in silence in the corridor outside. Mr. Edward M. Hogan of Iowa City, deputy state treasurer, was one of the first to reach the courtroom after Mr. Dutcher had been stricken.

Head of the firm of Attys. Dutcher, Ries & Dutcher, the former senator was representing Mrs. Cora B. Case in an appeal to the supreme court from a district court jury verdict here awarding \$3,500 to Mrs. Amelia Popham for injuries in an automobile accident near Ainsworth. Attorney Dutcher had presented his opening argument to the court, and Attorney Messer, opposing counsel, had only commenced his argument when Mr. Dutcher was stricken about 3:50 o'clock.

Lasting Tribute

Associates pointed today to Attorney Dutcher's work in the state legislature and as chairman of the Iowa code revision committee as a lasting tribute to his efforts. Mr. Dutcher's activities resulted in the formulation of the present Iowa code system which made possible an orderly revision of the statutes every four years. The entire Iowa bar is indebted to Attorney Dutcher for his work.

In addition to his life's work in his profession, Attorney Dutcher was interested in many community affairs and devoted much of his talent for the University of Iowa. He was formerly president of the Iowa Alumni association.

PROF. KELLER EXPECTED TO BE WPA HEAD

**Indicate Hopkins Will
Name Iowa City Man
To Iowa Post To
Succeed Hill**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Harry L. Hopkins, federal works progress administrator, today was expected to accept the resignation of L. S. Hill, Iowa WPA head, and to appoint Prof. George J. Keller of Iowa City, as his successor.

Hill asked several weeks ago to be relieved of his WPA job in order to devote full time to his duties as Des Moines postmaster. His resignation has not been acted upon by Administrator Hopkins.

Gov. Clyde L. Herring of Iowa conferred with Hopkins regarding the resignation and new appointment Tuesday but declined to state what action was taken. Herring said, however, that he had transmitted the requests of the Des Moines chamber of commerce and Greater Des Moines committees that Hill be retained as Iowa WPA head.

Professor Keller, whose name has been most frequently mentioned for the position since Hill announced his intentions of resigning, is now engineering advisor to the Iowa WPA. He is a member of the faculty of the college of engineering at the University of Iowa and is manager of the Iowa Water Service Co. in Iowa City.

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Friends of Mr. Dutcher pointed out today that his sudden passing Tuesday afternoon as he appeared before the Iowa supreme court justices was the manner in which he had often expressed his desire to "close my case, with my boots on, in the courtroom."

Obstruction in Artery

Dr. William Carpenter, Polk county coroner, examined the remains before removal from the supreme court chambers, and explained death was due to an obstruction in the artery leading to the heart. The strain of pleading before the supreme court was not a contributing factor in Mr. Dutcher's passing, the coroner said.

Attorney Frank F. Messer of Iowa City, opposing attorney in the automobile accident case appeal which was before the high court, had just started to address the court when Attorney Dutcher leaned forward in his chair at the counsel table. Mr. B. W. Garrett, clerk of the court, hastened to call a physician, while Mr. John Gordinier, bailiff, and Mr. L. P. Hall, court messenger, carried Mr. Dutcher to a bench in the rear of the room.

Falls to Revive

A physician was summoned from the health department nearby, but he found Mr. Dutcher had failed to revive from the heart attack. The remains were brought here Tuesday evening to the McGovern funeral home, and will be taken to the residence this afternoon at 5 o'clock, to remain there until the time of the service tomorrow.

Attorney General Edward L. O'Connor of Iowa City was in the courtroom immediately after Mr. Dutcher's collapse. He paid a tribute to his colleague, which represented the sentiment of the Iowa bar, saying: "Senator Dutcher was not only one of the finest attorneys in the state, but one of the state's finest men, and in Iowa

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University's Appreciation

President Eugene A. Gilmore today expressed the university's appreciation for Mr. Dutcher's service and counsel over a period of many years.

"Mr. Dutcher gave unsparingly of his time and energy in furthering the welfare of the university," President Gilmore continued. "As a member of the state senate he rendered invaluable service in securing the appropriations which made possible the building of the medical laboratories and the University hospital. He served well and efficiently the university, city and state."

Mr. Dutcher held a high place in the republican party councils of the state, and served as an Iowa delegate to the national convention in 1916. In 1925 he declined an appointment to the supreme court when it was offered to him by the late Gov. John Hammill.

Mr. Dutcher was born at Humboldt, Kansas, April 29, 1869, a son of Daniel N. and Adelaide Beattie Dutcher. His father was born in New York and his mother in Pennsylvania.

Iowa City High Alumnus

His father came to Iowa when a young man, later moving to Kansas where he was a farmer. In Iowa he followed the carpenter trade. He passed away in 1902, being survived by his widow who died in 1912. Charles M. Dutcher was the oldest of three children.

Mr. Dutcher gained his preliminary education by attending the pioneer schools of his native county and was nine years of age when he accompanied his parents from Kansas to Iowa county, Iowa, in 1878, the family home having been established on a farm near Ladora. About a year later the family moved to Johnson county.

Mr. Dutcher was graduated from the Iowa City high school in 1889, and soon afterward entered the employ of the Smith & Harrison

Secretary to Dean McClain

He next assisted in making a government census of the mortgage indebtedness of Johnson county, and in 1891 he was a stenographer for a short time in the offices of a building and loan company in Chicago.

Mr. Dutcher then returned to Iowa City and became secretary to Dean Emlyn McClain of the University of Iowa college of law. He was thus engaged until January 1, 1894, in the meanwhile carrying forward his studies in both the liberal arts and law colleges of the university.

In Newspaper Business

In 1894 he became business manager of the Iowa City Republican and in June of that year graduated with the degree of bachelor of laws and was admitted to the bar. In 1891 during his undergraduate days he received a letter as a member of the university football team and was otherwise active in the athletic affairs of the school.

He started his law practice in 1895 and the following year he was elected county attorney, holding the office one term. He then entered a law partnership with Charles E. Burton and this association continued until 1900, becoming senior member of the firm of Dutcher and Davis with Walter M. Davis as his partner.

With Judge Wade

In 1906 Judge Martin J. Wade became a member of the firm, whose title thereafter was Wade, Dutcher and Davis until 1916 when Judge Wade retired and Mr. Hambrecht was admitted to the partnership. This firm continued until 1923 when Mr. Hambrecht retired. Mr. Davis retired later and the firm of Dutcher, Walker and Ries was formed in March, 1927.

This year, following the death of Attorney Henry G. Walker, the firm of Dutcher, Ries and Dutcher, with Attorney Dan C. Dutcher, son of Mr. Dutcher, as the third partner, was formed.

Served in Senate

Mr. Dutcher had been concerned with much important litigation in the various courts of this section of the state, and had long held high reputation as a vigorous trial lawyer and well-fortified counselor.

In 1920 Mr. Dutcher was elected to the state senate in which he served in two regular sessions and one special session. He was for six years a member of the Iowa City board of education, and in the World war period was chairman of the Johnson county committees in charge of the Third and Fourth Liberty Loan drives.
