## J. S. Garber Passed Away January 14th.

**MARBLE ROCK**—Jake S. Garber, 76, died at his home west of Marble Rock at 5:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon of last week of a heart attack.

Mr. Garber was born in Union township April 18, 1865, to Thomas and Josephine Garber. His parents moved to Section 12 in Scott township in 1867, where deceased had lived ever since, and where he has operated the farm since 1890.

Mr. Garber was director of the Farmers' Mutual Insurance company from 1900 until recently. He was always active in politics, serving as justice of the peace, constable, president of the local school board, township assessor, and being treasurer of the Scott township school district at the time of his death. He served as county supervisor six years, from 1908 through 1913. He was elected to the state legislature in November, 1918 and served for six years.

He was the oldest resident of Scott township.

Mr. Garber was married to Marcla Adams Dec. 7, 1898. He is survived by his widow, and one sister, Alice Goss of Marble Rock, and a number of nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon at 2:00 p. m. at the Methodist church, Rev. Milton Nothdurft officiating, assisted by Rev. L. W. Inman. Mrs. S. W. McNinch played "Rock of Ages", "The City Four-Square" and "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere."

In recognition of the fact that Mr. Garber had spent 74 years of his life on the farm where he died, Rev. Nothdurft chose "Pioneering" as the theme of his remarks. He also read a poem
