House honors Fred Gilbert

Editor's Note: The following was prepared by the House of Representatives and is normally issued to survivors of the deceased. In this case, the proclamation is being reprinted for the public.

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Frederick B. Gilbert, begs leave to submit the following memorials:

Frederick B. Gilbert was born July 27, 1889, in State Center, Iowa, and was a lifelong resident of the area. He was a graduate of State Center High School and the University of Michigan Law School in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Mr. Gilbert was active in county and state politics, serving as chairman of the Republican county and state central committees. He served as State Representative from Marshall County in the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth General Assemblies. He also was an aide to Governor Robert D.

Blue and accompanied Gov. Blue on the shakedown cruise of the battleship Iowa to Hawaii.

Mr. Gilbert also was a chairman of the state highway commission, charter member of the State Center Lions Club, fifty-year member of Terrestrial Lodge No. 276 AF & AM, and a member of the United Methodist Church of State Center.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE SIXTY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF IOWA:

That in the passing of the Honorable Frederick B. Gilbert, the state has lost an honored citizen and a faithful and useful public servant, and the House by this resolution would express its appreciation of his service.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the Journal of the House.

Third 'final week' was the one

As I stated three weeks ago, we were starting the first week of the "last week", and now we are completing the third week of the "last week". I think we may make it, and by the time you read this you will know for sure.

Many very important bills will pass in these final hours as the House and Senate agree on the major issues. Some have already been put on the Governor's desk, and on Friday the "bottle bill" was signed.

A conference committee report on a comprehensive solar energy program was adopted and sent to the Governor. At the beginning of this session, I sponsored a solar energy bill with a property tax exemption. It also placed responsibility for education

and study of solar energy in the energy policy council. These concepts are all incorporated in this bill.

The bill contains a five-year property tax exemption on values of solar or gas energy production systems. The bill also directs the energy policy council to study and plan demonstration projects, incentive programs, public education projects, the relationship between public power companies and the use of solar energy, and to report findings to the General Assembly.

All of these changes will help us to educate the public that we need an alternate source of energy. As more and more people learn to use solar or wind power, then we can better conserve our other energy resources.

The 19 year old drinking bill has passed the House and has been sent to the Governor. I supported the bill on final passage. I guess my reasons are a little different than most.

It is my feeling that we ask more of an eighteen year old than we do of any other adult in the area of purchasing liquor. When we go to a party and take a six pack of beer or a bottle of liquor, we can all assume that the other people attending that party are old

enough to drink.

Such is not the case of an eighteen year old high school student who goes to a party. Without this law, he can take the same six pack or bottle with him; but since the people he associates with are other high school students and too young to purchase liquor, if one of these underage students takes a drink or has a can of that beer, then the other rights the eighteen year old has take effect.

He can be arrested and charged with providing liquor to a minor or possibly contributing to the delinquency of a minor. All this because he started out with the same rights we all have, but because of his peer group, he is forced to exercise greater restraint than the rest of the adult world.

He also faces the peer pressure to buy beer and liquor for those friends of his who ask, and are underage. If he wants to drink legally, he must find older and different friends at an earlier age than he may want.

In the next few newsletters, I will try to explain some of the features of some of the major bills that have passed during this session and their effects on you.
