

John H. Weber

Appeal Filed

One of Cascade's most outstanding and prominent citizens, John H. Weber, passed away Saturday evening following a heart attack. Mr. Weber had been afflicted with heart disease for a number of years but his death followed an unexpected attack late in the evening.

The attack suffered in the Weber apartment in the Faber Hotel followed a slight coughing spell about 10:45 and Mr. Weber, long time civic and political leader, succumbed at 11:00 o'clock. Mr. and Mrs. Weber, just last week, had closed their home in East Cascade and had moved to the hotel. After a long illness of the past several months Mr. Weber, during the past few weeks, appeared in excellent health and spirit and at the time of his demise was preparing a paper to be delivered at a pharmaceutical meeting in Iowa City in the near future.

Cascade or today owes much to the vision, acumen, versatility, ambition and leadership of John H. Weber and a handful of young men of the '80's and '90's. Realizing that Cascade offered great business opportunities for the ambitious and a wealth of peace and happiness for the home lover, John Weber fought side by side for years with Matt Bisonius, Charley Baldwin, Robert and Stephen Keane, H. L. Dehner, Jim Devaney, Sam Patterson, Tom McQuillen and a few others for the joys, comforts and conveniences which has made Cascade of today one of the biggest small towns in Iowa. It was the persistence of such men that advertised this community not only within the borders of the state, but nationally--no other town of less than 1300 is as well known throughout the nation as is Cascade or enjoys more natural or spiritual conveniences. To men such as John Weber we of a younger generation owe much--their guidance and leadership has been an invaluable heritage.

In civic affairs, business, largesse, moral welfare and spiritual guidance, political sanctity, sports and family loyalty John Henry Weber had just one thought in common with those other young men of the '90's: "My family, home and Cascade, first; the World, second!"

We could write reams concerning the civic affairs aided by John Weber and the sacrifices which he made so that his family might enjoy the comforts of life and be trained finely for their niche in life.

Last week the Board of Supervisors of Dubuque county denied to review their action on an appeal by the Dyersville Commercial when at the first meeting of the board this year, the official newspapers were designated. They included the Telegraph Herald of Dubuque, The Witness, of Dubuque, and the Cascade Pioneer and the Dubuque Leader, the latter two printing the official publication but splitting the fee.

Monday all four newspapers were served with a notice that an appeal had been made to the district court to review the action of the board in appointing the official publications.

The appeal will be heard during the next term of court and according to the service that will be on the 7th day of March.

In the Dyersville paper's motion filed with the board petitioning reconsideration, it was set out that the appointment of the Pioneer and Leader were objected to, but no specific papers were mentioned in the appeal.

In the court appeal all appointments were objected to but it is expected the bulk of the pressure will be placed against the Pioneer, Leader and The Witness, diocesan official publication which received for the first time this year, an appointment as one of the official county publications.

STANTON PRESIDENT

William Stanton of Bernard was elected president of the Jones county Safety Council at an organization meeting at Anamosa last Wednesday night.

John Henry Weber, the son of pion-
eer Iowans, Joseph and Thoresa Bug-
ger Weber, was born in Cascade on
August 1st, 1866. He attended St.
Martin's school here in his youth and
studied pharmacy at Highland Park

was the partner of the late T. H. Mc-

In business Mr. Weber was one of the outstanding druggists in Eastern Iowa and in a recent brochure was paid a notable tribute by the Parke, Davis and Co., world famous pharmaceutical concern.

Mr. Weber was well known in Knights of Columbus circles, was one of the first members of No. 930 at Cascade and a past Grand Knight of the local council.

Following the death of Charles D. Baldwin in 1932, Mr. Weber was appointed to the Baldwin vacancy as trustee of Sunnycrest Sanitorium at


five years before the final office was opened on July 10, 1886, under postmaster, William N. Page. This post office remained open until January 15, 1955. The only store remaining in 1994 was started by Don Anthony and was still operated by his family. The site was named for Chief Wahpeton whose name allegedly meant "People of the Leaves."

WEATHERCAST BUILDING SYSTEMS. After fourteen years of experimenting, the Weathercast System was introduced in **DUBUQUE** in 1983 by Jim Edwards of Edwards Precast Concrete Company. Utilizing rigid insulation, concrete panels and studs in a patented design, the system offered sound and fire proofing, a complete wind barrier, and an insulation factor of R-30. Concrete panels manufactured at company headquarters could be made to resemble brick, stucco, or stone.

WEBBER, James L. (DUBUQUE COUNTY, IA, Apr. 24, 1936—). President, **WEBBER METAL PRODUCTS** and the 1990 Iowa Small Business Person of the Year. While serving in the United States Army from 1953 to 1956, Webber developed an interest in engineering and tool design and entered the military engineering school. In 1973, while employed as a plant manager in Monticello, he started his own company in his garage. Webber served on the **CASCADE** city council and utility board, Jaycees and the American Legion. In 1989, he was named Eastern Iowa Businessman of the Year. In 1995, Webber provided funds for the establishment of the Webber Activity Center in Cascade. His generosity extended to the **WESTERN DUBUQUE SCHOOL DISTRICT** in 1997 when he offered his former factory building in Cascade for the use of education.

WEBBER METAL PRODUCTS INC. Precision machining and assembly facility located in **CASCADE**. Utilizing state-of-the-art CNC (Computer Numeric Controlled) machine tools and experienced personnel, Webber Metal Products, Inc. became one of the nation's most respected contract machining and assembly facilities. In 1973, while working as a plant manager for a Monticello company, James L. **WEBBER** began the company in his garage. After hiring several full- and part-time employees, he decided in 1975 to construct his first building off Adams Street in Cascade. Business prospered, and in 1976 the company added about 1,500 square feet to the building. New equipment was also purchased. In 1978, Webber left his job and began working for his own company which is then running a two-shift operation with fifteen employees. By 1980, Webber Metal Products had reached 6,000 square feet of manufacturing space and employed up to thirty-five people.

Faced with economic recession along with other manufacturers, Webber broadened the company into new products. Once focusing on supplying components to the construction machinery industry, the firm entered the fields of agriculture, food processing, defense, hydraulics, graphic arts and electrical industries. Diversification allowed the company, which had drastically cut back employment, to expand to 115 employees and purchase state-of-the-art equipment. In the early 1990s, the company began expanding into complete manufacturing and assembly rather than just producing pieces for final assembly elsewhere. The company achieved the coveted "certified supplier" status with many major manufacturers which demanded JIT (Just In Time) delivery of parts directly to the production line. The last addition to the facility in Cascade was made in 1990. In 1993, the company opened a second plant in Platteville, Wisconsin. In 1996, the Cascade plant employed 150 workers while the Platteville operation had 25. Three shifts were used at both facilities. A new 120,000 square-foot facility in Cascade along the future Highway 151 bypass was begun during the spring of 1997, replacing the original building which was donated to the **WESTERN DUBUQUE SCHOOL DISTRICT**.

WEBER, Ambrose J. (DYERSVILLE, IA, July 3, 1915—Dyersville, IA, June 19, 1983). 4-H leader. A past member of the **DUBUQUE COUNTY FAIR** Board, Weber also served thirty-four years as an organization leader of the Dyersville 4-H Club.

WEBER, John. (CASCADE, IA, Aug. 1, 1866—Cascade, IA, Jan. 15, 1938). State representative. Weber, educated as a pharmacist, was elected to the 39th Iowa General Assembly in 1920 and was re-elected in 1922. Unsuccessful in drafting legislation to force the **CHICAGO, MINNEAPOLIS, ST. PAUL & PACIFIC RAILROAD** to widen the **NARROW GAUGE RAILROAD** between Cascade and Bellevue,

he authored bills affecting banking, pharmacy and text books which were adopted. Weber served two three-year terms on the State Pharmacy Board as an appointee of governors John Hammill and Dan Turner, a trustee of **SUNNYCREST SANITORIUM** in **DUBUQUE** and was the official starter for all horse races for many years with the Cascade Fair Association.

WEBER, Leander M. (**DYERSVILLE**, IA, Sept. 28, 1912—**DUBUQUE**, IA, Jan. 24, 1974). Director. A member of the **DYERSVILLE COMMERCIAL CLUB** and Dyersville Sportsman Club, Weber was a director of the **DUBUQUE COUNTY FARM BUREAU** and a vice-president of the **DUBUQUE COUNTY FAIR** Association. He was a leader of a 4-H club for many years and was a member of the Dubuque County Extension Council.

WEBER PAPER COMPANY. Family-owned wholesale operation. Established in 1951 by Arthur V. Weber, James L. Weber, and Fred W. Aschenbrenner, the company was first located at 136 Main Street in **DUBUQUE** before moving into the former location of the Key City Candy Company in 1960. The firm's major customers were corner grocery stores which purchased paper bags and butcher paper. With the decline in that market, the company branched into other areas so that by 1996 it stocked an estimated five thousand products. James J. Weber purchased the controlling interest in the company in 1989. In 1991, the company served an estimated five thousand customers within seventy-five miles of Dubuque. The company, whose sales by 1995 tripled, acquired Waterloo Paper. Business expansion into new product lines included such health care items as bed care products, food service materials, medicine and portion cups, and skin care and soaps. In 1996, the firm moved into a new 40,000 square foot building in the Dubuque **INDUSTRIAL PARK** after trading its building at 137 Main Street for 5.85 acres in the park with **DUBUQUE IN FUTURO**. Weber Paper employed twenty-seven people in Dubuque and twenty in Waterloo.

WEBER, Valentine. (Baden, Germany, Nov. 3, 1830—July 26, 1907). Assessor. Weber, a contractor and builder in **DYERSVILLE**, constructed a homestead on Pleasant Hill with the five surrounding acres made into Union Park, the site of the annual Schuetzen Feast. Weber was elected city and township assessor in 1872 and held the position for thirty years. He was a director and president of the board of education and also served as the city surveyor. Weber constructed many buildings in Dyersville including the Germania Brewery and the Heu De Bourgh Castle.

WEBSTER INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT. Located in north-central **LIBERTY TOWNSHIP**, the district covered approximately seven square miles. The school was located at the southwest corner of U.S. 61 and Lake Road one mile north of the City of **LUXEMBURG**. The district was merged in 1960 with the **WESTERN DUBUQUE SCHOOL DISTRICT**.

WEEKS, Edith. (**DUBUQUE**, IA, Aug. 2, 1882—Des Moines, IA, June 21, 1955). Director, Garden Club of America. One of Des Moines' most prominent women, Mrs. Weeks was the wife of Carl Weeks, the president of Armand Company of Des Moines. Together they traveled Europe and returned with the concept of constructing a Tudor manor in the heart of Iowa. Their home, Salisbury House, an architectural treasure, containing a king's ransom in precious art, was later sold for a nominal price to the Iowa State Education Association for its headquarters. Mrs. Weeks was also active in refurbishing Lucas House, the residence of Iowa's first governor, in Iowa City.

WEIDEMANN, Harold J. (**ASBURY**, IA, Oct. 21, 1913—**DUBUQUE**, IA, July 15, 1995). Auctioneer. A farmer and auctioneer for many years, Weidemann owned the Dubuque County Auction Service from 1951 until 1981. After his death, the farm he had operated for about fifty years was sold and developed into a residential subdivision.

WEIDEMANN, John. (**CENTER TOWNSHIP**, IA—Center Township, IA, Sept. 19, 1964). Trustee. Weidemann, a well known local farmer, served thirty-seven years as a trustee of Center Township.

WEIDENBACHER, Jacob. (Steinmauren, Baden, Germany, Apr. 14, 1843—**DYERSVILLE**, IA, Apr. 23, 1931). Council member. As street commissioner in Dyersville while William **TRICK** served as mayor, Weidenbacher supervised the construction of the first gravel streets in the city. He also served as city marshal and was a member of the city council. Weidenbacher was one of the organizers of the Dyersville Schuetzen Verein whose shooting range was located southeast of the city. He was also a member of the Red Jacket Fire Department which won the state tournaments for several years.

WEIDERT, John H. (Unknown—Waterloo, IA, Jan. 18, 1952). Banker. A **DYERSVILLE** city council member for several years, Weidert was on the board of the Dyersville National Bank and one of the organizers of Dyersville's volunteer fire department.


