

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and has maintained the high professional reputation always connected with the name of Jaques.

Captain Jaques is identified with several fraternal organizations, including the Benevolent Protective Order of Elks, the Grand Army of the Republic and the Loyal Legion. From its organization he has been the president of the Fishing and Hunting Club of Ottumwa and he finds much of his recreation through indulging in the sports indicated in the name of that club. In politics he has ever been an earnest democrat and when the party's candidate for district judge and judge of the state supreme court he ran far ahead of his ticket, a fact indicative of his personal popularity and the confidence reposed in him by those who know him best. At an early day he was deputy collector of internal revenue and afterward served as city solicitor for three consecutive terms. That he enjoys the respect and honor of his colleagues and contemporaries at the bar is indicated in the fact that he has again and again been elected to the presidency of the Wapello County Bar Association. During the long years of his residence in Ottumwa his practice has been extensive and of an important character. His retentive memory often excites the surprise as well as the admiration of his fellow practitioners. He stands high, especially in a decision where his comprehensive knowledge of the law is manifest, and his application of legal principles demonstrates the wide range of his professional acquirements.

HON. WALTER W. ANDERSON.

Hon. Walter W. Anderson, representative of Greene county in the thirty-sixth general assembly of Iowa and president of the Bank of Scranton, was born in Jefferson, Iowa, January 7, 1872, a son of James Frank and Amanda J. (Witt) Anderson. The father, who was born in Ohio in 1833, died in 1880 when but forty-seven years of age. The mother, a native of Illinois, born in 1844, still makes her home in Scranton. James F. Anderson was a harness maker and followed his trade in Iowa after settling in Greene county in the late '60s. He was also active in public affairs, being elected by the republicans to the office of clerk of the district court, which position he acceptably filled for three terms. He was a recognized leader in the ranks of his party and did all in his power to promote its growth and insure its success. Following his retirement from office he was connected with the City Bank, making his home in Jefferson to the time of his death. He was also the owner of land and was an enterprising business man as well as a very progressive and popular citizen. His religious faith was that of the Methodist church, to which he always strictly adhered, and his many sterling qualities commended him to the confidence and goodwill of all.

Walter W. Anderson attended the high school of Jefferson and a commercial college at Des Moines, but long before he pursued his business course he took his initial step in the business world. When twelve years of age he began working in a store and was employed in connection with a general mercantile establishment and book store until he reached the age of about eighteen years. He then entered the City Bank of Jefferson in the capacity of bookkeeper, there remaining for three years. In 1895 he engaged in the hardware business at Jefferson and con-

tinued in that line for three years. In 1898 he accepted the cashiership of the State Bank of Scranton and after the bank was reorganized, becoming the Bank of Scranton, a private bank, he acted as cashier for twelve years. On the expiration of that period he became president and so continues, earefully and wisely directing the interests of the institution. He is likewise vice president of the City Bank of Jefferson and is the owner of considerable land, which he utilizes in connection with his farming and stock-raising interests, which are somewhat extensive and important. In a word, his business affairs are capably directed and success has attended his efforts in gratifying measure.

Mr. Anderson is well known in Masonic circles, being a past master of the lodge at Scranton, a member of the Royal Arch chapter, the Knights Templar commandery, the consistory at Des Moines and Za-Ga-Zig Temple. Ancient Arabie Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, also of Des Moines. His chief activity outside of business, however, is in the field of polities. He has been interested in the political situation and significant problems of the day since age conferred upon him the right of franchise. In 1901 he was elected mayor of Scranton and filled the position so ably that he was reelected for a second term. He has always been a stalwart republican and is now identified with the progressive wing of the party. He was elected on that ticket to the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth general assemblies, becoming a valued and active working member of the house, in which he holds the important position of chairman of the committee on appropriations. His work has been of the utmost benefit to the commonwealth and he is regarded as a man who has a statesmanlike grasp of affairs.

HENRY IRVING SMITH.

Character and enterprise impress themselves upon a community in proportion to the worth of the work of the individual. The world has little use for a misanthrope, the man who lives to himself, but accords respect and honor to him who feels that life is purposeful, that his duty lies beyond the interests of self and takes cognizance of duties and obligations to the public. Such was the career of Captain Henry I. Smith, a prominent banker of Mason City, a leading resident of northern Iowa and an honored veteran of the Civil war. Mr. Smith was born in Nottingham, England, May 4, 1840. He was but eight years of age at the time of his father's death in 1848, and the same year the mother with her family came to the United States, settling in Kane county, Illinois, where they resided until 1854. In that year he arrived in Iowa, taking up his abode in Cerro Gordo county. The journey was made in a prairie schooner and their first home was a log cabin sixteen by twenty feet, which was built upon the farm. They experienced the usual hardships and privations of pioneer life, when they had to depend upon the farm for almost everything which they needed or possessed.

Henry I. Smith aided in the work of developing and improving the farm and as opportunity offered he supplemented his education, pursued in the district schools of Kane county, Illinois, by further study in Cerro Gordo county, this state. He continued to till the soil until after the outbreak of the Civil war. He enjoyed the distinction of being the first man to enlist from Cerro Gordo county.

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
